Our County.

Fall off in the Revenue.—The Revenue for the second and third quarters of the current fiscal year, says the Journal of Commerce, have fallen far below all the public estimates. For the quarter ending December 31st the decrease, as compared with the previous year, was \$8,083,002.35, or over fifty per cent.; while for the quarter ending March 31st the decrease, as given in the official tables, was \$12,392,495.21, or about sixty per cent., making a total falling off from July 1st to April 1st, in comparison with the preceding year, of \$21,471,109.11, chiefly during the last two quarters.

Mr E. K. Collins and the Ohio Widow.

—A Washington correspondent of the Times says:

"One of the operations of the lobby here within the past few days has excited a deal of gossip. Collins being considered able to pay for getting his steamship appropriations through, he has been pretty thoroughly beset; but the climax was reached when the widow of a late deceased member of Congress from Ohio presented him with and required his signature to a bond of \$50,000 for services in helping through legislation in his behalf, accompanied by the significant intimation that twenty-seven members were pledged to vote on the Collins appropriations according as she dictated! Collins, of course, demurred to this extravagant demand, but it is supposed he was obliged to come down in something handsome for the extraordinary influence of the female lobby in the person of the Ohio widow. It is said that Collins has this time been a worse victim than ever to the vultures of the lobby, and has been crazed upon and persecuted until he is half crazy."

New Steamers longer than the Leviathan.

While the public attention has been attracted so strongly by the unusual dimensions of the Leviathan that the name of that vessel is in everybody's mouth, it happens singularly enough that two vessels of greater length, and of a more remarkable character have been advancing to completion in Liverpool without the general public being even cognizant of their existence. These vessels are each 700 feet long. They have been constructed by Messrs. Vernon & Son for the Oriental Inland Steam Company and are intended for the navigation of the Indian rivers. The purpose of their peculiar construction is to enable a large cargo to be carried at a good rate of speed upon a light draught of water.

In the Gulf of Paria there is a very singular fish called the Trumpet, which rises to the surface, blows off its music and then descends."

A New Dodge by the Swindlers.

The Mayor Tieman received a letter from a Postmaster in Schoharie county this morning, informing him that he had received a letter from a person calling himself James O. Millrose, stating that he (Millrose) had a package in his possession containing something valuable, which the Postmaster could have by addressing him at the Broadway Post Office, and enclose \$109. The Postmaster, believing the statement transmitted the money enclosed in the letter, and received instead of a valuable bundle a package containing two bricks. It is very probable that in consequence of the effort of Sergeant Birney, in exterminating these rascals in one branch of the trade, that they now intend to defraud every Postmaster in the country by the above means, inasmuch as several hundred of Millrose's circulars have been sent them.

The amount of sugar destroyed by the inundation, in Louisiana, is estimated at 50,000 hogsheads—worth \$3,000,000. The cotton destroyed by the overflow on the banks of the Mississippi, it is said, will be 100,000 bales, whose value would probably be \$4,000,000.

The last account from Havana states that the U. S. steamers Fulton and Sea Witch had been several days in pursuit of British Styx and Buzzard, without falling in with them. A rumor was prevalent that a slaver had been captured on the south side of the island, with 900 slaves.

Public Acts.

PASSED MAY SESSION, 1855. OFFICE OF SECRETARY OF STATE, Hartford, June 19th, 1855.

Publishers of newspapers who insert in their respective journals the public acts of the late session of the General Assembly, are respectfully requested to publish said acts in their numerical order, and to comply strictly with the provisions of the sixth section of 'An Act relating to certain State Officers and to the Treasury Department.'

CHAPTER I. An Act in addition to 'An Act for the Regulation of Civil Actions.'

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened: SEC. 1. That whenever the plaintiff, in any action pending before the superior court, shall withdraw the same within the last three days of any term, without actual notice to the defendant, or his attorney, the defendant in such action may enter his claim for costs within the three first days of the next succeeding term, and the plaintiff shall be liable to pay the legal cost which shall have accrued at the time of the withdrawal of such action.

Approved June 15th, 1855.

CHAPTER II. An Act in addition to 'An Act for the Regulation of Civil Actions.'

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened: SEC. 1. That on the trial of any complaint arising under the acts relating to forcible entry and detainer, the issue shall be tried by the court and not by a jury, except as is hereinafter provided. SEC. 2. If either party to such complaint before issue joined, shall make a motion to the court before whom the same shall be pending, for a jury, such motion shall be granted, and such complaint shall be proceeded with in the same manner as is now by law allowed: Provided, That before said motion shall be allowed, the party making the same shall

become bound to the adverse party, with good and sufficient surety, to answer all costs and damages in case he fail to make his plea good.

SEC. 3. So much of the act relating to forcible entry and detainer as is inconsistent herewith, is hereby repealed. Approved, May 29th, 1855.

CHAPTER III. An Act in addition to 'An Act for the Regulation of Civil Actions.'

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened: SEC. 1. Whenever an appeal shall be taken from the judgment rendered in any case by a justice of the peace for the county of Hartford, the same shall be taken to the next city court to be holden within and for the city of Hartford, provided the cause of action arise within the limits of said city, and one or both the parties live within the same.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the justice of the peace from whose judgment an appeal is so taken, to certify, both upon the original writ and the copy on appeal, that the cause of action arose within the limits of said city, and that one or both the parties live within the same. The justice of the peace making such certificate, shall receive from the party taking out such appeal, in addition to the fees now allowed on appeals from decisions of justices of the peace, the sum of twenty five cents for said certificate, which said sum shall be included in, and form part of, the taxable costs in said suit in said city court, if the party appealing shall prevail in the same.

SEC. 3. The city court for the city of Hartford shall have power to hear and determine such appeals taken as aforesaid, and proceed to final judgment, and grant writs of execution therein, the same as in suits originally brought to said city court. Approved, June 11th, 1855.

CHAPTER IV. An Act in Relation to Banks.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

SEC. 1. Each bank in this State shall keep within such bank at all times, an amount of gold and silver coin or bullion, at least equal to one-tenth of all the circulation and deposits of said bank; but so long as said bank shall redeem its bills at par in New York or Boston, any deposit standing to the credit of such bank in any specie paying bank in New York or Boston, and payable on demand, shall be deemed equivalent to gold and silver coin or bullion, for the purposes of this Act. Provided only, that the amount actually kept in the vault of the bank, shall not be less than one-tenth of the circulation.

SEC. 2. Any bank in this State which does not redeem its bills at par in New York or Boston, shall keep at all times an amount of gold and silver coin or bullion, at least equal to one-fourth of all the circulation and deposits of such bank; and every bank which shall fail to comply with the provisions of the 1st and 2nd sections of this Act, shall forfeit and pay to the Treasurer of this State the sum of one hundred dollars for each week that said provisions shall not be complied with.

SEC. 3. In the statement required by the 6th section of 'An Act relating to Banks,' approved June 30th, 1855, the cashiers of the respective banks shall state the daily average of specie and of specie funds, during the three months last preceding such statement. Approved, June 11, 1855.

CHAPTER V. An Act Relating to Banks.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

SEC. 1. No incorporated bank in this State shall, after the first day of October next, directly or indirectly pay, or agree to pay, any interest upon deposits.

SEC. 2. Any bank whose officers shall knowingly and wilfully violate the provisions of this Act, shall forfeit and pay to the Treasurer of this State, five hundred dollars for each violation. Approved, June 11th, 1855.

CHAPTER VI. An Act Relating to Banks.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

SEC. 1. No incorporated bank in this State shall at any time be indebted by its bills or notes, or have its bills or notes in circulation to an amount exceeding in the aggregate seventy-five per cent. of the amount of the capital stock of such bank actually paid in and unimpaired by losses.

SEC. 2. If any such bank, or the directors or officers of the same, shall knowingly and wilfully violate the provisions of this Act, such bank shall forfeit and pay to the Treasurer of this State the sum of one thousand dollars. Approved, June 16th, 1855.

CHAPTER VII. An Act in Relations to loans to Bank Directors.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

SEC. 1. That no person holding the office of bank director in any bank in this State, shall owe or be indebted to any bank in which he is such director, either as a maker, acceptor, drawer or endorser, or in any manner, to an amount exceeding five per cent. of the capital of said bank actually paid in; provided, that no bank shall permit its directors to become indebted to said bank, either as makers, acceptors, drawers, or endorsers, or in any other manner, to an amount exceeding in the whole, the sum of 20 per cent. on its capital stock actually paid in at any one time.

SEC. 2. Any bank which shall violate the provisions of this Act, shall forfeit and pay to the Treasurer of this State, a sum not less than five hundred or more than one thousand dollars.

SEC. 3. All other Acts or parts of Acts inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed. Approved, June 17th, 1855.

CHAPTER VIII. An Act relating to Banks.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

the judge to make such order, upon application as aforesaid. Approved, June 4th, 1855.

CHAPTER IX. An Act in addition to 'An Act entitled 'An Act concerning Communities and Corporations.'

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

SEC. 1. The Bank Commissioners of this State shall, in the last week in April of each year, present to the Secretary, Treasurer and Comptroller of Public Accounts, a sworn statement in detail of the items of their account for services rendered and expenses incurred in the discharge of their official duties for the year preceding; and it shall be the duty of said Secretary, Treasurer and Comptroller to audit and adjust said accounts; and when so adjusted, said Comptroller shall apportion the sum to be paid by the several Banks, Savings Banks, and Savings and Building Associations, in manner as is now provided by law.

SEC. 1. It shall not be lawful for such Bank Commissioners to demand or receive from any Bank, Savings Bank, or Savings and Building Association, any money or other compensation whatever, for any services rendered or expenses incurred by them in their official capacity, until the account of the items for such services and expenses shall have been presented to and examined and approved by the Secretary, Treasurer and Comptroller of Public Accounts. Approved, June 11th, 1855.

CHAPTER X. An Act relating to Banks.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

Whenever in opinion of the Bank Commissioners, any Bank, Savings Bank, or Savings and Building Association, shall, knowingly and wilfully, violate any provisions of the laws of this State, for the violation of which a penalty is prescribed, it shall be the duty of the Bank Commissioners to bring such violation to the notice of the Attorney for the State, in the County where such Bank is situated; and it shall be the duty of the said Attorney to prosecute for said penalty. Approved, June 11th, 1855.

CHAPTER XI. An Act authorizing Common Council of the City of Hartford to appoint Special Constables.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened: That the mayor of the city of Hartford be, and he hereby is authorized and empowered to appoint not to exceed fifty persons in addition to the present police force in said city, to act as special constables in the city and town of Hartford, during the first three weeks of October 1855; said persons so appointed, and all sheriffs and special constables of said city then in office, shall have and exercise, during the term aforesaid, all the powers and duties of constables within the limits of said town. Approved, June 16th, 1855.

CHAPTER XII. An Act to amend the Charter of the City of New London.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

SEC. 1. The Judge and Clerk of the Police Court for the City of New London shall be, and are hereby constituted the Judge, and Clerk of the City Court for said city, and shall be and constitute the City Court for said city; and, in addition to the powers now conferred upon them by law, shall have the same jurisdiction and powers, and perform all the duties which the Mayor and the two Aldermen first chosen, now have and perform; and all suits which may now be brought and tried before the City Court, composed of the Mayor and the two Aldermen first chosen, may hereafter be brought and tried before the City Court established by this Act; and all the powers and authority of said City Court now composed of the Mayor and the two Aldermen first chosen, are hereby transferred and granted to the City Court established by this Act.

SEC. 2. Whenever the Judge of the City Court constituted by this Act, shall be legally disqualified to act in any matter pending in said Court, and the parties or their attorneys shall not waive all objections to his acting therein as is hereinafter provided, any two Justices of the Peace residing in said city, may be designated and notified by the Clerk of said Court, and may hear and determine said matter, and shall for that purpose constitute the City Court for said city.

SEC. 3. The Judge of the City Court constituted by this Act, may act in any matter pending in said City Court in which he may be legally disqualified, if the parties thereto, or their attorneys, by agreement, in writing filed with said Clerk, waive all objection to his acting therein.

SEC. 4. This Act shall not take effect until the same shall be accepted by said City of New London, in a city meeting warned and held for that purpose. Approved, June 10th, 1855.
