

Too Much Grumbling.

We are a fast people-nothing suits us unless done in a fast way-we think fast, work fast make money fast, lose it fast, and become dissatisfied with every body and every thing that characteristic is exhibited most clearly in the feeling which exists in relation to the manage ment of the war. Because its progress doe not come quite up to our standard of rapidity, we grow morose, dissatisfied, and indulge in the loudest kind of grumbling. We constitute ourselves the judges of the way and manner in which it should be conducted, and the shortest possible time in which rebellion can be subdued, and then put the administration and all the military authorities on trial for neglect of duty in failing to satisfy us.

This is all wrong. We do not object to prope criticism, but what we want is more patriotism more confidence, and less grumbling, less doubting. We need the high purpose, the patience, the unwavering confidence in the ultimate suc cess of right principles, that distinguished ou The present spirit of fault finding would have driven Washington from the cor mand of the army before the war of the revo lution was half fought. Nothing is now doing so much to embarcass the President and our generals as the continual, persistent, fault-finding of the people. Nothing would so surely placed in the hands of the Committee on Litend to bring the war to a speedy and successful end, as an earnest, whole-souled disposition to sustain the Government in their own way prosecuting it.

Upon the President and his Cabinet is cast the responsibility of this conflict. To them confided its management. We had confidence in them once: we still have, and now let u manifest it. Can we in our easy chairs at home determine better how the war should be con ducted than Lincoln and McClellan, whose duty it is to do it? Is not all this carping-the ex istence of which it is useless to deny -calculated to encourage our enemies, and diminish our own patriotism? Is it not paving the way for a dis honorable peace? And have not we all uncon sciously fallen into this frame of mind by tak ing our cue from the traitors at home, who seek by grumbling, and doubting, and fault finding, to weaken our loyalty, and furnish the rebels an element of strength at the North? Isn't it quite time for a reform in this matter? Has not our Government, in fact, accomplished wonders? Has it not done more than we could expect? and now that all things are nearly ready. can we not wait with patience for the final blow

Let us then sustain the Government, not with a weak, hesitating, doubting adherance, but ter-sheds with cheerful, trusting hearts, with open hands and strong arms. Let us cease mourning and bewailing our condition, and cherish hope, confidence in our final success, and above all faith in the God of battles.


