In some places our guns are within battering distance, but the dense woodlands intervening prevent either party opening fire.

Camp rumors say that Vicksburg has surrendered, and that our fleet is en route for Memphis.

The reporter of the Associated Press at Halleck's headquarters, says all Corinthian news telegraphed from Chicago, derived via Cairo for some time past, is entirely unfounded.

No engagements of the last consequence have occurred in Corinth or vicinity up to 11 o'clock last evening.

Washington News. WASHINGTON, May 27, 1862. Advice from the City of Mexico, to the 5th inst., state that in the latter part of last month the British minister had concluded a treaty at Puebla, with Doblado, by which all difficulties with the English were amicably settled. Had it not been for the sudden action of the French, a treaty with Spain would have been concluded between Doblado and Gen. Prim.

The latter, however, left the shores of Mexico on good terms with the Juaraz Government, and a Minister will be sent to Madrid to arrange satisfactorily all matters in dispute.
