John Bull's Opinion of Yankee Courage. The latest number of Englishman's Magazine, in pressing the opinion that a war between Great Britain and the United States will occur by 1868, says: "Our British North American Colonies stand face to face with a power which, in the appliances of modern science, and in the courage and endurance of its people, is a match for the most military of European nations."

East Haven. The Union men of East Haven have made a most excellent nomination for Representative, in the person of Capt. William Farrer, whom everybody likes and everybody ought to like, he being a straight forward, honorable man, a good neighbor and a Unionist, whose colors are nailed to the mast.

Judge Vinal has been re-nominated by the Unionists for the office of Judge of Probate in the Middletown District. He has acceptably performed the duties of that office for the past year and will be elected.

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SECOND EDITION. A small craft tied to the levee, occupied by a poor man and a family of five persons, parted moorings during the gale yesterday, and all were drowned.

The wharf boat of the Mobile and Ohio railroad, was blown across to the Kentucky shore. Thirty houses at Paducah were unroofed, including the Marine Hospital.

FROM ISLAND NO. 10. The steamer Pike, from Island No. 10, has arrived, with intelligence to 1 p. m., yesterday. No damage was done to the gunboats or mortar boats by the gale.

Congress To-Day. Mr. Wilmot presented resolutions of the Legislature of Pennsylvania relative to defenses of the Delaware River and Bay; recommending the construction of gunboats and tendering the credit of the State to the amount of one million dollars for that purpose; referred.

Mr. Wilson, of Mass., offered a resolution instructing the Military Committee to report what further legislation is necessary to prevent the employment of the military service of the United States, for the return of slaves, and to punish thereof; laid over.

Mr. Davis offered a resolution that the war is not prosecuted in any spirit of conquest or subjugation, but to defend the Constitution and preserve the rights of the several states unimpaired and that the United States will prosecute the war till this is secured.

Virginia Affairs. The rebel troops that occupied Loudon Va., during the summer, fall and winter, and until the time of evacuation, were the 4th South Carolina, 13th, 17th, 18th and 21st Mississippi, and 8th Virginia. The latter was moved some days after the Bull Run fight to Centerville.

THE KING PHILIP ARRIVED LAST NIGHT from lower part of the river. She brought four refugees from Richmond and Westmoreland counties, who came off from Kinsale on Saturday. They stated that the rebels are pressing every mile between 18 and 45. They had been closely hunted by pre-gangs for a week or two.
