It is easy to see the end. By the necessary course of events, if left to themselves, we must become finally two people. The conflicting elements would burst the Union asunder, as powerful as are the links which hold it together. Abolition and the Union cannot co-exist. As a friend of the Union I proclaim it, and the sooner it is known the better.

NEWS SUMMARY.

In New York, June 27, the Third Avenue Railroad depot was totally destroyed by fire. It was located on the block bounded by Sixtyfifth and Sixty-sixth streets and was a handsome brick edifice of two hundred feet on the avenue and three hundred feet on the cross streets. It was built in 1857, and cost \$170,-000. The horses were saved and all the cars except three. There is an insurance of \$100,000 on the premises and stock. The loss is estimated at about \$125,000.

ANTICIPATED TROUBLE IN TENNESSEE.

ENGAGEMENT AT MATTRIAS POINT WASHINGTON, June 28.-The steamer Pawnee arrived this morning, bringing intelligence from Matthias Point. According to the statements of persons in the expedition, Capt. Ward, of the Freeborn, yesterday obtained from Capt. Round, of the Pawnee, a reinforcement of about twenty men, and united with others from his own vessel, comprising between thirty and forty in all. They started in severel outters for Matthias Point, taking about 250 sand bags on shore, with which breastworks were soon erected, the proceedings being the direction of Lieut. Chaplain. While in the act of returning to the Freeborn for the purpose of obtaining cannon for the battery, a force of rebels estimated at from 800 to 1200, sudeenly emerged from the thick woods and poured a volley of hesty retreat. Several swam to the Freeborn. Capt. Ward protected his men as far fifteen shots among the rebels, with what

effect it is not known. Capt Ward was struck in the breast by a bullet while in the act of firing a gun, and died in about an hour. Wm. J. Bess, s sailor, was wounded in four places, probably mortally. Several others were wounded, among them Jack Williams, coxswain; and the fing he carried was completely riddled. The men reached the vessel without further

Ward's body was brought here by the Pawnee. His remains were placed in a tem. porary deposit, the procession from the Navy Yard with the riddled flag creating an impressive gloom. They will be sent North.

It is said that immediately after the retreat of the Federal forces, the breastworks were occupied by the rebels, and that in formation had been communicated by a nig ger early in the day that rebels were in the eighborhood at least 1,000 strong. The nigger had approached the Federal party, a fugitive, with his shirt on a pole as a flag of truce. He has been brought to Washington quite happy for his escape from the rebels.


