Progress of our Cause. The cause of the Union has been going forward with such overwhelming success the past few weeks, that we have hardly had time to contemplate the few reverses and disappointments we have met with.

On Sabbath evening, at American Hall, the place of worship of the German M. E. Society, some interesting exercises connected with the Sabbath School took place.

The safe retreat of their army from Manassas, is thought by some as a victory to them, and it would appear, from Gen. McClellan's address, just put forth to his army, that he feels the mortifying effect of that escape, and is determined to make the enemy pay dearly for their successful strategy in that particular.

At 3 a. m. the iron battery Monitor, Commander John L. Worden, which had arrived the previous evening at Hampton Roads, came alongside and reported for duty.

Then we have the victory of New Madrid, clearing Missouri of the rebels—a most important success. It appears from Gen. Pope's report to Gen. Halleck, that we have taken 25 pieces of heavy artillery (24-pounders), and rifled—32 batteries of field artillery, an immense quantity of fixed ammunition, several thousand small arms, hundreds of boxes of musket cartridges, three hundred mules, tents for an army of 12,000 men, and an immense quantity of other property of not less value than a million of dollars.

At 6 a. m. the Monitor and the Merrimac, which were engaged in a battle on the 18th of March, were again seen together in the Potomac river.

Canon Captured Under the Potomac. The rebels in their hasty flight from Aquia Creek, on Friday, left a large number of splendid guns. The Leslie is brought up from the Evansport battery seven 12-inch rifled guns throwing a 125-pound shell.

At 10 a. m. the Monitor and the Merrimac, which were engaged in a battle on the 18th of March, were again seen together in the Potomac river.

Washington Correspondence. A VISIT TO CENTREVILLE AND MANASSAS.—THE DESOLATION VISIBLE ON EVERY HAND.—OUR SOLDIERS BURYING THE DEAD KILLED AT THE BULL RUN DISASTER.—THE ATTEMPT IN CONGRESS TO SUPREMACY GEN. McCLELLAN.

I have just returned from a trip to Centreville and Manassas, which has occupied two days, and they have proved days of hard work and disgusting associations. The desolation everywhere apparent—the destruction of property of all kinds, and without any reference to its ultimate value, is without a parallel in the history of war.

At 4 p. m. the Merrimac, Jamestown and Patrick Henry bore down upon my vessel. Very fortunately the iron battery drew too much water to come within a mile of us. She took a position on my starboard bow, but did not fire with accuracy, and only one shot passed through the ship's bow.

At 6 a. m. the enemy again appeared coming down from Cranes Island, and I beat to quarters, but they ran past my ship and were heading for Fortress Monroe, and the retreat was beaten off. The Merrimac ran down near the Rip Raps and then turned into the channel; through which I had come. Again all hands were called to quarters, and opened upon her with my stern guns and made signal to the Monitor to attack the enemy.
