The following is an abstract of the tax bill reported on Monday. It provides for the appointment by the President of a commission of internal revenue, with a salary of five thousand dollars per annum, his office to be in the Treesury Department, with a suitable number of clerks. The country is to be divided as the President may direct, into convenient collection

The bill provides for a duty on spirituous li quors of 15 cents per gallon; ale and beer \$1 per barrel; stem or leaf tobacco, 3 cents per pound, to add when manufactured, 3 cents, and on cigars, 5, 10 and 20 cents per pound, ac-cording to value. On lard and linseed oil. thousand feet, 25 cents; bank note paper, 5 cents per pound; printing paper, 3 mills per pound; soap, 5 mills per pound; salt, 4 cents per one hundred pounds; sole leather, 1 cent per pound; upper leather, one-half cent per pound; flour, 10 cents per barrel; all other manufactures 3 per cent, advalorem.

The Spring Election.

Appearances indicate a sweeping majority for the State ticket nominated by the Union and Republican conventions. As to the Legislature, there can be no doubt that both houses will be of the same character, if the loyal citizens of the State will contemplate the issue before them in the comprehensive and patriotic spirit which the occasion demands. The times demand a sacrifice of feeling, personal and party, more than ever before. Faithfulness to our party and to our State, when only they are in controversy, is a virtue; but when greater interests are in peril, it is equally a virtue to yield, if need be, the lesser to the greater concerns. The national existence has been in imminent peril, and partizans of every shade of prejudice have been called upon to forget all past differences and rally to the support of the constitu-

In this State there has been a response to this call, and a State ticket has been put in nomination by democrats and republicans. The good faith of both parties adopting this nomination is fairly pledged to its support at the polls. It is therefore with deep regret that we see any dissent by any of our republican friends approved by the Common Council, viz: liberation. Whether it was wise to do so the beginning, is not the question. We think it was. Others may think not; but that is not now the question. We have done it, and now let us abide in good faith by our own pledges. This we believe the loyal people of the State

There never was a time since the adoption of the constitution when the true friends of the republic were more earnestly called upon to yield property, party, life itself, as they are now called upon in defence of their government. A long list of democrats have thrown their swords, their voices, their efforts, their votes upon the side of the government. Not courtesy merely, but self-interest, loyalty, the liberty and prosperity of generations yet to come, all call upon the republicans to yield as much in support of the same cause, and they will do it. Why should not all of them do it?

The platform upon which the voters in the coming election are invited to stand, is not the republican platform. The republican convention did not set forth any party tenets. Let us then all rally as earnest men, who feel that we are not engaged in a mere party strife; but in something higher, nobler, holier and more enduring in its consequences than any mere party struggle.

Rebel Madness.

It will be an act of mercy to the South, nay, to the whole country, to close this rebellion as soon as possible. The leading rebels, disappointed in their endeavors to force the United States to consent to their treasonable acts, have initiated a system of destruction that is horrible to contemplate. The ruin by fire of a whole town, like that of Columbus, is a notable instance of the madness which possesses these men. The entire population of a place compelled to submit to the wanton destruction of their dwellings, and all that renders life en dearing, is indeed pitiable.
