Colored Soldiers. Old Hickory, (Gen. Jackson) who wanted tough soldiers during the heat of summer, had colored troops in his army at the bat-

From the shores of Africa I collected you to arms—I invited you to share in the perils and to divide the glory of your white countrymen. I expected much from you, which must render you so formidable to an invading foe. I knew that you could endure hunger and thirst, and all the hardships of war. I knew that you loved the land of your nativity, and that, like ourselves, you had to defend all that is most dear to man. But you surpass all my hopes. I have found in you, united to these qualities, that noble enthusiasm which impels to great deeds."

My Feelings in the Battle. The following extracts from the letter of a young officer in Burnside's army, give a vivid account of the writer's thoughts and feelings when on the march and under fire at Newbern, and should console many whose hearts ache for their friends in battle.

There is no doubt the decision of Gen. Wool is leading to great suffering among the poorer classes. It was reported at Norfolk, yesterday, that Burnside had taken Weldon.

Col. Kenly's command of infantry and cavalry have been driven back from Front Royal, with considerable loss of killed, wounded and prisoners. The rebel force, estimated at 5,000 or 6,000, is reported to have fallen back on Front Royal. They probably occupied it this morning.
