A few years prior to this, the Colonial Legislature of Virginia, with a view to secure the speedy transit of public dispatches from the seat of government to the interior of the province, passed a law requiring each plantation to provide a messenger to convey such dispatches to the next plantation on the route, with the greatest speed, under a penalty of one hogshead of tobacco.

In 1672, in pursuance of "his majesty's commands," Governor Lovelace, of the New York Colony, established "a post to goe monthly," between New York and Boston. This, it is probable, was the first organization of a mail route in America.

"In 1737 Col. Spotswood, late Governer of

readily, and found it of great advantage;

We hold that the government thus established is subject to the two great principles asserted in the Declaration of Independence, and we hold further that the mode of its formation subjects it to a third fundamental principle, animally—the law of compact. We maintain that in every compact between two or more parties, the obligation is mutual—that the failure of one of the contracting parties to perform a material part of the agreement entirely releases the obligation of the other, and that where no arbiter is provided, each party is remitted to his own indigment to determine the fact of failure with all its consequences.

This etipulation was so material to the compact, that without it that compact would not have been made. The




