LATER FROM FORT MONROE, &c. NEW YORK, June 24.—Advices from Fort Monroe to June 23, have been received by way of Baltimore. Gen. Butler spent the morning at Newport News, from whence no movements of importance are reported.

Col. Max Webber gave a reception last evening, at Tyler's House. Butler and Pierce, with ladies and staff, were present to hear the Germans sing and witness the performance of the Turners.

Col. Townsend's regiment was on guard duty yesterday, in the direction of Fox Hill. For several nights after the affair at Great Bethel, there was no guard across Hampton Creek.

Reuben Parker, of the Vermont Regiment, who was exchanged last evening for the rebel dragon Cartier, represents that the rebels still have three prisoners belonging to York regiments. It seems that L. W. Clark, of the Third New York Regiment, deserted the night before the affair at Great Bethel, and obtained a citizen's dress from traitors, gave the rebels full information of our movements. He is now in Richmond—the rebels refusing to receive him in their service.

Parker not hearing the order to retreat, was overtaken by the rebels and, in the evening, was marched to Yorktown with the main body of the rebels, and from thence to Richmond, carefully guarded until exchanged. He was well treated.

He reports a large rebel force at Yorktown, every steamer bringing down additional provisions, and the rebel troops badly fed and clothed.

Jeff. Davis was at Richmond last week. A store-house in Richmond containing \$100,000 worth of property was destroyed by fire on Saturday night.

The war steamer Glenoeve was burned to the water's edge. Both fires were the work of incendiary, and the rebels were vainly endeavoring to discover the incendiary.

They now have but two small steamers. LATER FROM HAVANA. NEW YORK, June 24.—The steamers Columbia and De Soto from Havana have arrived with dates to June 20.

The yellow fever had made its appearance at Havana, but not yet among shipping. Five important tours in the interior of St. Domingo had been fortified, and with the assistance of the Haytiens intended to resist Spanish progress there. It is reported that the inhabitants in one village have been massacred by Spanish troops because they refused to swear allegiance to Spain.

It is also reported that the Spanish troops had been defeated in a small engagement. Additional troops were being sent from Havana to reinforce the troops.

At Havana intense excitement exists relative to affairs in the United States. The bark Caroline Ellens of Rockville was lost May 27th, on Folly Reef. Crew saved. Freight better—stock sugar 312,000. De Soto has the mail bags of last steamer Zeldine.

FROM WASHINGTON. WASHINGTON, June 24.—Capt. Brackett, a gallant and experienced officer, commanding four companies of Federal cavalry on the Virginia side of the river, and who has been rendering important and dangerous service there, tendered his resignation several days ago, but promptly withdrew it on being officially informed that orders to move forward, which he had not received, had been sent to his camp, his name did not appear in the list of recent military promotions and appointments.

Great activity at the Navy Yard, attending the furnishing of the new steam frigate Pensacola, which it was supposed would be ready for service in four weeks.

It is said the present available force is over 300,000. There are between 200 and 300 stout or inefficient volunteers, who have been paid off since Friday and sent home.

No dispatches have been received at army headquarters from the Virginia side within the last two days. Affairs in that direction are represented quiet.

FROM BALTIMORE. BALTIMORE, June 24.—A letter from the steamer Pawnee, dated off Acquia Creek the 22d, states that deserters from rebels were picked up in the water after swimming four hours. He says the traitors have a force at the Creek of from 2,000 to 3,000, several rifles cannon and Dahlgren guns.

The Pawnee is keeping at it police night, and captured several small boats.

SOUTH AMERICA. NEW YORK, June 24.—The steamer Ariel from Aspinwall the 16th, has arrived.

The Narragansett arrived at Panama on the 11th. The sloop-of-war Cyane arrived at Acapulco, May 13th.

The Cartagena dates of June 2d state a battle was fought between the forces of Mosquera and Paris, which state the latter victorious, routing the other army of 500.

ARRIVAL OF THE ARIEL. NEW YORK, June 24.—The Ariel has over 200 passengers and \$980,000 in treasure.

The steamer Bremen brought 500 cases of rifles and other arms.

VERMONT REGIMENT. BURLINGTON Vt., 14.—The Second Regt. left at 12:30 this noon. They arrive in New York at 7 to-morrow morning.
