DEATH OF SENATOR DOUGLAS.

IMPORTANT FROM WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, June 3.—A special dispatch to the Commercial says it is discovered that the rebels have frequent communication with this city via the Relay House and Harper's Ferry. This spy business will be stopped and some parties suddenly punished.

The Government has suppressed a new map of Virginia.

To-night it is reliably said a second attack is to be made upon Fairfax Court House. The force will be adequate to the emergency. The troops are eager for the contest.

It is positively asserted that at a Cabinet meeting Saturday it was decided to make a further requisition for 75,000 troops to serve during the war.

A special dispatch to the Post says Gen. Banks will be ordered to a command at Baltimore or to Fortress Monroe to co-operate with Gen. Butler. In the latter case Butler will superintend the offensive operations against Norfolk and Richmond under the direction of Banks.

Charles V. Calvert, a prominent citizen of Maryland, has been nominated to Congress by the Union men of Bladensburg District. He is an unconditional Union man.

AFFAIRS AT ALEXANDRIA.

ALEXANDRIA, June 3.—An alarm was raised about midnight, caused by the accidental discharge out at camp, followed by the firing of other sentinels, who thought an attack had been made.

The Government has taken in possession two cars at the depot of the Orange and Alexandria Railroad, containing a quantity of musket stocks and two boxes of highly finished tools for the construction of implements of war, each valued at \$2,000.

Capt. F. B. Medler, of the Pennsylvania Fifth Regiment, has been appointed Provost Marshall, vice Whittlesey, relieved at his own request.

The Orange and Alexandria Railroad, which is made the continuation of the military line, is rapidly being repaired by the Federal forces under the charge of competent engineers. Unfortunately there are no cars on this side at present.

Another Regiment is expected here to-day.

The Zouaves are picketed at Fairfax road. The women and children are gradually returning to town. Quiet seems to reign. Important events are anticipated.

FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—There is no doubt that three of the six Commissioners appointed by the Legislature of Maryland have waited on Jeff. Davis. There is no information obtainable here to show who are their associates, as they have not yet officially visited President Lincoln.

The plan of the organization of the volunteer forces designated in General Orders, May 4, is so far modified as to allow one surgeon and assistant to each Regiment, to be appointed by the Governors of the respective States, subject to the approval of the Secretary of War.

Lieuts. Chamberliss and Horton having tendered their resignation to avoid being called upon for active service, their names have been stricken from the rolls of the Army.

THE BARTLETT NAVAL BRIGADE

Fortress Monroe, Sunday evening, June 2.—By order of the War Department the naval brigade is not accepted and returns to New York to-night by the steamer Coataco-aloo. Their arms and ammunition are retained by order of Gen. Butler who is placed in a most embarrassing position by the presence of the brigade.

Col. Bartlett, in an unfortunate midnight expedition to Rip Raps fell from a parapet receiving internal injuries. He is delicious to-day and is with his family where he will remain.

The brigade is not yet aware of its destination as an *emancipator* is expected when the news is announced.

The unfortunate situation of Bartlett excites the deepest sympathy.

There are no military movements of importance.

EUROPEAN NEWS.

ARRIVAL OF THE PRINCE ALBERT.

NEW YORK, June 3.—The steamer Prince Albert arrived at St. John's Friday morning from Galway on the 21st. The Asia arrived out on the 20th.

CAPTURE OF ARMS &c.

NEW YORK, June 3.—A letter from Annapolis says Col. Smith of the 13th Regiment has taken 750 muskets from the secessionists of Maryland and intends to capture all the arms held by rebels in his vicinity. Five fugitive slaves have been received by the Colonel.

Three schooners loaded with corn have been brought in as prizes, also 6 prisoners of war, by a scouting party.

Ex-Gov. Pratt is held as a prisoner.

SLIGHT SKIRMISH.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—Last night a squad of Secessionists made a dash at the outposts of the 28th N. Y. Regiment, and fired upon them. An alarm was instantly sounded, the Regiment turned out and scouting parties were dispatched in pursuit of the enemy who retreated. Their fire was returned by the outposts of the 28th, with what effect is not known, as the night was exceedingly dark. No harm whatever was done by the enemy.

TROUBLE IN PLEASANT VALLEY.

POUGHKEEPSIE, June 3.—There is evidently a gang of Secessionists at Pleasant Valley in this county. A flag was raised by the Presbyterian church on Saturday. Threats were made of destroying the church and in consequence the church was fired but the flames were extinguished before much damage was done.

DEATH OF SENATOR DOUGLAS.

CHICAGO June 3.—Senator Douglas died at nine o'clock and ten minutes. Those in attendance at the time were Mrs. Douglas, Dr. Miller, Mrs. Cutts, J. Madison Cutts, Jr., of Washington, D. P. Rhodes, of Cleveland, J. McVicker, Spencer C. Boehm, and Dr. Hay, of Chicago. His remains will be taken from here on Wednesday to Washington.

FROM BALTIMORE.

BALTIMORE, June 3.—Gov. Hicks this morning demanded and received the muskets of the Baltimore City Guards numbering 159. Half of them were sent to Fort McHenry.

Several men about to start for Harper's Ferry were arrested this morning and taken to the fort.

RECEPTION OF THE NEWS OF DOUGLAS' DEATH AT ALBANY.

ALBANY, June 3.—The intelligence of the death of Douglas has caused deep grief. The flags at the capitol and at other places are at half mast.
