Defenses of New Orleans. Much has been said pro and con relative to the defenses of this city, as well as of the number of rebel troops there. The statements have been very conflicting. As the following, which was published in the New York Times a few days since, is probably as truthful an account of the topography of the adjacent country and of their fighting force as has yet appeared, we copy:

The Jubilee Meeting. The meeting of the colored people of New Haven, held in Temple Hall, last evening, in commemoration of the Emancipation of Slavery in the District of Columbia, was largely attended, and passed off with great honor to those who had made the arrangements, and gratification to those who attended. The house was called to order by Mr. Mineas Lyman; whereupon, Dr. C. V. B. Creed, in behalf of the committee of arrangements, announced the following gentlemen as officers of the meeting:

Whereas the Congress of the United States have in a noble and masterly manner passed an act emancipating the African race, and have thereby removed forever this long cherished institution from the very heart and center of the "National Government," thus wiping away the stain of the Constitution, and blotting out the "curse of slavery," and acknowledging the great Jeffersonian principle, and the "Declaration of Independence," and the equality of all men—therefore Resolved, That we, the colored citizens of New Haven, do hereby unite in a public declaration of our joy and gratitude to the Congress of the United States, and to the President of the United States, for the passage of this noble and masterly act.

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BY TELEGRAPH. The New Haven Daily Palladium. BEFORE YORKTOWN. HEAD QUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTOMAC, APRIL 28, 11 A. M. Nothing of interest occurred during the night. No firing on our right, where the work proceeded undisturbed. On the left the enemy held a good deal, but hurt no one, nor was the work interrupted. Have just sent a heavy field battery to silence a gun or two of the enemy's, that has been impertinent this morning, but hurt no one. The weather has improved, and we are making good progress.

Items from the South. Fortness Monroe, April 28, 1862. A flag of truce to-day took dispatches and letters for the Union prisoners. No newspapers were received; or, at least, none came into the hands of the reporters for the press. The city of New Orleans has been taken by the Union forces. The telegraph operators having left there as previously reported no particulars have been received. It is stated, however, that the operators subsequently attempted to return but found the city in possession of Union troops. It is probable the city surrendered without resistance after the fleet made their appearance.

Secretary Welles. The Washington Republican of Saturday, explains the origin of the reports concerning the resignation of Secretary Welles. It states that they originated with persons who sought to make steamboat contracts with the Navy Department, but were unable to convince Mr. Welles of the necessity thereof. From Washington. ORDINANCE, &c. WASHINGTON, April 29, 1862. The Committee on Ordnance and Ordnance Supplies have, it is said, rejected all foreign contracts, and considerably curtailed those for the manufacture of arms in the United States. The Ordnance office has issued proposals for the manufacture within one year of Springfield rifle muskets, and Harper's Ferry rifles, together with revolvers, carbines, sabers, swords and scabbards. The Department reserves to itself the right to reject any bid, and will consider none made through any agent, broker, or party other than the regular manufacturers.

Congress To-Day. SENATE. WASHINGTON, April 29, 1862. Mr. Hale presented a petition of the manufacturers of wool against the proposed tax thereon. Mr. Latham of the Military Committee, reported a bill for a Bureau of transportation. Mr. Wilson, of the same committee, reported a bill to create a Bureau of clothing, also a bill to authorize a Medical Inspector-General, and Inspector of discharged soldiers for physical disability.

From the Gulf Coast. Advice per Connecticut state that the rebel steamer Florida has been captured by the U. S. bark Pursuit. Forts Barrancas and McTear have been evacuated by the rebels. The Connecticut brought eight ex-members of the Galveston artillery who escaped from imprisonment; also four refugees from Tampa Bay. Every post except Tampa on the coast of Florida is evacuated by the rebels.

Suffering. There is great suffering among the families of our volunteers in Troy, New York. The Troy Times says: "The 15th regiment has not been paid off in five months, and numerous applications are made to the Acting Superintendent of Poor, Mr. Brownell, and the City Overseer, Mr. Ingraham, for temporary relief to the wives and families of these soldiers."

Connecticut Generals. Major Henry W. Wersell, of the Sixth Infantry, who has just been made a brigadier-general of volunteers, is a Connecticut man. Our State has now ten generals in the service, viz:—Toten, Mansfield, Ripley, Benham, Wright, Sedgwick, Ferry, Tyler, Terry, and Wersell.
