SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

The Southern Baptist Convention, recently in session at Savannah, Georgia, adopted unanimously the following preamble and resolutions, which it is said were drawn up by Rev. Dr. Fuller, of Baltimore. The churches represented in the Convention comprise between six and seven hundred

thousand.

We hold this truth to be self-evident, that governments are established for the security, prosper by and happiness of the people. When, therefore, any government is perverted from its proper design, becomes oppressive, and abuses its power, the people have a right to change it.

The Union constituted by our forefathers was one of coequal sovereign States. The fanatical spirit of the North has long been seeking to deprive us of rights and franchises guaranteed by the Constitution; and, after years of persistent aggression, they have at last accomplished their purpose.

In vindication of their sacred rights and honor, in self-defense, and for the protection of all which is dear to man, the Southern States have practically asserted the right of seceding from a Union so degenerated from that established by the Constitution, and they have formed for themselves a Government based upon the principles of the original compact—adopting a charter which secures to each State its sovereign rights and privileges.

of the original compact—adopting a charter which secures to each State its sovereign rights and privileges.

This new Government, in thus dissolving former political connections, seeks to cultivate relations of amity and good will, with its late confederates, and with all the world; and they have thrice sentipapecial Commissioners to Washington, with overtures for peace, and for a fair, smicable adjustment of all difficulties. THE ELEVENTH SECEDED STATE. The following is the ordinance of secession unanimously adopted by the State Conven tion of North Carolina, Thursday, May 23,one hundred and fifteen members voting:

one hundred and fifteen members voting:

"We, the people of the State of North Carolina in convention assembled, do declare and ordain, and it is hereby declared and ordained, that the ordinance adopted by the State of North Carolina in the convention of 1789, whereby the Constitution of the United States was ratified and adopted, and also all acts and parts of acts of the General Assembly ratifying and adopting amendments to the said Convention, are hereby repealed, rescinded and abrogated. We do further declare and ordain that the Union now subsisting between the State of North Carolina and the other States, under the title of the United States of America, is bereby disolved, and that the State of North Carolina is in full possession and exercise of all those rights of sovereignty which belong and appertain to a free and independent people."

An ordinance was also adopted to ratify the "Constitution of the Provisional Government of the Confederate!States of America."

Provisions not having been distributed, foraging parties provided liberally for themselves, in some in-

stances destroying property. Colonel Phelps of the Vermont Regiment is now in command of the post. Nine entrenchments, twenty-five hundred feet long, are nearly completed.

The steam machinery, fuel, .armament and provisions to be furnished by the Govern-

Specifications will be furnished by the de-They require the builders to state the amount for which the contract will be fulfilled. The vessels to be launched in sixty, seventy-five, ninety, or one hundred days from the date of contract, and in each case to be completed ready for sea in thirty days

STOPPAGE OF THE TRANSPORTA. TION OF FREIGHT FOR THE SOUTH.

Louisville, May 30 .- Immense quantities of freight for the South are going by the Nashville railroad. It is rumored that the transportation of goods South will be stopped Monday next.

The exodus of Southerners northward is unprecedented, partly attributed to the stoppage of boats on the Mississippi.

It is rumored that if the Nashville road is stopped, the Tennesseans will advance into Kentucky and take possession of the road. Union men in Kentucky are determined to permit no aggressions from any quarter.

ARREST OF DISORDERLY PERSONS IN BALTIMORE.

BALTIMORE, May 31 .- Shortly after midnight a party of disorderly men approached the picket guard at Federal Hill. The guard hailed twice and receiving no reply fired, wounding one man. The rest retreated. A hundred soldiers were then sent out and arrested the men, four of whom after an examination this morning were discharged.

NAVAL INTELLIGENCE.

NEW YORK, May 31 .- The ship "Thirtyone States," from Liverpool for Mobile, was spoken off Sandy Hook on the 28th. She was furnished with papers, and bore off for St. Johns N. B.

The steamers Thomas Swann, Locust Point, George Creek and Potomac have been chartered by the Government to take provisions to Pickens, Monroe, &c.

EXTENSIVE WAR PREPARATIONS AT FORTRESS MONROR.

BALTIMORE, May 31 .- Most extensive was preparations are in progress at Fortress Monroe. Troops are being rapidly pushed forward into the interior, and it is thought that an attack on Norfolk by a circuitous route will soon be made. An immense quantity of war material and provisions are being anded at the fort.




