Donevan, of Missouri, and before he was installed President of the United States, to withdraw the troops from Fort Sumter, in order to prevent the possibility of any collision. In addition to myself, Mr. Rives, of Virginia, pictured to him the terrible results of coercive policy, in reply to all of which he lightly remarked "Well, Mr. Rives, if Virginia will stay in the Union, I will withdraw the troops from Fort Sumter." How has he done it? Mr. Holt says that without the slightest provocation on earth, in order to draw out the Border States in order to excite their sympathy, these seven seceded States took Fort Sumter. They bombarded it for two hours, according to him, without receiving a single shot in return; and when they fired the building inside, instead of ceasing they increased the bombard-ment, fearing that if blood was not shed they could not accomplish their object; that blood was neccessary to seal the revolution and to drive the Border States out of the

Now, I desire to make a brief and candid statement, supported by the facts as they exist upon record, in relation to this matter. He states that though money is scarce, there is no lack of substantial food.


