Falls Village.—The Ladies Festival of the M. E. Church, came off last week on Thursday evening, it was well attended. The receipts were fair.

The Rev. C. S. Brown, Pastor of the M. E. Church, preached his Farewell sermon last Sunday, and has left for Conference.

Two children that have suffered for several weeks from the effects of Scarlet Fever died last Sunday evening, and the funerals were attended at the same hour last Tuesday. The services being performed by the Rev. C. S. Brown, at an hour previous to his leaving and the last to the charge he has so faithfully attended for the past two years.

F. V. Lecum.—The closing lecture of the season was to have come off last Tuesday evening, but for some unexplained reason the lecturer did not appear, therefore an adjournment was had till the second Tuesday of October next for the purpose of arranging for the next seasons course. The past course has been quite successful and we may now consider this intellectual feature of our village as permanently established and with a prospect of becoming more and more interesting as they increase in number.

S. D. Northway.—This gentleman who so suddenly disappeared last February returned on the 6th inst. He has been to Kansas as was supposed, and returned voluntarily. He denies that he owes the company \$6,000 as was reported and says that this charge brought him home. He thinks that he can show the company to be able to pay all their debts although they lost largely last year by the fall in the price of leather.—The only reason we hear, his giving, for leaving is that he had for a long time been harassed by the debts of the company which he had to carry through the banks, the stockholders being unwilling to increase the capital stock of the company. He says no one shall suffer by him or the company if he can help it. It is reported that he has invested the funds carried away in Kansas, but of the truth of the report we know not. Also that he regrets the singular step he took in leaving as he did and that he amends so far as possible he returns to see justice done to his and the company's creditors. This so far speaks well for him and probably in due time a more full and satisfactory explanation will be given, at least we hope so.

North Canaan.—The North Canaan Seminary closed its winter term on Thursday, the 5th inst. Notwithstanding the commencement last fall was so unfavorable, the result has proved highly satisfactory, and the great credit is due Mr. Pierce as Principal, and Miss Fitch, as assistant, for their energy and untiring efforts, in improving those placed under their charge in morals as well as intellect. The community has felt for a long time, the need of advantages for education that the common district school does not afford and this which was started as an experiment has proved a perfect success; and we are confident that the enterprise of the people of North Canaan, with Mr. Pierce as Principal, will make this one of the first of the kind in the country. The number of scholars has been a little over six hundred during the winter and with a little effort, doubtless could have been considerably increased. Miss Fitch, an accomplished teacher from Sheffield has been employed as assistant and she has had the more particular oversight of the young ladies. If any wish to send their sons or daughters to school, to be thoroughly instructed in those branches usually taught in academies, they will do well to improve the opportunity offered here.

CONNECTICUT.

HOW THEY ALMOST DID IT. Correspondence of the N. Y. Tribune.

HARTFORD, April 5, 1860.

You may be surprised at the small majority obtained by us over the Sham Democracy on Monday last. I will not, therefore, say a word in explanation. We knew the Slams were using money freely, but we supposed they were making a struggle to carry the close towns, and secure one branch of the Legislature, or both branches, rather than to make any great gain in the general vote. We had never known any great frauds in the elections of Connecticut, therefore, we supposed the vote for Governor would depend upon the freeman of the State, even though some of them might be bribed to vote against their views of right and justice. We knew that if the Administration party covered the entire surface of the State with gold, it could not induce our voters to give Buckingham less than 2,500 majority, and we confidently anticipated a majority of three to four thousand.

But it now seems a plan was laid to take the election out of the hands of Connecticut freemen, and put it into the hands of imported instruments from New York.

This was the plan: We have a Registry Law, but our Board of Selectmen in each town, can admit any man to vote, by ordering him registered even on the day of election. Moreover, any man who was ever a voter in Connecticut can vote wherever he happens to be on election day, provided he shows a certificate from the Town Clerk of the town where he was made an elector, in proof of his being a freeman. On the register, or voting-list, in each of our cities and larger towns are found, of course, the names of many absentees, and some dead men.—Our Town Clerks of course will furnish, as a copy of record, a certificate of electorship for any one made a freeman at any time within the past twenty years or more. In this way the door is open for great fraud, for instance, a Sham Democrat from New Haven sends to Hartford and procured from the Town Clerk here, certificates in favor of 200 men made electors at different times in by-gone years. Fernandez then brings from

New York 200 men, who take each a certificate and present themselves at the New Haven polls as the freemen made in Hartford, according to the record. Again, on election day, the Slams look over the Voting List, and find names of 50 absentees and dead Irishmen. They bring up 50 of Wood's men to vote on their names; no questions being asked, ordinarily, and it being difficult to identify any of them or to disapprove identity in the bustle of election day.

Wood passed the Sabbath before election in New Haven. It is said that a perfect rush of men came up by the steamboats on Saturday night and Sunday morning, and on election day the vote of New Haven was larger by 1,671 than a year ago. When our Congressmen were elected, and great effort was made, and successfully, to get out a full vote. On Tuesday morning, I hear, some 300 Irishmen left New Haven for New York, doing business rickably in your city, and coming to their country seats to take part in the exciting contest of Monday.

In the little town of Meriden 141 of these certificate votes were cast; and when the polls closed in this city on Monday eve, a crowd of Irishmen were standing about the Selectmen waiting to be registered, the Board having engaged in that work all day, although they had been in session most of the time for a week before to attend to this. A Democrat said to me on Tuesday, that had Fernando Wood known how many votes were needed to defeat Buckingham, he had no doubt he could have as easily elected Seymour as not. It was thought that if Buckingham's majority of last year was overcome, the State would be sure against the Republicans. But no, the country towns, where the people live, so increased the Republican vote that Buckingham is elected in spite of great frauds.

Last year our Republican vote was 40,239, this year 43,960; and yet our majority is cut down from 1,800 to 600. Our Legislature will probably, this Spring pass laws restricting the certificate voting, and demanding registration of voters some days before election. In the Presidential contest we shall doubtless have a more honest vote.

We feel here as if the triumph of Republicanism is owing to a direct interposition of Providence, for had not the Slams made an error in their figures, they would have overpowered us.

Mr. E. W. Spurr, is continually importing, to keep up with the demands for groceries, flour, lumber &c. The business facilities of the above gentleman, commends him to the trade, for good goods, good bargains, and good pay.

B. C. Newton and Miss Luddington of Hartford were thrown from a carriage by the horse taking flight Friday evening, and Mr. Newton was seriously if not fatally injured. Miss Luddington escaped with but very slight injury.

J. M. Case, a workman in Sharp's rifle factory, at Hartford, in fulfillment of a bet on the election, amused his friends on Friday by wheeling a barrel of crackers from the State House in Hartford to the State Prison in Wethersfield, and back; time 1:10 and 1:15, distance a little over three miles each way.

The Union Agricultural Society.

This Society has adopted the following Bye Laws and Regulations:

BY LAWS.

Art. 1st.—The annual meeting of Union Agricultural Society, shall be held at Falls Village, Conn., on the third Thursday of December of each year, for the election of officers, appointment of judges, standing committees and the transaction of other business properly brought before the society.

Art. 2d.—The Executive Committee shall be elected by ballot and have power to fill all vacancies occurring in the board.

Art. 3d.—A Committee of two from each town represented in the society shall be appointed at the annual meeting to confer with the executive in the appointment of judges and making out premium lists.

Art. 4th.—Every member of the society shall have free admission to the Fair Grounds with every proper member of his family under 21 years of age.

Art. 5th.—The admission fee for all persons other than members shall be 15 cents each admission, and the admission fee for carriages other than those of members, 15 cents each admission.

Art. 6th.—The Society will in no case pay in premiums more than the receipts of any annual fair, over and above the expenses, but in case the receipts shall not be enough to pay the premiums in full then they shall be paid by proportionate dividends.

Art. 7th.—No premium shall be awarded when the animal or article is judged unworthy, nor any article or animal take two premiums, or any animal but one first premium before maturity.

Art. 8th.—Exhibitors will be required to make out in writing a list of animals and articles to be entered for premiums and hand the same to the secretary upon entering them.

Art. 9th.—No animal or article entered for premiums shall be removed before the close of the Fair without the consent of the Executive Committee.

Art. 10th.—Persons entering for premiums on summer field crops must inform the secretary previous to July 1st and those on fall field crops before Sept. 1st.

Art. 11th.—Authentic pedigree of blood stock will be required.

Art. 12.—Entries for premiums on farms or reclaimed land must be forwarded to the secretary on or before the first day of August.

Art. 13th.—Superintendents of the several departments shall be appointed by the Executive Committee to care for such departments during the Fair.

REGULATIONS.

Art. 1st.—The Treasurer of the society shall have his office near the entrance to the grounds, and with such assistants as he may need, to be employed by himself, shall sell all tickets for admission at the prices required by the By Laws.

Art. 2d.—The Corresponding Secretary shall have an office near the gate to receive all applications for entries and give tickets for the same.

Art. 3d.—The gate keepers shall admit none but the officers of the society without tickets shall receive all tickets and transmit the same to the Recording Secretary.

Art. 4th.—The sub executive committee shall have power to adopt such measures, form such programs for each day of the fair, and make such appointments in the several departments as they may deem proper, and not otherwise provided for.

Art. 5th.—The chief Marshall shall with his deputies help to carry out the general orders of the sub executive committee and keep order on the fair grounds. The deputies to be under the chief Marshall and required to take such positions as he shall assign them.

Art. 6th.—The superintendents of the several departments will be required to receive from the corresponding secretary's office the tickets for entries, each for his own department place the animal or article to which they belong and show the exhibitor where to place his animal or article, conduct the judges appointed for their departments through them, see that there is no interference with the judges in the performance of their duty and see that all articles committed to their particular departments are properly cared for and protected from injury.

Art. 7th.—A police force shall be appointed and employed by the superintendents to aid in protecting the property under their charge.

Art. 8th.—All distinguished visitors or delegates from other societies shall be escorted by the marshal or other gentleman to the president and officers of the society whose duty it shall be to extend to them suitable hospitalities.

Art. 9th.—Oxen shall be considered mature at 5 years of age, cows at 5 years of age and Horses at 5 years of age.

Art. 10th.—All animals entered for premiums must be owned by the exhibitor three months next previous to the exhibition.

Recent meetings of the executive and town committees have reviewed, and adopted the premium list for this year's Cattle Show and Fair and also appointed the various Judges all of which will be published soon. The last meeting of the society adopted the following resolution:

Resolved That in the opinion of this society the cause of agriculture requires that the usual appropriation from the State Treasury be made to the State Agricultural Society.
