The Constitution provides, as I have before said, that "no person shall be deprived of life, liberty or that "no person s all be deprived of life, liberty or property, without due process of law." It declares that "the right of the beople to be secure in their persons, nouses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrant shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized. It provides that the party accused shall be chitiled to a speedy trial in a court of justice.

And these great and fundamental laws, which Congress itself could not suspend, have been disregarded and suspended, like the writ of habeas corpus, by a military order, supported by force of arms.

Such is the case now before me, and I can only say that if the authority which the Constitution has confided to the judiciary department and judicial officers may thus upon any pretext or under any circumstances be usured by the military power at its discussion. any pretext or under any circumstances be usurped by the military power at its discretion, the people of the United States are no longer living under a government of laws, but every citizen holds life, liberty and property at the will and pleasure of the army officer in whose military district he may happen to be found.

In such a case my duty was too plain to be mistaken. I have exercised all the power which the Constitution and laws confer on me, but that power

It is possible that the officer who has incurred this grave responsibility may have misunderstood his instructions, and exceeded the authority intended to be given him. WASHINGTON AND SOUTHERN

It appears, upon reliable authority, tha the defences of Richmond are very complete, and have been in course of construction for some time. The easiest approach to the city is by the York river, although it is situated cartridge inserted, the breech dropped and upon the James river; but the latter stream is narrow and tortuous a little below, and difficult of navigation. The fight at Clearspring, Md., between the Home Guards and the revolutionists who were endeavoring to destroy dam No. 5 on the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, resulted in no loss to the Marylanders, and slight casualties to the enemy.

Steamers have been notified at Evansville, Ind., that transportation of provisions to Smithfield and Paducah, Ky., is in violation of the instructions of the Government, and

will be prevented. The Frankfort Yeoman says that the invasion of the sacred soil of Kentucky by Gen. Prentiss will not be submitted to for ne moment.

The Vermont Regiment at Newport News threw up, in four days, a strong breastwork, three thousand yards long, with a ditch sixteen feet wide and twelve feet deep.

It is said that the breastworks erected by he federal troops on the Virginia side of the Potomac, extend for ten miles, and are mounted with heavy batteries.

One thousand men are employed in throw ing up earthworks near Alexandria, as a recaution against an attack.



No further military movements have taken place, the soldiers resting from the great fatigue of yesterday, consequent upon their march of twenty miles and an action of nearly two hours, with not a complete meal for more than twenty-four hours.
