Fu ot been heard and have, until within few days past, been counted as amon e things that were. It may not be n teresting to our readers to review th vill admit. "Mackimoodus," the: India ame of the town, is said to denote heir language, the "rlace of noises. The earliest account of them is containc ugust 15, 1720; Py Re br ston date he first Congregational miven in Haddam. It reads as follows
"As to the noises, I have sumethin quak's have been had (and nowhere bu s, they seem to have their centre rise and origin amiong us) as has been o have been informed that in this place vefure the English settlements, the were great numbersof Indian inhabitants,
and that it was a place of "Indian pow uws or, in short, that it was a place where the Indians drove a prodigon
