Recently the troops of the Government at Washington were withdrawn from our country leaving it without protection from foreign and domestic foes; and the commanding officer not only refused, when called upon to do so by myself, to furnish the Chickasaws with arms and ammunition for self-defence, but permitted the wanton destruction of such as he could not remove. Under this state of things, troops from Texas (commanded by Gen. W. C. Young) took possession of the forts; and also captured a considerable quantity of public property in the name of the Confederate States, and now hold Forts Washita, Arbuckle, and perhaps Cobb.
