graphical Map of Connecticut, have been
completed, and that the new Map will be
ready for distribution in Litchfield County
in the course of a few months. This map
has been drawn from actual Survey and In-
strumental measurement of the whole Terri-
tory, and is based on the Triangulation
Latitude and Longitude of the United
States Coast Survey. It is now a little
more than half a century since the last Sur-
vey of the State was made previous to this,
and the publishers have for this reason
shown the State very minutely. The map is
drawn on the large scale of 1 1/2 miles to
the inch, and shows all the roads in the
State and the proper location of the houses,
giving the names of the Churches, Schools,
Manufacturing Establishments, Rail Road
Stations, and the Public Buildings of all
kinds. The R. Roads, Rivers, Lakes and
Mountains, and general Topography of the
County will be carefully shown. The Map
will be published wholly by subscription and
Mr. James G. Bauder, one of the Publi-

County, and will call upon the citizens and
give them an opportunity to examine the

MEASLES.—This disease prevails exten-
sively in cities during the winter season,
will usually cure itself, if only protected
against adverse influences. The older per-
sons are, the less likely they are to recover
perfectly from this ailment, for it very often
leaves some life-long malady behind it. The
most hopeless forms of consumptive disease
are often the result of ill conduct or badly
managed measles. In nine cases out of
ten, not a particle of any medicine is needed.

Our first advice is, always, and under
all circumstances, send at once for an ex-
perienced physician. Meanwhile keep the
patient in a cool, dry, and well aired room,
with moderate covering, in a position where
there will be no exposure to drafts of air.—
The thermometer should range at about six-
ty-five degrees, where the bed stands, which
should be moderately hard, of slued, straw
or curled hair. Graffly the instinct for cold
water and lemonade. It is safest to keep
the bed for several days after the rash has
been to die away. The diet should be light
and of an opening, cooling character.

The main object of this article is to warn
persons that the greatest danger is after the
disappearance of the measles. We would
advise that for three weeks after the
patient is well enough to leave his bed he
should not go out of the house, nor stand or
sit for a single minute by an open window
or door, nor wash any part of the person in
cold water or warm, but to wipe the face and
hands with a warm, damp cloth. For a
good part of this time the appetite should
not be wholly gratified; the patient should
eat slowly of light nutritious food. In one
case, a little child, almost entirely well of
the measles, got to playing with his hands
in cold water; it gradually dwindled away
and died. All exercise should be moderate
in order to prevent cooling off too quickly
afterward, and to save the danger of ex-
posure to drafts of air, which by chilling the
surface, causes chronic diarrhoea if it falls on
the bowels, deafness for life, if it falls on
the ear, or insupportable consumption if it falls
on the lungs.—Hall's Journal of Health.

Singular Fulfillment of a Dream.

The English papers report the pro-
ceedings of an inquest held at Shef-
field, on the body of Mr. Charles
Holmes, button manufacturer, Clough
House Lane, who had been found
drowned in the Lead Mill Dams, in
that town. Deceased left his home
on Saturday night, in company with
his wife. They walked through the
town together, and about nine o'clock,
he said to her, "I'm going to leave
thee here, Fanny." She said "Are
you?" and he replied, "Yes, I want
to see an old friend who is going to
Birmingham on Monday, and he is to
be here." She said to him, "Well,
Charlie, don't stop long, because I do
feel queer about that dream;"
and he replied, "Oh, don't say that;
I'll just have a glass and then come
home. Go and get the supper ready,
and I'll come directly." She then
left him. When he got into the
house he was invited to drink with
his friend, but he exhibited some re-
luctance, saying that on the night
before his wife had dreamed that she
saw him dead in a public house, and
that she had dreamed a similar dream
about a week before. Unfortunately,
however, he yielded to the tempta-
tion, got drunk, and did not leave the
public house till after twelve. He
was accompanied part of the way
home by his friend, and was never
afterwards seen alive. Near his house
are the Lead Mill Dams, and in con-
sequence of his not returning home,
his wife felt convinced that he had
fallen in and got drowned. A search
was made, and on Monday morning
his body was found in the water.

Mesmerism.

Mr. Seydel having planted in a box
two rose-trees of the same species
and similar size, and each three years
old, and having placed them in a wit-
dow with a southern aspect, he mes-
merized one of them every day, and
watered it with mesmerized water;
the other was not mesmerized, and
was watered with ordinary water.—
At the end of three weeks the mes-
merized rose-tree had eighteen fine
roses, and greatly exceeded its neigh-
bor in size and vigor; upon the other
tree only few partly-opened buds
were to be seen. The same mesme-
rized made a similar experiment upon
two nightshades which had been
planted at the same time in the same
mould and in the similar aspect to
that of the rose-trees. Seeing that
one of these appeared drooping and
backward, while the other was in vig-
orous health, he immediately began
to mesmerize the sickly plant by
means of mesmerized water, and as
directly, while the other plant was
watered with common water only.—
At the end of a fortnight Mr. Seydel
saw with satisfaction that the for-
merly drooping night-shade had
grown to the height of eighteen
inches, while the other was only ten
inches high; the roots of the former
were found to be four inches long,
while that of the latter was only two
inches. Lastly, the flowers of the
night-shade which had not been mes-
merized were far from being as nu-
merous and having as fine a color as
those of the plant which had been so
treated. Another instance of the
effect of mesmerism on plants is that
of two geraniums, one of which was
withered, and had never more than
one single leaf, which was no sooner
formed than it fell off while the other
plant was constantly green and
vigorous. The withering plant was
mesmerized, and after a few days it
had several leaves, and moreover it
produced flowers sooner than the
other which had not been sickly.

Vegetation on the Moon's Surface.

On the surface of the moon are
seen numerous streaks, or narrow
lines about a hundred in number,
which appear, perhaps, more like
long narrow furrows than anything
else. Sometimes they spread them-
selves on the lunar disc in straight
lines, sometimes they are seen slight-
ly curved; in every case they are
shut in between the stiff parallel
borders. It has often been supposed
that these furrows, the true nature
of which has remained hitherto un-
known, represent the beds of ancient
dried-up rivers, or rivers that have
now ceased to flow. Other astron-
omers think that they are streams of
lava which have been vomited by
lunar volcanoes, and which reflect
the rays of the sun with more inten-
sity than the adjacent regions. M.
Schwabe, a German astronomer, en-
deavors, however, to give them
another explanation. He has pub-
lished in the *Astronomische Nachrichten*
some facts which tend to show
that these lines are the surface

Special Dispatch to The N. Y. Tribune. WASHINGTON, April 3, 1860. THE ADMINISTRATION CORRUPTION. Mr. Augustus Schell appeared before Mr. Covode's Committee to-day, and refused distinctly to produce the list of contributors to the electioneering fund raised by the New York State Committee, without assigning any sufficiently satisfactory reason. He was asked by Mr. Covode whether he did not confer with the President and members of the Cabinet, between the period of his first examination, when he admitted having this list among his papers, and expressed a willingness to submit it, and the second examination next day, when he proposed a written substitute for his testimony of the first day, declining to deliver that paper.

He endeavored to evade this inquiry by stating that he had seen many persons between those two days. But when pressed directly, he said he had seen the President and members of the Cabinet, and it was after conference with them that he concluded not to exhibit the list to the Committee. This admission proves that witnesses, holding appointments under the President, are tampered with pending their examination and required to square their testimony to suit the necessities of him and his Cabinet. No other commentary on his recent Message is necessary after such development. The object of confining the investigation within technical limits and protesting against a full inquiry is now transparent. The Committee will meet again tomorrow for the purpose of taking the necessary steps to bring this matter before the House, in order to compel Mr. Schell to produce the paper in question.
