

PARTICULARS, &C.

The following is the conclusion of the dispatch from Gen. McClellan's Headquarters, June 2d : We have taken some 500 prisoners among whom are several prominent officers. On Sunday, as soon as it was light, the fight was resumed by Gen. Summer with marked succes; the fight lasting nearly the whole day The rebels were driven at every point with heavy loss. 

Stonewall Jackson's Strategy.

Now that the unreasonable panic growing out of Gen. Banks' retreat has subsided, we cannot fail to admire the energy and celerity of movement of the rebel commander in Western Virries, over the bend in the river below, and the cate colonies of New England men at every ginia, "Stonewall Jackson," as he is called, and to see why the rebels have such confidence in him. A correspondent of the New York Commercial Advertiser states the case as follows :

"Jeff. Davis, in a speech delivered in the Senate in May, 1848, said that : 'Cæsar, Frede rick and Napoleon, the three greatest generals, have demonstrated that celerity of movement is the great ground-work of military success.'
