THE CASE OF CAPT. McDONALD. ST. Louis, May 23 .- The Habeas Corpus case of Captain McDonald was returned today and ably agued. The United States Attorney took the ground that the court had no jurisdiction in the matter, as military uthority in time of war might arrest persons in array against the Federal Government for treason or alleged treason.

The Counsel for the petitioners replied to the effect that the Court had power to execute this writ: that it was the greatest protection of freemen and under no circumstances could it be denied a provision.

The Court will give its decision to-morrow. Great interest is felt in the result.

MOVEMENT OF TROOPS AT BALTI-

BALTIMORE, May 23 .- A train from Philaelphia arrived at 8 o'clock this morning with 500 recruits for Washington. Also one company of the 12th New York regiment, ninety men. The latter marched through the city to the Washington depot. The recruits renained in the cars and passed through.
