EUROPEAN NEWS.

ARRIVAL OF THE FULTON.

NEW YORK, June 8.—The Fulton has arrived. The sales of cotton for two days were 18,000 bales, of which 6,000 were to speculators.

The debate on paper duty in England had been adjourned. The City of Baltimore arrived at Queens-town, May 28.

Spain will maintain a representative near Francis I, while he remains in Italy. Inquiry has been instituted by the criminal tribunal at Voralberg, Austria, referring to the fanatical persecution of protestants in that province.

In the Prussia Chamber of Deputies the minister of justice said the rights of citizenship was forfeited by a residence of ten years abroad.

The French ships charged to bring back the troops in Syria had arrived at Beyrout. The commissioners determined on having only one chief, either native or foreign.—France is in favor of a native chief.

The Belgian Banks have reduced the rate of discount to three per cent. Mr. Bruce arrived at Pekin, March 26th. Sugar and coffee steady. Rice, tea and talow quiet. American securities dull.

An expedition under Commodore Stribling was to proceed up the Yang Tze to make arrangements for carrying on the American trade.

Admiral Hope and Mr. Parks were to leave Shanghai for the North on April 9th. There is nothing very late from Saigon. The French were trying to make a treaty. The Saginaw was at Hong Kong, and the Daocah at Shanghai.

It is rumored that the Italian Government proposes to guarantee the present extent of the pontifical territory, the condition of the evacuation of Rome by the French.

A reinforcement of 1,750 soldiers has been sent from France to Cochinchina. It is rumored that the fall of the Emperor of Mexico is probable. Solomon Abbas disputes the throne with the Emperor.

The steamship Columbia fell over on her side in Graving dock. A hole was knocked in her bottom and about 400 pounds of glass demolished. She has since been righted.

LONDON, Tuesday Evening, May 28.—The money market was extremely heavy, the influence of the discreditable combination brought to bear against the government on the Galway mail question having been more than sufficient to contract the further influx of gold to the Bank.

There has been a large arrival of specie from Mexico and favorable reports are received from most parts of the country regarding the growing crops.

In consols the only transactions have been at 91 1/2 a 91 1/4 for money, and 91 1/2 a 91 1/4 for account. Loans were in request to-day in the stock exchange at 4 1/2 a 5 per cent. The Tasmania has arrived from the West Indies with £360,000.

The general tendency in American securities is unfavorable.

VARIABLES WAR ITEMS.

CINCINNATI, June 10.—A special dispatch from Indianapolis says there are two regiments there expecting marching orders soon.

Quartermaster Vaker left for New York and Montreal last night to close a contract for 4,000 Mille rifles.

Over one hundred companies have organized under the new militia, all well armed and equipped.

A special dispatch from Grafton to the Commercial says the Eleventh Indiana Regiment have passed through Cumberland where they will join Patterson's command.

It is reported that the rebels have entrenched themselves at Cheat Mountain Pass. A few are at Beverly and in camp at Holtzville, but they are demoralized and companies are disbanding.

They report that 10,000 Abolitionists came down upon them at Phillipi and that they cut their way through, killing 1,000. They admitted at Beverly the loss of thirty men.

A prominent secessionist was shot on Friday in Randolph, while warning the Union men to obey Leitcher's instructions.

Gen. Morris has issued the following proclamation in connection with that of General McClellan:

"HEADQUARTERS U. S. VOLUNTEERS OF WESTERN VIRGINIA, GRAFTON, June 8.—Virginians! I have the pleasure to announce that we have routed and completely discomfited the secessionists at Phillipi. Their forces are demoralized, desertions are numerous, and they are panic-stricken. The remnant have taken refuge in the passes of the mountains. Western Virginia is free from enemies to her freedom and peace. In full confidence of your ability and desire to protect yourselves, I now call upon you to come to the support of your constitutional government. I am empowered to muster you into the service of the United States, to serve only in the defence of your own soil. Arms and ammunition will be furnished you. Assemble at once at your various county seats, and report to me for instructions.

"Signed T. A. MORRIS, Brigadier General." The troops are anxious to march on Hotzville, but nothing is known of the intended movements of troops.

FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The non-payment of troops arises only from the absence of pay rolls. There is no lack of money or of a disposition on the part of the Government to pay the troops as soon as the requisite forces can be completed.

The recent General Order of the War Department is as follows: "Second Lieutenant W. McCreery, 4th artillery, having tendered his resignation when in the face of the enemy his name will be stricken from the rolls of the army.

(Signed) L. THOMAS, Adjutant General." The Second Michigan Regiment arrived here early this morning. Several members report that in the neighborhood of Baltimore stones were thrown at them, when shots were fired at the rioters and at least one was killed.

The Rhode Island Regiment left by rail this morning, taking their marine battery. Their destination is supposed to be Harper's Ferry.

About eighty cavalry to-day proceeded in an opposite direction and were last seen in the vicinity of Georgetown. Infantry movements are contemplated in the same direction.

So far as Government is concerned the plans of the campaign are properly concealed. Some of the District Volunteers left at eight this morning with their camp equipage and a bountiful supply of provisions and entrenching implements. Much cheerfulness was exhibited among the troops, especially when they received orders to hold themselves in readiness for a forward movement.

A large number of mechanics are employed at Railroad stations in putting together detached parts of transportation wagons and ambulances.

A large number of horses recently arrived here, were being trained this morning by Artillery men. Preparations for additional movements of troops in all directions are visible.
