The contemplated advance of the federal troops over the Potomac towards Fairfax did not take place Tuesday, in consequence of information received by General Scott that a large body of revolutionists, reported to number several thousand, were at Centreville, about ten miles from Alexandria, and all the troops were therefore retained at their posts in anticipation of an attack. They bivouacked on the field on Monday night sleeping on their arms, ready for action in case of a surprise. Nothing important occurred, however, except a few straggling shots on the outposts.

It is anticipated, if the Federal army move forward, that a large Southern force will meet and oppose it at Manassas Junction, where there are numerous entrenchments established in commanding positions. It is gener ally thought that this will be the scene of the most important battle in the whole campaign, though it is not improbable that the first grand demonstration may be made on the James River.

We learn from Fortress Monroe that intel igence reached General Butler Tuesday, that s scouting party of Colonel Allen's Troy regiment had been taken prisoners by a body of five hundred revolutionists at Fox Hill near Hampton, on the previous day, but Gen eral Butler doubted the report, from the fact that the country in that direction had been thoroughly reconnoitered by his troops, and the presence of no such force of revolutionists could be discovered. However, the General immediately ordered Colonel Duryea's Zouaves to pursue the revolutionists and re-capture the party of Colonel Allen's men, if such a capture had occurred.

According to a Washington despatch to the N. Y. Express, by the end of this week, the Government expects to have 25,000 men in Virginia near Alexandria; 20,000 at Grafton; 20,000 near Harper's Ferry; 15,000 at Fortress Monroe, and 10,000 around Baltinore, Annapolis and the Relay House.

Major General Price of Missouri, has issued an order to the Brigadier Generals commanding the several military districts of that State, enjoining upon them to see that all citizens, of whatever opinions in politics or religion, be protected in their person or property.

It has been ascertained, by careful inspection, that the cannon balls fired by the revolutionists at Aquia Creek at the Government flotilla, are different from any projectiles in common use, and there is much speculation on the subject. It is believed that the cannon and projectiles must have come from

The Federal steam frigate [Susquehanna one of the vessels of the Mediterranean squadron, ordered home for the blockade, fleet, touched at the Hook, Tuesday evening. and received orders by a pilot boat to repair to Boston. The Susquehanna is 2,225 tons burden, carries eleven guns and 335 men.

The army is undergoing a thorough reorganization. All junior officers at present in the service are to be promoted. About eight hundred commissions for officers of new regiments are being made out, and will be sent in for confirmation at the ensuing session of the Senate. New appointees will fill the place of promoted officers.

Orders were received in New York on Monday, by the Collector, to remit all the fines and cancel the forfeitures incurred by hants by taking out clearances from the authorities of the Confederate States.

It is said that parties of Virginians are flyto Williamsport, Md., to avoid being impressed into the revolutionist army, leaving their families and property behind them.

It is said that there are ten thousand Southern troops between Memphis and Cairo. General Beauregard is probably at Union City, Tennessee.

Mrs. Lincoln's brother accompanied Pesident Davis to Richmond, and will take an active part in the war for the defence of the Consitutional rights of the South.
