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THE NATION'S CALL. Almost daily for months past, the public heart has been cheered by news of the victorious advances of the Federal arms.

It may not and should not be concealed that these tidings are calculated to depress the public mind with a heavy weight of grief. Following so closely as this calamity does upon the heel of the brilliant series of three score important victories that have gladdened every loyal heart for the past five months, the revulsion of feeling can but be terrible.

But the patriotic heart of the nation will not, we are sure, falter in view of the demand which this reverse implies—a demand, which, in fact, has been anticipated by the Governors of the loyal states, and acknowledged and enforced by the President of the United States in his late call for Three Hundred Thousand additional troops.

These troops are needed to-day. The quota of Connecticut will be 8,000 or 10,000 men. They should be raised immediately, by voluntary enlistments if possible; if not, the draft must be resorted to. Of course Governor Buckingham will take such speedy action in the premises as the condition of our militia system will allow.

The dispatch received this morning and published in our extra, conveys information which saddens the heart of every true patriot. Led to believe in the skill of McClellan and the discipline of his troops, the loyal North thought not of disaster near the rebel capital. Of the extent of the reverse we have not yet learned, but from the news obtained, it would appear somewhat like a drawn battle, the loss being heavy on both the Union and rebel sides.

When the government considers this war and nothing less, and governs itself accordingly, there will be less poignancy of feeling at a temporary check of the Union army. Had the enlistments continued from the first, we should now have in the field such a force as no such reverse as this could effect. The rebel hordes would have been overpowered numerically, and whipped into obedience, as it is manifest must now be the case.

Mitchell detailed fifty-five men from different regiments for scout service, who were all captured and carried to Atlanta, Ga., where Robert Bufum, formerly of Salem, Mass., but now of Col. Norton's 2d Ohio, was hung by the scoundrels.

McLELLAN'S DEPARTMENT. TERRIFIC CONTEST. FOUR DAYS' FIGHTING! REVERSE TO FEDERAL ARMS. DRIVEN BACK 17 MILES. Guns Spiked & Carriages Burned.

THE GUNBOATS EFFECTIVE. 2000 REBELS TAKEN PRISONERS. FORTRESS MONROE, July 1, 1862. A gunboat has just arrived here from the seat of action yesterday, ten miles above City Point.

The battle commenced with our land forces, and after about four hours fighting, our gunboats got in range and poured into the rebels a heavy and incessant fire. This fire the rebels stood about two hours, and then retreated.

Our troops have captured, notwithstanding their disadvantages, a large number of artillery pieces, and 2,000 prisoners. Among the prizes captured is the rebel General Magruder. The place where this last action took place is near Turkey Creek.

The retreat of the rebels last evening was with great disorder, and their loss has been very heavy, much greater it is thought than ours. There is nothing definite, however, in regard to losses. In the retreat forced upon Gen. McClellan by the superior numbers of the enemy, I learn that he had to spike his siege guns, and leave them on the field after burning the carriages.

The nature of the ground rendered it impossible to move them. In the retreat many of our sick and wounded were necessarily left behind. There are of course innumerable reports and rumors here, but I send only what appears to be authentic. Fire. NEWARK, July 3, 1862. Watt's paper mache works were burnt last night. Loss, \$50,000; insured for \$12,000.
