The New Topographical Map of Conn.

The undersigned would say to the people  
of this part of the State, that the Surveys  
and Engraving preparatory to the new Topo-  
graphical Map of Connecticut, have been  
completed, and that the new Map will be  
ready for distribution in Litchfield County  
in the course of a few months. This map  
has been drawn from actual Survey and In-  
strumental measurement of the whole Ter-  
ritory, and is based on the Triangulation  
Latitude, and Longitude of the United  
States Coast Survey. It is now a little  
more than half a century since the last Survey  
of the State was made previous to this,  
and the publishers have for this reason  
shown the State very minutely. The map  
is drawn on the large scale of 1 1/2 miles to  
the inch, and shows all the roads in the  
State, and the proper location of the towns,  
giving the names of the Churches, Schools,  
Manufacturing Establishments, Rail Road  
Stations, and the Public Buildings of all  
kinds. The R. Roads, Rivers, Lakes and  
Mountains, and general Topography of the  
Country will be carefully shown. The Map  
will be published wholly by subscription and  
Mr. James G. Bauder, one of the Pub-  
lisher's agents, is now taking orders for the  
work in the northern towns of Litchfield  
County, and will call upon the citizens and  
give them an opportunity to examine the  
work for themselves, and judge of its merits,  
when all who would like the work will  
do well to order it, as the Map will not be  
in the market afterwards.

Canaan Republican Club.

During last March the Republicans of Canaan, thought best to form a club and organize for the State and National campaign; accordingly a meeting was called, and a club was formed, which proved a rallying point for those desirous of aiding the Republican cause, and which united more perfectly than ever before the party. This concert of action may safely be given as the reason for the reduced Democratic majority last Monday in this town, and would the Republicans see as good or better results next November, they must continue to work from now till that time, keep what vantage ground they have, and put a step forward whenever an opportunity offers.

That all may know the objects of the club, we publish below the preamble and resolutions, upon which it proposes to base all its political action.

[PREAMBLE]

Whereas the present condition of our country demands the energetic action of all true Republicans, in behalf of Free Speech Free Labor, Free Territory, Free Homes, a Protective Tariff, and National Union and Harmony; and in opposition to Sectionalism, Slavery Extension, and centralization of Power, therefore we as National citizens do form ourselves into an Association to be called the National Republican Club of Canaan Ct., and adopt the following resolutions expressive of the principles that guide our action during the present Presidential campaign.

Res. That freedom of Speech and of the Press, are essential to Republican institutions.

Res. That Congress has full Constitutional power to prohibit slavery in the Territories belonging to the United States, by Legislative enactments, and that it is the duty of all citizens to promote such men to office as will secure such strict and positive laws as to effectually shut out slavery from every portion of the territories.

Res. That the recent efforts of our Republican representatives in Congress, to secure land for the landless, and free homes for all, meet our hearty approval.

Res. That the interest of our laboring citizens, Native and Foreign, demands such protection as shall enable Americans to compete successfully with Foreign labor.

Res. That we deem National Union and Harmony, as essential to the perpetuity of the Heritage bequeathed to us by our Fathers.

Res. That we as an organization will use all honorable endeavors to make the above resolutions effectual in promoting the objects therein named, and in opposing all sectionalism, slavery extension, and centralization of power.

School District No. 2.

The Commissioners appointed upon a petition of certain members of that District for the purpose of enlarging the present site by taking land of J. H. Chase, and Lyman Wickham, met last Monday to decide the matter.

By the advice of counsel the case was compromised and settled in a similar manner to that made by the Board of School Visitors in 1858. Only by the present arrangement the house has to be moved now and by that it was to be moved at some convenient time Land east of the house is to be taken, and the house moved upon it, so that the Dist. can pass around the house upon their own land, the Dist. furnishing the foundation, and Mr. Chase moving the house upon it. This arrangement settles the school house trouble, and is a good job for the Dist.; but there is a large bill of costs for the petitioners or the Dist. to settle and many sore feelings to heal, which would have been avoided had the District carried out their acceptance of the Board's doings in 1858.

In regard to the public money trouble we shall conform to several requests that have been made, and give a full exposition of it in next, or some future paper. Simply promising here that an impression appears to have been had in some high places that the difficulty was a political one, that the town and board of visitors being Democratic, were determined to oppress the poor Republicans of Canaan. This idea was thrown out to us in New Britain last year, and another person says the clerk in one of the State Department plainly told him the same thing.

To give plausibility to the above, it has been freely circulated that C. B. Mathie, the only Republican in the board of visitors, is not a Republican, but "more a Democrat" and that the board have acted through malice. All the above is as false as false can be. There has not been the least encumbrance upon the dist. on account of political feelings, nor has there been town-wise any political action in the matter; and in regard to the charge upon us, all we have to say is that it is made, and has been from the first through personal malice; and is as false a statement as the father of lies could invent. Of the present attempt by our State Officers to withhold the public money from the eight districts that have kept school according to law, on account of the trouble in dist. No. 2, and thereby punish the innocent for the sins of others, of their correspondence upon the point, and of the law that applies to the case, we shall speak hereafter.

**Fire.**—The house of Mr. Henry Beecher, on Canaan Mountain was destroyed by fire last Sunday evening with nearly all the furniture and property within it, which proved quite a loss to Mr. Beecher, as he had a large lot of Blackberry wine in the cellar. It is supposed the house caught fire from a sash near the house. The loss must be some \$1,500.

Rev. Dr. Richards of Litchfield is about commencing a libel suit against the publishers of the New York Independent. He says that slander has gone far enough, and that it is now time for truth to begin.

The Election.

The Hero of Chepultepec Vanquished!

Once again has Republicanism proved victorious in Connecticut, and if as often during the past three months been said, that as went Connecticut, so went the Union" it is to be, then may Republicans bless their lucky stars and take courage.

This dark and brightened portion of the State, has this year thrown rays of light upon some other sections to the extent, that will induce our friends, in future, to hope to look upon us with a little more favor and render us a little more help than heretofore.

Canaan, the 17th district and Litchfield County, have all this year given better returns than the most sanguine expected, and had other parts of the State did as well, Gov. Buckingham would have had a majority of 5000.

The Senate consists of 14 Republicans to 7 Democrats—1 Republican gain from last year.

The new House consists of 147 Republicans and 87 Democrats. Last year, 126 to 109.

Canaan made a gain from last year of 62, upon the State Ticket and of 64 upon the vote for Representative; this does well enough for one year and we can justly claim for her the banner.

Kent upon the State Ticket made a gain of 35 upon last year, and gave the candidate for Senator 90 majority.
