firmed in a card dated on the 17th of this mouth, few days after the commencement of the war. But insamuch as I never had occasion to discuss this particular question at length, I beg leave to adopt the following admirable summary of the case in an extract from a carefully prepared and exceedingly able speech of the Hon. Stephen A. Douglas, in the Senate of the United States, March 15, 1861: EXTRACT FROM MR DOUGLAS' SPEEC "I prefer such an amicable settlement to peaceable distunion; and I prefer it a thousand times to
civil war. If we can adopt such amendments as
will be satisfactory to Virginia, North Carolina,
Tennessee, and the other Border States, the same
plan of pacification which will satisfy them will
create a Union party in the Cotton States which will acon embrace a large majority of the people those States, and bring them back of their own will and accord; and thus restore, strengthen, perpetuate the glorious old Union forever. I rep perpetua'e the glorious old Union forever. I repeat, whatever guarantees will satisfy Maryland and the Border States (the States now in the Union,) will create a Union party in the seceded States that will bring them back by the voluntary action of their own people. You can restore and preserve the Government in that mode, You can do it in no other. War is disunion. War is final, eternal separation. Hence, disguise it as you may, every Union man in America must advocate such aments to the Constitution as will preserve peace and restore the Union; while every disunionist,

ments to the Constitution as will preserve peace and restore the Union; while every disunionist, whether openly or secretly plotting its destruction, is the advocate of peaceful secession, or of war, as the surest means of rendering reunion and reconstruction impossible. I have too much respect for his intellect to believe, for one moment, that there is a man for war who is not a disunionist per secence I do not mean, if I can prevent it, that the is a man for war who is not a disunionist per seence I do not mean, if I can prevent it, that the
enemies of the Union—men plotting to destroy it
—shall drag this country into war, under the pretext of protecting the public property, and enforcing the laws, and collecting revenues, when their
object is disunion, and war the means of accomplishing a cherished purpose. The disunionists,
therefore, are divided into two classes—the one
open, the other secret disunionists. The one is in
favor of peaceful secession and a recognition of independence; the other is in favor of war, as the
surest means of accomplishing the object and of dependence; the other is in favor of war, as the surest means of accomplishing the object, and of making the seperatian final and eternal. I am a Union man, and hence against war; but if the Union must be temporarily broken by a revolution, and the establishment of a de facto Government by some of the States, let no act be done that will-prevent restoration and future preservation. Peace is the only policy that can lead to that result.

Sir, this quiton, "Have we a Government? has been pounded by every tyrant who has tried to keep feet on the necks of the people since the webegun. When the barons demanded Magna Ohfrom King John at Runneymede, he exclaim 'Have we a Government?' and called for his at to put down the discontented barons. Charles I. attempted to collect the ships' most violation of the Constitution of England. violation of the Constitution of England, a disregard to the rights of the people, and w sisted by them, he exclaimed, 'Have we a Ge sisted by them, he exclaimed, 'Have we a Govern-ment? We cannot treat with rebels; put down the traitors; we must show them that we have a Government.' When James II. was driven for the throne of England for trampling on the liber-ties of the people, he called for his army, and ex-claimed, 'Let us show that we have a Govern-ment!' When George III. called upon his army to pat down rebellion in America, Lord North cries out lustily, 'No compromise with traitors; let u demonstrate that we have a Government.' When in 1848, the people rose upon their tyrants all over Europe, and demanded guarantees for their rights every crowned head exclaimed, 'Have we a Government.' and arresolution to the compression of the compression of

every crowned head exclaimed, 'Have we a Government?' and appealed to the army to vindicate their authority and enforce the law."

The war has had many motives for its commence ment; it can have but one result, whether it last one year or fifty years—final, eternal separation disunion. As for the conquest and subjugation of the South, I will not impeach the intelligence of any man among you, by assuming that you dream of it as at any time or in any way possible. Remember the warning of Lord Chatham of the Bit ish Parliament: "My Lords, you cannot couque America." A public debt of hundreds of millions weighing us and our posterity down for generations weighing us and our posterity down for generations, we cannot escape. Fortunate shall we be if we escape with our liberties. Indeed it is no longer so much a question of war with the South, as whether we ourselves are to have Constitutions and a republican form of Government hereafter in the North and West.

"Sir, the history of the world does not fail tocondemn the folly, weakness and wickedness of 
that Government which drew its sword upon its 
own people when they demanded guarantees for 
their rights. This cry, that we must have a Government, is merely following the example of the 
besotted Bourbon, who never learned anything by 
misfortune, never forgave an injury, never forgot 
an affront. Must we demonstrate that we have got 
a Government, and coerce obedience without reference to the justice or injustice of the complaints? 
Sir, whenever 10,000,000 people proclaim to youwith one unanimous voice, that they apprehend 
their rights, their firesides, and their family altans 
are in danger, it becomes a wise Government to 
listen to the appeal and to remove the apprehension. History does not record an example where 
any human Government has been strong enough to 
crush 10,000,000 of people into subjection when 
they believed their rights and liberties were imperiled, without first converting the Government 
itself into a despotism, and destroying the last vestige of freedom."

These were the sentiments of the Democratic party, of the Constitutional Union party, and of a large majority of the Republican presses and party, only six weeks ago. They were mine; I voted them repeatedly along with every Democrat and Union man in th. House. I have seen nothing to change, much to confirm, them since; especially in the secession, within the last thirty days, of Virginia, Arkansas, North Carolina and Tennessee, taking with them four millions and a half of people; immense wealth, inexhaustible resources, five hundred thousand fighting men, and the graves of Washington and Jackson. I shall vote them again.

On the southern shore of the entrance to Chesapeake Bay from the ocean is Cape Henry,opposite Cape Charles. Following along the shore about six miles we come to Lynn Haven. To one who chooses, therefore, to look at the probabilities of furture events, in forming his judgment of the demands of the present, a general war could only seem fraught with utter ruin to the fabric of freedom raised by our fathers, and which has so long blessed, and shielded their posterity. There might yet be modes provided for setting our national controversy, either by a convention which would spree upon terms—or, in the worst event, by an amiosble separation, agreed to by all the parties. REPORT OF THE STATE PRISON DIRECTORS.

WAR NEWS, &c.

The directors have rebuilt the wall around the female prison-yard at an expense exceeding the \$800 appropriated by the legislature, and they ask the sanction of the legislature for their action.

Only two deaths have occurred during the past 12 months. The subject of an Insane Department is entered upon and discussed somewhat, and the conclusion arrived at that there is no "proper subject for confinement in a State Prison, who could be treated with more humanity, and with better prospects of benefit to himself, in an Insane Hospital connected with the ons."
The directors endorse the request of the warden for a

The directors endorse the request of the warden for an appropriation of \$2,000 to be expended in repairs.

The warden states that the prison is indebted to the School Fund in the sum of \$19,000. The interest on that amount for one year, and \$1,000 of the principal was due Sept. 1st 1860, and remains unpaid. The reasons and causes of this non-payment are set forth in a lengthy explanation. Property sufficiently ample to pay the debt is held, and the claims are undoubtedly safe.

RETREAT FOR THE INSANE.

The annual report for the Retreat for the Insane, in Hartford, has been issued. The Managers report a year the institution being filled Hartford, has been issued. The Managers report a year of usefulness and prosperity, the institution being filled constantly to its utmost capacity. During the year gas has been introduced to the entire establishment, a complete system of sewerage finished, and \$11,222 subscribed by citizens to make extensive improvements in the grounds, which will be soon carried out. A legacy of \$3,000 from the estate of David Watkinson has been received, the income only of which can be expended. From Dr. Butler's report, we find that on the first of April there were 109 male and 117 female patients in the Retreat—226 in all. The whole number under treatment during the year was 391; of these there were discharged; recovered, 75; much improved, 25; improved, 29; not improved, year was 391; of these there were discharged; recovered, 75; much improved, 25; improved, 29; not improved, 27; died, 9. The institution being unable to accommodate all who apply, the preference is given to recent and eurable cases, the great object being the restoration of the insane to health of mind and body. The report says: "There are old and incurable cases enough in the State, probably enough in its alms houses alone, absolutely needing the care of the institution, to fill the Retreat to its utmost capacity. Should these be admitted, the Retreat must become a simple Receptacle, and all recoveries cease." The average residence of strictly recont cases is four months, the majority recovering within that time. Pr. Buller speaks highly of the beneficial effects of the various entertainments turnished in the Amusement Hall. Most of the choirs of the city churches have given musical entertainments during the winter. Frequent and cheerful recreation is one of the best medicines for the mind diseased.

The balance in the treasury on the first of April, 1880, was \$14,789,95. The receipts into the treasury for the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1861, twere \$254,522,98 to which add the balance on hand, \$14,889,65, making the sum of \$269,441,63. The expenditures from March 31, 1860, to April 1st, 1861, were \$221,151 13. The current receipts exceed the expenses by the sum of \$27,400,85. The comptroller reports that the balance in treasury on the 31st of March, 1861, was sufficient, or nearly so, to extinguish the public debt. The state is indebted to the school fund for a note of \$50,000, which is the only obligation on which the state is paying interest; with a balance in the treasury after meeting all other demands, of \$42,290,50. The military expenses of the state have been \$21,519,86. The receipts for the commutation tax were \$10,382,90. The cattle disease has cost the state only \$612,18. The judical expenses are less than in 1839, by the sum of \$8,533,66. The estimated receipts for the current year, including the balance in the treasury, are \$296,790,50. The estimated expenditures are \$189,000. Deduct from this the note payable to the school fund, leaving balance in the treasury March 31st, 1863, \$57,790,50. NEWS FROM HARPER'S FERRY. HARRISBURG, June 1 .- A scout who left Harper's Ferry last night reports that after a stay of a few days the average number of desertions were twenty-five. The character of the surrounding country affords peculiar facilities for desertion.

Quantities of provisions are taken to Harper's Ferry from the Maryland side, which ought to be stopped by the Government immediately.

The officers believed that unless they retreat they will be surrounded by Federal troops within a week.

Three regular officers are serving in Gen. Patterson's staff.

The number of forces on Maryland Heights overlooking Harpers Ferry are less than 1,-

000. These have four guns in battery. The Virginia soldiers' clothing is giving out so that they are obliged to wear blankets during the hottest part of the day to conceal




