1776 AND 1861.-A PARALLELISM. In the Albany Argus of 31st Jan., last, appeared an article over the signature of "Hamden," in which the writer drew an instructive parallel between Boston in 1776 and Charleston in 1861. We make the following extracts, and commend the facts therein stated as worthy of attention and comparison with those now transpiring under the "Lord Norths" who most unfortunately have the present management of our national affairs :

affairs:

If we go back to the colonial period of our history, to the winter of 1775, only eighty-six years, we shall, if we examine carefully, find Boston at that time somewhat in the condition of Charleston now. It was in a state of irritated opposition to the British government, garrisoned by British troops under General Gage for the purpose of protecting British property and executing British laws. Lord North was as determined then as Mr. Lincoln is now to execute the laws, to put down the traitors at every hazard and with all the power Great British had at her command. Lord North believed the colonists could be easily subdued, and that it was only necessary to exhibit a little firmness to quell the threatened storm. Not so thought the Earl of Chatham, acknowledged now by all to have been, in energy and wisdom, the first and greatest statesman of all who have figured in the elevated station of Prime Minister of that renowned Empire. His "glorious administration," for so all Englishmen of all parties declare it, had been particularly identified with America. The campaigns of 1758, 59—60 were made under his special directions. It was then that Canada was conquered, and the French power, East of the Missisppi, destroyed. He had marked with emphasis of approbation, the zeal, the courage and liberality of the colonists in support of the war—and when by the unwise counsels of his successors in office, the stamp act had been passed, he was one of the foremost to demand its repeal.

On the 20th of January, 1775, he moved in the House of Lords that an address should be presented to his Majesty From Boston for the purpose of preventing a collision and opening a way to conciliation.

When he arose to speak, all was silence and grofound testering at the state of the control of the purpose of preventing a collision.

When he arcse to speak, all was silence and profound attention. Animated and almost inspired by his subject he seemed to feel his own unrivaled superiority. His venerable figure, dignified and graceful in decay, his language, his voice, his gesture, were such as might at this momentous crisis big with the fate of Britain, seem to characterize him as the guardian of his country.

His knowledge of the Colonies, his remarkable and prophetic foresight, (and he had been a great War Minister,) his glory identified with British supremacy in America,—de him to recommend by all his energy, vigor and eloquence, conciliation.

To remove the British troops from Boston, to repeal all the laws they were sent there to execute, and thus lay the foundation of permanent and lasting interest and friendship, was his plan. He foretoid with certainty the failure of the measures of the Ministry to coerce America, and pleged his character upon the issue. But his admonition and arguments were then unavailing. The Minister persisted in his effort to execute the laws—spent six hundred millions of British treasure, and sacrificed tens of thousands of lives, and in the end was compelled to relinquish British power in America. Had Lord Chatham's advice been followed, how differently would Boston have stood in the page of history. If Lord Chatham's advice, then, should now receive from American statesmen the attention it deserves, and should prove a means of leading us out of our present difficulties, it would accomplish a far more beneficial work to humanity and freedom, than it would had it been adopted by Lord North. Such men are the great teachers of nations, and their wisdomalways pertinent and applicable, to solve political problems.

Mr. Buchanan has followed in part the policy recommended by Lord Chatham, perhaps he has gone as far as he could in the right direction without a Chatham to sustain him in the Senate, or a Burke in the House. Mr. Lincoln, on the other hand, threatens to pursue the policy of Lord North to execute the laws, when there will be none to be executed within the verge of his oath. He seems determined to vindicate the conduct of Lord North, by imitating his misconduct. He probably resembles the noble Lord more than he is aware of. The same irresolute, vacillating purposes, a like fondness tor anecdete, and humorous joking—the coming occupant of the White House will find listeners and flatterefs until his patronage is exhausted, even though he should ruth his country. He is doubless one of a numerous class, obdurate in wrong, persistent in error, careless of consequences, weak in counsel, and inefficient in everything.

The cost of fitting out troops, up to the resent time, to the State of Connecticut including bounty money, provisions, &c., is over six hundred thousand dollars. The war has been inaugurated only about two months. Some of the Republican papers tell us it will last for years. Six hundred thousand dollars for two months would involve an expense of \$3,600,000 a year! The tax-payers of Conecticut have certainly a beautiful bill to foot, even if the war lasts only a year. The question now arises-What is this war for? The Republican papers tell us it is for the extermination of slavery; or, in other words it is a war not to sustain the Constitution, but to sustain a man in power who has trampled upon the Constitution, and is endeavoring to govern this country by the principles laid down in the Chicago Platform. The people of the North should take prompt measures to stop such proceedings. We are fast becom ing bankrupt as a nation. We have got to look the fact in the face by and by; and we had better look it in the face now, than wait until hordes of unprincipled Abolition Republican blood-suckers have filled their poskets. Citizens of Connecticut! facts prove that over one-half of the money thus far spent in this war has gone into the pockets of Abolition Repercan contractors, in the shape of profits. Are you content to sit with folded hands and submit to such infamous outrages any longer? The time for you to show your disapproval of Emperor Lincoln's unconstitutional and plundering acts is now! WEDNESDAY JUNE

The following resolutions, &c., passed—Bill repealing portion of act allowing towns to suspend the operation of the dog law; resolution changing the name of the American Temperance Life Insurance Co. to Fhoniz Munal Life Insurance Co.; resolution repelling the insinuation that the Sanate has given a favorable consideration to the Iowa resolutions; resolution paying Chas. Webster \$20 for expenses of a sick convict in New Haven county jail. Sundry matters referred in concurrence.

Bill forbidding school visitors to prescribe books, &c., against the will of the district; bill providing for filling vacancies in school district committees, rejected.

Besolution raising a committee to procure the return of the resolution appropriating \$20,000 for food for the volunteers, indefinitely pestponed.

Resolution appropriating \$5,000 annually for five years came from the House amended so as to make the appropriation \$4,000, for this year only. Senate insisted on its former vote.

The quartermaster general's report was accepted.
Mr. Converse withdrew his Peace resolutions, and Mr.
Mygatt, a bitter Black Republican and nigger-worshipper,
introduced a series of "milk;and water," pull-wool' resolutions which were tabled and ordered to be printed.

Hartford Courier, rejected.
Bill relating to foreclosure of mortgages on railroads, indefinitely postponed.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 18. House resumed the consideration of the bill taxing depos-lis in savings banks in the town where the depositors reside. A motion was made to indefinitely postpone but lost, and pending the discussion on the bill the House adjourned.

WEDNESDAY JUNE 19.

House proceeded to consider the bill relative to taxation of deposits in savings banks. After a long discussion the question was carried by yeas 126, nays 56.

The Flowage bill came from the Senate verbally amended by requiring damages of 100 per cent to be rendered instead of 50; also giving the contestant of the constitutionality of the bill counsel fees and costs. House concurred with the Senate in the amendments.
