

### Financial.

The Boston Board of Trade held a meeting Nov. 5, and adopted several resolutions among which were the following, relating to the cause of the present panic, and means to avoid revulsions in future.

1. That while banks of discount and de posit, if established on sound principles may be multiplted to any extent with advantage to the public, it is advisable that the business of issuing notes payable on demand, should be entirely seperate and distinct from other general banking business and that the power of making and issning paper money should be withdr w from banks whose principal business it is to loan mon-

ey. 2. That the power of furnishing the State with currency should be executed by the State for the benefit of the public at large, and that the profits on the circulation of bank notes should be applied, (after deducting the expenses attendant upon the issue,)towards a reduction of the public **tares** 

3. That in the lieu of the one hundred and eventy-five banks of issue now existing in the State of Massachusetts, each acting for itself and each furnishing its portion of the currency, there should be but one bank ordepartment of issue, managed by directors or commissioners appointed by the State for account of the public, and that

the business of those officers should be confined to the issuing of notes against public securities and gold bullion without any banking or discounting privlages; these to They have professed great admiration of be left where they now are, with the banks and with individuals

4. That in establishing the relative pro tions between the issuing of bank notes, and the securities and bullion held by the issue department for their redemption, the perfect convertibility of the bank note into ecie at all times should be secured beyond s shadow of doubt, which, it is generally edm t.ed, may be done by holding two thirds of undoubted securities and one third of ballion for the amount of notes in circulation. The bank note should be legal tender anywhere, except by the issue of the depart-5. That the banks of discount and de-

posit, instead of issuing their own notes as at present, should be furnished with notes by the departments of issue against a deposit of public securities and bullion in the proportions already mentioned, or such others as may be fixed by law, and that to compensate the banks in part for the loss of the profits on their circulation they should be relieved from the State tax of one per cent on their capital.
