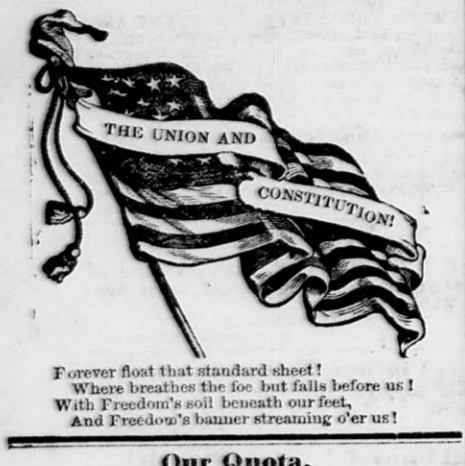

SECOND EDITION. THE BATTLE AT CEDAR MOUNTAIN. The Wounded and Captured Confederate Officers.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12, 1862. Accounts from Culpepper dated yesterday speaking of Saturday's fight say so heavy was the fire which our comparatively small force was exposed to that the only wonder is the entire command was not completely annihilated at the end of half an hour instead of bringing off so large a proportion at the expiration of an hour and a half.

Prisoners report their own troops were rebuffed by our artillery like grass. The rebels were reinforced three times by fresh regiments and brigades, and when our troops refused they were too crippled to pursue.

Major Savage, of the 2d Mass., is believed to be killed, as also many captains and lieutenants of the same regiment.
