



The news from the expedition of Gen. Burnside is highly gratifying. That officer evidently appears to be an earnest man. Notwithstanding the damage done his fleet by the storm, and other unavoidable delays, he has made the best of what he had at command, and bravely dashed upon the enemy and beaten them at every point. The rebels admit that they have lost a whole army, and say it is the greatest misfortune of the war.

Of the casualities we have but little news, and we almost dread to hear of the names of present. the brave men killed. Doubtless there were some from this vicinity, as our Tenth Regiment had the lead, and were of course exposed to the raking fire of the rebel forts.

The Bayonet.

The first effective and brilliant use of the bayonet during the war was made at the West on the defeat of Zollicoffer, by Col. McCook's Ohio regiment of Germans. The Colonel was the only Yankee in the regiment. The men were all Germans, and they had stood under the fire of the rebels as long as they could patiently line unflinchingly. At last he gave the im- ladies having postponed their festival. patient Germans the order to advance, and they pressed on with alacrity. When within about thirty yards of the rebels, they poured in a galling fire upon the regiment, but they faltered not. Then the Colonel gave the order to bayonets," when his troops brough their pieces to a level, and with a loud yell rushed forward. The rebels looked aghast at the row of pointed steel, and instantly gave way, first the Tennessee regiment and next the Mississippians. They broke and fled in all directions. The bayonet is the great weapon of the French, and always makes quick work, and really saves life, because it ends a contest so speedily. Our troops have every advantage in a close encounter, as we have three bayonets to every one possessed by the enemy. It is to be honed that Col. McCook's example will be closely followed by all our troops.

In the Navy, Commodore Dupont set a noble example at Port Royal in laying his splendid ship close up to the fortifications of the enemy in their very teeth, and they soon yielded. Capt. Foote followed this gallant method of dealing with the traitors at the West. He laid his vessel along side of Fort Henry, and his men knew that the result would be "victory or death." There was no boy play there-no long shots in that fight; but a close "bear hug" on the enemy. Let us have more of this during the war, and less of the foolery.

The second dispatch from Norfolk of the 10th ays a rurnor has prevailed that Commodore Lynch's fleet of gunboats had been captured. It is not regarded as true, but it is believed all were burned by the Confederates to prevent their capture, with the exception of one, which was endeavoring to make its escape. The fleet went to Elizabeth City from Roanoke Island, and was probably burned at the former point.

THIRD DISPATCH.

NORFOLK, Feb. 10, 1862. A dispatch was received at Richmond at midnight, stating as follows:

A courier arrived here this afternoon at 4 clock, and brought intelligence that Elizabeth city was burned this morning by its inhabitants. During the conflagration the federals landed a large force. All of our gunboats, excepting one, were captured by the enemy. Gen. Wise has not yet arrived at Norfolk.

The forlowing, the very latest, we copy from o-day's Norfolk Day Book :

A courier arrived here yesterday afternoon about 3 o'c lock, from which we gather the fol-

The energy advanced in full force upon Elizabeth City, yesterday, about 7 o'clock, and began an attack upon that place. The citizens finding resistance vain evacuated the place, but befere doing so set fire to the town, and when our informant left it was still in flames. We have also to record the capture by the

enemy of all our little fleet except the Fanny or Fornest, our informant is not certain which. This eluded the enemy, and made up the

A special dispatch from Cairo to the St. Lou-Pasquotank river. She was pursued, however, and fears are entertained that she was captured It is said that before our boats surrendered, they were ab andoned, and that their crews succeeded in mal ing their escape.

We are at a loss to conjecture why the boats | vere not fired before they were abandoned.

The disaster to our little fleet is attributed to the fact that, having exhausted their supply of coal and ammunition, they proceeded to Elizabeth city for the purpose of obtaining a supply. Every effort was made to obtain coal but without success, and the boats could not, therefore, return to the Island and lend any assistance whatever to our forces.

All the details which have been published in reference to the capture of Roanoke Island are onfirmed by the courier, who represents our loss at three hundred (300) killed and wounded, and that of the enemy not less than one thous and (1000) killed. Great havoc was made among the enemy while coming up the road leading to the fort, our forces brought to bear upon them two 32-pounders, and at every fire their ranks were terribly thinned. The places of the fallen, however, were quickly filled.

The Park Point Battery was manned by the Richmond Blues, and most ably did they defend it. During the conflict they were attacked by a whole regiment of Zouaves, and though completely overpowered, they stood their ground.

They did not yeld at the fort until all but seven had fallen bleeding to the ground. There is good reason to believe that had Col. Henningsen with his artillery been on the Island it would not have been forced to surrender.

The lack of field pieces was sadly felt and had they been at hand, perhaps the enemy never would have been able to have kindled their fires. Col. Henningsen had orders, we understand, to report to Roanoke Island, but, by some misunderstanding, he mistook Elizabeth city for his place of destination. Capt. Taylor, of this city, is represented as

having greatly distinguished himself.

In addition to the above, there are many ru mors we might give, but as they are nothing more than rumors, we prefer witholding them. Among them, however, is one worthy of no tice, that Gen. Wise had been shot while on his way in an ambulance. The statement, so far as we have been able

to learn, is untrue. We can only account for it by supposing that the name of the General truth in it whatever. was confounded with that of his son who was reported among the killed.

It is reported that one regiment from Massa chusetts was badly cut up, but it is impossible to ascertain which of the five it was that were attached to the expedition. All the Southern papers received to-day are

our troops, and in saying that the loss of the Island is a very serious one. The news received to-day occasions great excitement at Old Point.

A steamer with official dispatches from Gen. Burnside is hourly expected. The prisoners, numbering at least 2,000, will

be here in a few days.

[This came too late for yesterday's edition.] New York, Feb. 11, 1862.

A Fortress Monroe letter of the 9th, states at the hombardment of Roanoke Island cou tinued vesterday. About noon Commander came down Currituck Sound to assist Wise on the Island. The federal gunboats at the fort, Savannah is being strongly fortified on the afternoon of the 8th, had sunk three and captured two, one of which had the Commodore's pennant, and disposed the rest of the rebel gun boats in every direction. The firing ceased at dark, but recommenced with increased vigor in the morning, until eight o'clock, when it is sup-

posed the rebels surrendered. A fireman on board the Selden said the fed erals had landed in large numbers, and our old flag could be seen at Elizabeth City, flying over the rebel batteries. It was rumored at Norfolk on the morning of the 9th, that three regiments had been recently sent to Roanoke Island. As there was no chance of escape they were all probably captured.

The rebels acknowledge the only obstacle of importance to retard Burnside's march upor Norfolk, are swamps, marshes and sickness.

CUR FLAG IN ALABAMA.

Unionists Along the Banks. CINCINNATI. Feb. 12, 1862.

Specials to the Cincinnati Gazette and Com nercial, dated Fort Henry Feb. 10, give the following account of the expedition up the Tennessee river:

After the capture of the fort, the Lexington Conestoga, and Tyler gave chase to the rebel steamer Dunbar. Reaching the Memphis and Louisville Railroad bridge, our boats set fire to a portion of it, took a quantity of stores, &c. and passed on in chase of the Dunbar, but did not overtake her. It is supposed she escaped by running up some creek during the night. The gunboats went to Florence, Alabama,

the head of navigation, 250 miles from Pa-Everywhere along the river they were received

ed with astonishing welcome by numerous Union families in Southern Tenn. and North Carolina and at times along the river. Our old flag was hailed as a redeemer and hailed with shouts of joy.

Capt. Gwynne, of Tybee, accepted thirty men for service on the gunboats, and says he can get enough to man the whole fleet. The people of Florence were so delighted a

Official Report of the Expedition up the Tennessee river.

Washington, Feb. 12, 1862. The following is the official report of Lieut Phillips to Flag-Officer Foote:

RAILBOAD CHOSSING, GENBOAT CONESCOGA, Fab 10 1862 Sir: We have returned to this point from our entirely successful expedition to Florence, at the foot of the muscle shoals, Alabama

BALTIMORE, Feb. 12, 1862

Returned Priseners of War. FORTRESS MONROE, Feb. 11, 1862.

The Fort Warren prisoners arrived in the bark Trinity last night. The bark was, accordingly, towed off opposite Sewall's Point by the steamer Roncocas and the tug Adriatic, and at about 1 o'clock, the rebel steamer West Point came out from Norfolk, and the prisoners were transferred. They numbered 4 Captains, three 1st Lieutenants, six 2d Lieutenants, two 3d Lieutenants, and 384 others, rank and file, and

colored servants. They were taken at Hatteras and Santa Rosa, and are the last of the prisoners of war at Fort Warren, except Commodore Barron. The passage here from Boston has been quite unpleasant, on account of the crowded condition of the vessel, but the prisoners are all enjoying as good health as could be expected. It was generally supposed here that the small pox was on board the vessel, but on the authority of Lieut. Buell. who had the prisoners in charge from Fort War-

ren, the statement is positively denied. The prisoners having been transferred to the West Point, the Trinity was towed back to her anchorage in the Roads. Several passengers were brought back from Norfolk, including Capt. J. T. Morse of the transport Osceola. The Osceola was part of Gen. Sherman's expedition, and was wrecked on the coast of Georgia Nov. 2; and the Captain and whole crew taken prisoners.

In accordance with orders from the War Department, lated Jan. 2, 1862, the 4th Regiment, Connecticut Volum eers, is hereby organized into an Artillery Regiment, to be known and designated as the 1st Regiment Connecticut Volunteer Artillery. The Companies composing the Regient will be increased to one hundred and fifty-five man and two new Companies are ordered by the Commander n-Chief, to be organized and attached to the Regiment. Each Company will be organized as follows, viz

1 Captain. 2 2d Lieutenants. 1 1st Sergeant. 1 Quartermaster-Sergeant. 6 Sergeants. 12 Corporals. 2 Artificers. 126 Privates.

155 Aggregate. II. Three Commissioned officers of the new Companies and one 2d Lieutenant to each of the existing Companies, will be appointed by the Commander-in-Chief, and the renaining Commissioned Officers will be nominated by the

Colonel of the Regiment. III. The Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, Musicians and Privates, organized as above set forth, will, in all respects, be placed on the same footing, as to pay and allowace, of similar corps of the regular Army, and Non-Comissioned Officers, Musicians and Privates will be entitled o the same allowance for bounty as all ther organizations

in the State.
