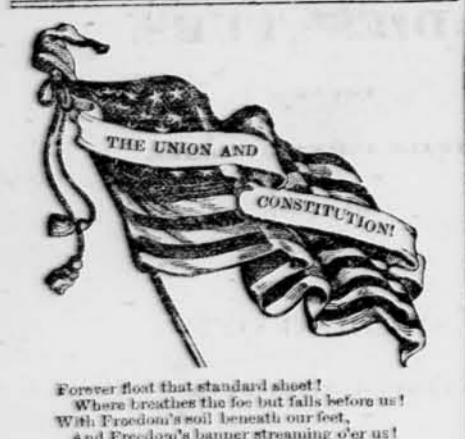

From Our Correspondent of the 11th Reg. INFANTRY, N. Y.
Messrs. Editors: In my previous letter, I gave you an account of the most important incidents connected with our passage from your city to Annapolis; this will embrace events from Annapolis to this place.

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Death of Professor Larned.
Many friends and acquaintances of our esteemed fellow citizen, Professor William A. Larned, were greatly shocked and grieved with the intelligence of his sudden death, which occurred last evening. He had been out on his accustomed daily walk, and it appears fell in a fit near the Canal railroad, in the vicinity of the city cemetery. He was discovered, though slightly covered by the falling snow, by three men who were passing, and was put into a hearse and brought into Church street, when he was immediately recognized, and taken to his residence at St. John's block, corner of Elm and Church streets. Drs. Bishop and Townsend were immediately in attendance, but all their efforts to save the life of their patient failed, and he expired at about 6 o'clock. His disease was doubtless apoplexy. He had complained of a pain in his head for some days previous, but was supposed to be recovering. He was fifty-four years of age, and had been connected with Yale College nearly a quarter of a century. He was Professor of Rhetoric and English Literature, was greatly respected for his qualities as a teacher and as a citizen. In every thing that tended to advance the moral and intellectual good of the students, and of the community, he was ever among the first and the most enthusiastic. His original profession was that of a clergyman of the Congregational Church. The suddenness of his death enhances the affliction.
