Western Virginia. WHEELING, Feb. 13, 1862. The Constitutional Convention this morning, adopted the following as the section of an article on the fundamental provisional constitution.

Democratic State Convention. The old line or Breckinridge Democratic State Convention was held in Middletown yesterday. The old ticket for State officers was re-nominated; but Col. Hazzard declined standing for Lieutenant Governor, and the vacancy was filled by the nomination of C. F. Pond, Esq., President of the Hartford and New Haven Railroad.

The Tuscarora Ordered off the British Coast. The steamship Fenelon, from Southampton, 1st inst., passed Cape Race on Wednesday evening. She brings intelligence that the United States gunboat Tuscarora had been ordered off the docks, off Southampton, by the British Government, and has taken up a position near the Needles. The pirate Nashville still lays in Southampton dock.

Preparation in Kansas. Great preparations are going on at Fort Leavenworth for the southern expedition. Gen. Hunter himself is earnestly and unceasingly at the helm in the perfection of details. The department is pushed to its utmost capacity. Seven regiments of cavalry and four of infantry and three full battalions of artillery with Parrott guns, en route from the East, are expected to join the expedition, which will be one of the most formidable organized during the war.

STATE NEWS. George B. Howard, Wm. Gooding and Bernard King of New London, have been appointed master mariners of the Dakota, now lying at the Brooklyn Navy-Yard, and which is soon to cruise in the Mediterranean.

Not Alleged at Fault. The 4th New Hampshire Regiment has just completed a heavy job of shoveling at Fort Mifflin. A few days since, on inspection, Col. Whipple discovered one of the soldiers' guns in the front of the order.

A New Oil Mine. The New Bedford Mercury says a gentleman of that city has been experimenting in the mixture of whale and petroleum oils. He has ascertained to his entire satisfaction, that an oil composed of four parts whale oil and one part petroleum oil, is cheaper as a means of illumination than either separate.

NEWS SUMMARY. David Wilson, gun-captain on board the Essex at the Fort Henry battle, confined to work by a gun after being mortally wounded. The brave fellow is now dead.

Ship Island News. NEW YORK, Feb. 13, 1862. Among the passengers by the Columbia is Capt. Palmer of the Iroquois, and he leaves immediately for Washington.

From the West Indies. MEXICO—JUAREZ AND THE ALLIES. NEW YORK, Feb. 13, 1862. The steamer Columbia brings Havana dates of the 8th inst. It appears by the correspondence of the Associated Press that Miramon, arriving at Vera Cruz from Havana, was arrested by the British Admiral for a former robbery of the British Legation in Mexico.

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Alarm at Norfolk. EXPLOSION AT NEWPORT NEWS. FORTRESS MONROE, Feb. 13, 1862. No flag of truce today. No arrival from Hatteras. As the Express was coming down from Newport News this morning, on her regular trip, a man was picked up in a small boat, who left Norfolk yesterday morning, and made his escape from Sewells Point in a small boat. He confirms all previous reports, and adds that Norfolk has been placed under martial law, and that volunteers to defend that city are called for in vain.

The work on the Merrimac was stopped on Saturday, and is now at the Navy-Yard drawing so much water that she cannot get out, even if ready for sea. The greatest alarm prevails at Norfolk; an attack is momentarily expected. It is said there are only about 200 troops at Sewell's Point. It is rumored at Norfolk that the defeat of Roanoke Island was owing to the treachery of North Carolina troops.

The Sawyer gun, at Newport News, exploded yesterday afternoon, while being fired. Privates Josiah Jones of Co. D., and James Shepherd, Co. B., 29th Massachusetts Regiment, were instantly killed; and W. W. Bowman, Co. I, of the same regiment, was injured so badly, that his recovery is doubtful. Jones belonged in Green Point, L. I.; Shepherd in Lowell, Mass. Their bodies were sent north to-night via Baltimore. Four or five others were injured but not seriously.

The Attack on Fort Donelson. St. Louis, Feb. 13, 1862. The Democrat learns that Commodore Foote, with the gunboats St. Louis, Louisville and Pittsburg, left Cairo for the Cumberland river at 10 o'clock on Saturday night. The Carondelet was expected to join them at Paducah.

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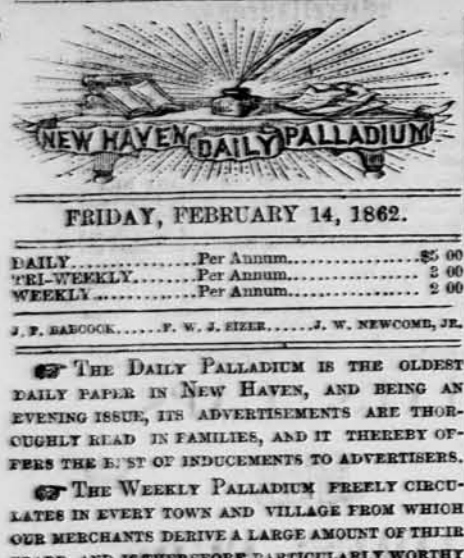

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BY TELEGRAPH TO THE New-Haven Daily Palladium. EXTRA EDITION. 11:30 O'CLOCK A. M. THE ROANOKE ISLAND BATTLE. THE COMPLETE REBEL FORCE PRISONERS. REBEL OFFICERS CAPTURED. OUR R KILLED FORTY-TWO. OUR WOUNDED 140. COL. RUSSELL OF THE CT. 10th KILLED. LIEUT.-COL. V. deMONTEIL KILLED. REBEL FLEET DESTROYED. ELIZABETH CITY OCCUPIED. FORTRESS MONROE, Feb. 13, 1862. The gunboat Stars and Stripes arrived this noon from Burnside with a bearer of dispatches for Government.

Reports the rebel force complete, three thousand prisoners, captured. All their gunboats were burned or captured except two. The Federal loss in killed was 42; and the wounded are about 140 in number.

The fleet anchored off Stumping Point that night, and the next day proceeded to the entrance of Croatan Sound. After a reconnaissance, the attack commenced on Friday, the Underwriter leading the column.

The rebel fleet was attacked and dispersed in half an hour, by a portion of our navy, while the Seminoles attacked the coast batteries. The fight continued until dark. During the night 10,000 men were landed. On Sunday morning 7,000 were advanced.

The 52d N. Y., 25th Mass. and 10th Conn., suffered the most severely. The fight lasted only two or three hours, when the battery was abandoned, and our troops pursued the rebels surrounded their camps and took nearly the whole command prisoners.

Our total loss in killed and wounded is less than two hundred; the killed less than fifty. We took between 2,000 and 3,000 prisoners. They were about being sent to New York by the S. R. Spaulding and other steamers.

All of the rebel fleet was sunk or burned except two, the Roanoke and Beaufort, which escaped by the canal. The Sea Bird which was the flag ship of Commodore Lynch, was run down and boarded, and the gallant Commodore escaped to shore by swimming.

The news from Elizabeth City was received at Roanoke Island on Monday evening, and the Stars and Stripes left on Tuesday morning. She stuck on the bar at Hatteras on Tuesday night, but started again in the morning, arriving here about noon to-day.

Elizabeth city was almost half burned by the rebel soldiers. The people sent off a deputation to Com. Goldsborough, asking him to send a force to assist in extinguishing the flames.

Messrs. Ames and Fish return to Baltimore, the rebels refusing to receive them. Four hundred released Federal prisoners will reach Old Point on Friday or Saturday.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 14, 1862. The Inquirer's Monroe special states that the rebels were pursued several hours, and two complete regiments on the way to reinforce Roanoke Island were captured.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14, 1862. A special messenger arrived this morning, bringing the following dispatches: U. S. FLAG STEAMER PHILADELPHIA, OFF ROANOKE ISLAND, Feb. 8.

Roanoke Island is ours. Its military authorities struck us yesterday. Their means of defense were truly formidable and were used with determination worthy a better cause.

Eight steamers and each with a rifled gun with a diameter of a 32-pounder, a prolonged obstruction of sunken vessels and piles to mark our distance—a body of men numbering no less than 5000 are now our prisoners.

No attack could have been more completely executed, and it was carried out precisely in accordance with arrangements made before the expedition left Hatteras. The detailed account of the naval operations before named will be given hereafter.
