

The Legislative Caucus.

The Register of yesterday publishes a report of the Legislative caucus of Thursday evening, at which an effort was made for a further consolidation of the Union elements of the State, and it claims that its report was a fair one, and it also defends its report of a former caucus on the same subject. The spirit of its last report may be judged of by its introduction, which is as follows: "The members of the Legislature engaged in the work of forming a new party, which shall embrace in its ample folds every faction and men of every principle, met at the hall of the house of Representatives last evening." Now men of every faction and of every principle were not invited or expected to be present. Only those who desired to consider the subject of a more thorough and complete organization of the loyal parties of the State were invited or expected to be in counsel. So much for the misrepresentation.

But the Register goes further, and makes a dash at our Representative, D. J. Peck, Esq., as it had done previously, and does on every occasion at Gen. Pratt. We quote as follows "The whole effort in the caucus was to choke off he Democratic "left wing" from discussing the nilitary bill. Mr. Peck, of New Haven, was in faor of putting the "previous question screws" to

This is altogether an unfair report of the renarks of Mr. Peck. He did not speak of any party or attempt any party divisions upon the nilitary bill. All he did say was that there was evidently an organized attempt to defeat the military bill, not by an open and fair fight against it, but by insidious assaults-by a series of vexatious amendments, designed to kill the bill in detail-and he declared that if it should prove true that the bill was to be treated in that way, he should move the previous question upon that kind of maneuvering. This is a very different thing from saying that he should " put the previous question screws upon every Democrat who should open his mouth on that question."

Mr. Peck has, so far as can be judged of by the Legislative reports and what we have seen and heard, acquitted himself with great credit to himself and constituents during the session. He has not sought to make himself conspicuous, or appeared to believe that there was no other man than himself in the House or in the world. On the contrary, he has been quite reserved, treating other men and other parties with great onsideration and liberality. For this reason he has himself been treated with marked respect, and been very successful in defending his positions. Few men in the House, especially of his years, have seemed to have more influence, bath two very able sermons in the North Church in or to be more justly entitled to it. We do not this city. State Normal School.

If it be the purpose of the Legislature to destroy the State Normal School we wonder that it is not done by formal enactment, instead of cutting it to pieces by inches. The appropriation of \$2,500 will but aggravate its death, as t is only about half enough to pay its annual expenses. There are those who think the institution is of no consequence to the State. 

LOSS OF LIFE IMMENSE.

NEW YORK, June 30-9 A. M. The Tribune has just issued an extra with ispatch, dated BATTLE-FIELD, SUNDAY MORN NG. The dispatches states a severe and most determined battle was fought on the right wing on Thursday and Friday, which is claimed by some of our officers as a successful strategic movement into which the enemy had unwitting-

Half an hour later, another attempt was made on the left with the same result. The battle had then been raging for some four hours without any apparent change or advantage on either side; reinforcements of artillery and infantry then came steadily along over the bridge, marching through the heat and dust over the hill to the field of battle.

The enemy then seemed to make their last desperate, determined effort, and came forcing our men back into the low ground between the hill and the bridge, where they could have been slaughtered by tens of thousands before they could have crossed that long narrow bridge.

Wagons, artillery, ambulances, and men, were hurrying toward the bridge and a panic was almost inevitable, when a strong guard was placed across the bridge at the time when the enemy had almost reached the main hos pital, one-half mile from the river. Meagher's Irishmen came over the hill strip-

The rebels followed in great force, and by 3 o'clock in the afternoon a general and heavy engagement occurred here, lasting till 7, when a lull took place, but the rebels again renewed the fight with greater ferocity, having been re-

Our brave men stood the unequal contest like heroes, and canister, shell, grape and musketry did fearful havoe among them. Our forces were increased by Gens. Slocum's batteries, French and Meagher's brigades, and the rebels were beaten badly. Meagher's brigade went into the battle with coats off and sleeves rolled up fighting like tigers.

The ground which Gen. McClellan ordered Gen. Porter to occupy and hold was occupied and held. In the first part of the day Gen Porter's corps alone contended against the rebels but subsequent reinforcements swelled their numbers to forty-five thousand.

The rebels had sixty thousand men under Gens. Lee, Hill, Anderson and Branch. Among our killed are Col. Black and Lieut.-Col. Sweitzer, of the 62d Pennsylvania; Col. Gove of the 22d Mass.; Col. Robberts of the 1st Michigan; Col. McQuade and Lieut-Colonel Skillen of the 14th New York; and Major Patterson of the 62d Pennsylvania.
