The application in this case for a writ of habes corpus is made to me under the 14th section of the Judiciary Act of 1789, which renders effectual for the citizen the constitutional privilege of the writ of habeas corpus. That act gives to the Courts of the United States, as well as to each Justice of the Supreme Court, and to every District Judge, power to grant writs of habeas corpus for the purpose of an inquiry into the cause of commitment. The petition was presented to me at Washington under the impression that I would order the prisoner to be brought before me there, but as he was confined in Fort inc Henry, at the city of Baltimore, which is in my circuit, I resolved to hear it in the latter city, as obedience to the writ, under such circumstances, would

Henry, at the city of Baltimore, which is in my circuit, I resolved to hear it in the latter city, as obedience to the writ, under such circumstances, would not withdraw General Cadwalader, who had him in charge, from the limits of his military command.

The petition presents the following case: The petitioner resides in Maryland, in Baltimore county. While peaceably in his own house, with his family, he was, at 2 o'clock, on the morning of the 20th of May, 1861, arrested by an armed force, protessing to act under military orders. He was then compelled to rise from his bed, taken into custody, and conveyed to Fort McHenry, where he is imprisoned by the commanding officer, without warrant from any lawful authority.

The commander of the Fort, General George Cadwalader, by whom he is detained in confinement, in his return to the writ, does not deny any of the facts alleged in the petition. He states that the prisoner was arrested by order of General Keim, of Pennsylvania, and conducted as a prisoner to Fort McHenry by his order, and placed in his (General Cadwalader's) custody to be there detained by him as a prisoner.

A copy of the warrant or order under which the prisoner was arrested was demanded by his counsel.

A copy of the warrant or order under which the prisoner was arrested was demanded by his counsel, and refused. And it is not alleged in the return that any specific act, constituting an offence against the laws of the United States, has been charged against him upon oath, but he appears to have been arrested upon general charges of treason and rebellion, without proof, and without giving the names of the witnessess, or specifying the acta which, in the judgment of the military officer, constituted these crimes. And having the prisoner thus in custody upon these vague and unsupported accusations, he refuses to obey the writ of habeas corpus, upon the ground that he is duly authorized by the

custody upon these vague and unsupported accusations, he refuses to obey the writ of habeas corpus, upon the ground that he is duly authorized by the President to suspend it.

The case, then, is simply this—A military officer, residing in Pennsylvania, issues an order to arrest citizen of Maryland, upon vague and indefinite charges, without any proof, so far as appears. Under this order, his house is entered in the night; he is seized as a prisoner, and conveyed to fort if the Henry, and there kept in close confinement. And when a habeas corpus is served on the commanding officer, requiring him to produce the prisoner before a Justice of the Supreme Court, in order that he may examine into the legality of the imprisonment, the answer of the officer is that he is authorized by the President to suspend the writ of habeas corpus at his discretion, and, in the exercise of that discretion, suspends it in this case, and on that ground refuses obedieuce to the writ.

As the case comes before me, therefore, I understand that the President not only claims the right to suspend the writ of habeas corpus himself, at his discretion, but to delegate that discretionary power to a military officer and to leave it to him to determine whether he will or will not obey judicial drocess that may be served upon him.

No efficial notice has been given to the command.

The clause in the Constitution, which authorize the suspension of the privilege of the writ of he beas corpus, is in the 9th section of the first article. This article is devoted to the legislative department of the United States, and has not the slighter reference to the Executive department. It begins by providing "that all legislative powers thereis granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives." And after prescribing the manner. States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives." And after prescribing the manner in which these two branches of the legislative department shall be chosen, it proceeds to enumerate specifically the legislative powers which it thereby grants, and legislative powers which it expressive prohibits; and, at the conclusion of this specification, a clause is inserted giving Congress "the power to make all laws which may be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States or n any department or office thereof."

The power of legislation granted by this latter clause is by its words carefully confined to the spe-cific objects before enumerated. deemed necessary to guard more effectually cartain
great cardinal principles essential to the liberty of
the citizen, and to the rights and equality of the
States, by denying to Congress, in express terms,
any power of legislating over them. It was apprehended, it seems, that such legislation might be attempted under the pretext that it was necessary and
proper to carry into execution the powers granted;
and it was determined that there should be ne room
to doubt, where rights of such vital importance was
concerned, and accordingly, this clause is immediately followed by an enumeration of certain subjects,
to which the powers of legislation shall not extend;

proved by the fact that its suspension, except in case
of invasion and rebellion, is first in the list of prohibited powers—and even in these cases the power is

It is true that in the cases mentioned Congress is
of necessity the judge of whether the public safety
does or does not require it; and their judgment is
conclusive. But the introduction of these words is
a standing admonition to the legislative body of the

Indeed, the security against imprisonment by executive authority, provided for in the fifth article athority, provided for in the fitth article d, is nothing more than a copy of a like provision in the English Constitution, which had been firmly established before the Declaration of Independence.

Blackstone, in his Commentaries (1st vol., 137),

tates it in the following words: "To make imprisonment lawful, it must be either by process from the Courts of Judicature or by by process from the Courts of Judicature or by warrant from some legal officer having authority to commit to prison." And the people of the United Colonies, who had themselves lived under its protection while they were British subjects, were well aware of the necessity of this safeguard for their personal liberty. And no one can believe that in framing a government intended to guard still more efficiently the rights and the liberties of the citizens are instanced to purpose the citizens. against executive encroachment and oppression, they would have conferred on the President a power which the history of England had proved to be dangerous and oppressive in the hands of the Orown, and which the people of England had compelled it to surrender after a long and obstinate struggle on the part of the English Executive to usurp and retain it.

Their marine battery, with guns unlimbered and loaded, together with the artillery and staff horses, were put on the cars at six o'clock last evening. The other regiments moving are the First Connecticut, First Rhode Island, First New Hampshire. First Maine, Fifth New York, Ninth New York, and Nineteenth Auburn regiments. These will go by turnpike roads to Point of Rocks. General McClelland will move from the West, with fifteen or twenty thousand men, by way of Winchester, and Genera Patterson, with twelve thousand, by way of Hagerstown. It is thought that the destina tion of all these troops is Harper's Ferry, although nothing decisive is yet known. Dispatches to the New York papers state

that President Davis, General Beauregard, and General Lee had been in consultation at Richmond for several days, during which they were in constant communication with General Johnston, commanding at Harper's Ferry. General Lee was in favor of aggressive action-but President Davis and General Beauregard were in favor of acting on the defensive only. It was finally decided that no revolutionary troops should cross the Po-

Gov. Moore, of Alabama, has authorized Gen Jere Clemens to appoint two suitable persons to examine the saltpetre caves of North Alabama, with a view to the establish ment of a gunpowder mill near Huntsville or at some other convenient point in that section. At Santa Cave, near Larkinsville, Jackson County, Ala., on the Memphis and Charleston Railroad, powder was manufactured in considerable quantities, and sold by merchants in Huntsville many years ago.

Phillippi, the place where Col. Kelly was wounded, is the capital of Barbour County. in Western Virginia. It is situated on Tygart's Valley river, which enters into the Monongahela river, near the Pennsylvania line. It is about two hundred and eighty miles due west of Baltimore, and can be reached (to within about twenty miles,) by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad.


