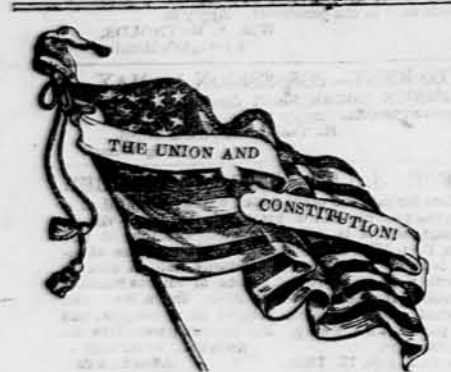

From Washington.

There has been no action of the House Committee on Foreign Affairs on the subject of the recognition of Liberia and Hayti.

The following is an abstract of the tax bill reported on Monday. It provides for the appointment by the President of a commission of internal revenue, with a salary of five thousand dollars per annum, his office to be in the Treasury Department, with a suitable number of clerks.

The bill provides for a duty on spirituous liquors of 15 cents per gallon; ale and beer \$1 per barrel; stem or leaf tobacco, 3 cents per pound, to add when manufactured, 3 cents, and cigars, 5, 10 and 20 cents per pound, according to value.

On slaughtered cattle, 50 cents each; hogs, 10 cents each; sheep, 5 cents each; licenses for bankers, \$100; auctioneers, \$20; wholesale dealers, \$50; retail dealers in liquors, \$20; retail dealers in goods, \$10; pawnbrokers, \$50; rectifiers, \$100; brewers, \$50; hotels, inns and taverns, graduated according to rental, \$10 to \$200; eating houses, \$10; commercial brokers, \$50; other brokers, \$30; theater, \$100; circuses, \$50; bowling alleys \$5 each alley; wholesale peddlers, \$50; other peddlers, from \$5 to \$20; coal oil distillers, \$20; income, 3 per cent on all over \$600, exclusive of the income derived from dividends, etc., which are taxed separately; railroad bonds and dividends of banks and saving institutions, 3 per cent.

Payments of all salaries of officers in the civil, military or naval service in the United States, including Senators and Members of Congress, 3 per cent; legacies and distributive shares of personal property of deceased persons, from 1 to 5 per cent, according to the degrees of relationship; and stamp duties on all kinds of legal and commercial papers, all patent medicines, telegraphic messages, and all goods by express.

The tax bill contains one hundred and five sections, and is one of the largest of any kind ever before prepared, and on which months of time have been bestowed.

Tennessee News.

A municipal election occurred at Nashville on Saturday, which passed off quietly. The retiring Mayor issued a proclamation, assuring the citizens of protection by the Federal troops, if they should quietly pursue their accustomed avocations.

Several rebels have been brought to Nashville as prisoners. Twenty-five negroes, who were seized by the rebels in the vicinity of Bowling Green, have been sent back.

General mail accommodation is established to Bowling Green, and will be continued to Nashville in a few days, by the energetic agents of the Post Office Department.

The gunboat Lexington had an engagement with a rebel battery at Savannah, Tennessee, a few days since.

Reports from Nashville and Columbus. The Memphis Appeal of the 28th ult., has the following:—"We have information from Nashville up to noon Wednesday. Gen. Buell and Commodore Foote have arrived and occupied the place. The United States flag was raised over the dome of the capitol and floats there now. But one federal flag was exhibited and that from the shop of a Yankee jeweler who had long been accused of disloyalty.

Jeff Davis's Message. Considering the president's message, the Appeal says it is "free to confess the error of his past policy, and the extent of the disasters which have followed from it. We think a war will soon be made on the advancing columns of the enemy, that will attack, pursue and destroy, instead of being attacked, pursued and destroyed. The spade will be dropped and the bayonet resumed. In other words, the policy of the fabian Davis will yield to that of the Napoleon Bonaparte."
