Prior to my incarceration any preconceived ideas I had as to what jail was all about came from movies, books and T.V. programs I had seen. Of course the Watergate fiasco revealed that the sun itself is less kind to those of fair complexion than to those of darker skin, while the sword of justice becomes a manipulated weapon when it is controlled by outside influences. Although all men were created equal - some, quite obviously were more equal than others, -- and the same holds true for jails.

Be that as it may, (or as we say in this place -- "It be's that way!" - the thoughts that pound at my consciousness are centered, not upon my tribulations, but upon those of my loved ones. I think of the home that I would at this very moment be hurrying to with pride and pleasure; of the wasted years of my life; of the dreadful nature of the existence I face, of the loss of honor and respect my family must suffer.

In a constant state of mental torment I think of my youngsters, and try to visualize what kind of cloth 'Time', that oldest and longest established spinner of all, will weave from the threads already spun into my children, but warped by my foolish deeds.

Here at B.C.C. we must learn to live with pressures that our wiser friends on the outside will hopefully never have to face. The terrible knowledge that our wives and children agonize because of our transgressions and must suffer far more than we do, brings overwhelming feelings of guilt, shame and frustration. To see those you love in such despair, and to be unable to relieve their suffering, while at the same time knowing that you are to blame, is a curse, and no stretch of the imagination can possibly reveal the horror to those who have never experienced it.

When a babe, soon after it is born into this cold world,
is applied to its mother's bosom; its sense of perceiving

All these various kinds of pleasure at length become asso-

sion is presented to us, which by its waving or spiral lines
bears any similitude to the form of the female bosom, whe-
ther it be found in a landscape with soft gradations of
rising and descending surface, or in the forms of some an-
tique vases, or in other works of the pencil and chisel, we
feel a general glow of delight, which seems to influence all
of our senses; and if the object be not too large, we exper-
ience an attraction to embrace it with our arms, and to salute
it with our lips, as we did in our early infancy the bosom
of our mother. And thus we find, according to ingenious i-
dea of Hogarth, that the waving lines of beauty were origi-
nally taken from the temple of Venus.

"DREAM: MONDAY morning 6:30 a.m. 5/11/81"

This night, I awoke in a dream, focusing in out of the grey mist, an eternal background, I came to find myself standing beside a bed. There was a tall slender Black woman standing on the other side, a lamp was burning bright in the corner, its light was amber, soft, warm and "hopeful".

Covered by the sheets, in the bed, lay what would appear to be a corpse. From the strands of gray black hair that wisped, peered through at the edge of the sheet, you could tell, she had been an elder, perhaps a grandmother. Surprisingly my initial reaction was not to study the room, nor was my curiosity so urgently pressing to know who had died, instead, I was steeped, stilled, in the silence of prevailing order.

My eyes locked into those of this stoic Lady, standing on the other side. She wasn't a pretty woman, yet, she was very beautiful, the beauty of her heart's omnipresence, rising to the surface. She who knows the love of good, the rejoicing of right, the ready willing ability to offer up a filled ladle to the lips of an invalid or a dying man, to have rested on her bosom the weeping mind of some dead soldiers fiance and massaged away the aching in the girls temples while humming an ole Negro spiritual, or perhaps the time when she brought happiness to a 5 yr. old child whom no one had seen smile in a year's time; I could imagine all this beauty and more, for surely it was such beauty that illuminated in her face and overflowed from her eyes, I had to look away and smile.

She knelt beside the bed, taking up one of the old womans cracked cold wrinkled hands, rubbing it like a protective mother trying to keep frostbite from her childs fingers. She then raised the withered aged hand to her snootie cheek, closed her eyes, soberly grazed her lips over the limp hand and gently kissed it.

Abruptly she stood and began to straighten the sheets that had wrestled to cover the dead woman; neatly folding back the topsheet until it cuffed and was rested on the forehead. Turning in towards the lamp, her head bowed, she began to wash her hands in the radiance of light, so it seemed.

In tableau, she turned around stepped forward to bedside, stared into my eyes and spoke, "Lord, he is a Christian in his heart and Beliefs; there is much work for him to do, strengthen his spirit with your Love, for hard jagged rocks pave his road and he walks barefoot."

Then she began to sing and a joyful choir accompanied her with harmonies. There was a husky spirited alto voice chanting, "Thank-you, Jesus" and "yes Lord". I knew then it was the freed spirit of the dead elder sister:

I been buked and I been scorned,
Lord, I been buked and I been scorned,

I been talked about sho's You borned.

Earned: You can earn good time here.

Saved: You can save time in dozens of ways

Squandered: Think of the wasted years of your life.

Or Invested: And that's what this is all about.

Confinement can mean spending time aimlessly; wasting a large segment of your life doing nothing while you are here but stretching out on your sack and staring at the ceiling. On the other hand, that same time could be invested in constructive thinking; in planning for the future. Your mind is an energy source, but no energy source has ever accomplished anything before it was harnessed and put into use. Even something as basic as coal or fuel oil cannot be put to use or turned into light and power before being brought to the surface.

An idea belongs only to whoever puts it into use, and the subconscious mind is where ideas are born while you are resting. If my memory serves me correctly, the theory of gravitation came to Newton's mind as he was resting in the shade of an apple tree.

To us the paramount thought should be making it in the outside world.

We know it isn't going to be easy, but if we spend our time in focusing and disciplining our minds our chances will be immeasurably better.

No life ever grows without disciplin.

SICK CALL --- NEW CENTER

Effective Monday, March 2nd, sick call and distribution of medicine will be changed. If you want to see the doctor, nurse, psychiatrist or dentist, fill out a counselor's request slip, include your name and number, and a description of your medical or dental problem. Be specific.

Place the request slip in the box opposite the officer's cubicle marked "MEDICAL REQUEST" The request slips will be collected daily by the medical staff. Sick call will be held in the hospital area when the nurse or medical staff calls. All requests will receive a response. The medic will tour the block areas to dispense medication only on the 12 to 8 shift. If you are on prescribed medication you will receive a medication pass from the hospital which will be kept by the officer on returning to your cell.

LIBRARY NOTICE

The Bridgeport Correctional Center has library facilities available for both sentenced and pre-trial areas. If you wish use the library please follow the procedures established to insure easier distribution of books.

The collection of paperbacks available from the library has been donated to the center by Rev. Smith, Rev. Frank Denton and Father Como. Credit must also be given to Darien Book Aid, an organization which makes reading materials available to state institutions without cost to inmates. Here at this institution we are grateful for their never ending concern and donations.

Look for the library cart which circulates throughout the institution on a weekly basis if you wish to borrow any books. You may borrow as many paperbacks as you want, within reason. We ask your cooperation in returning these books when you are finished reading them, or give them to another inmate so that as many books as possible will be available and in circulation. If you wish to borrow any reference material other than Law Library books, you should make your request to your librarian who will sign the material out to you. This material must be returned in one week so that it would be available to others. Periodically, a list of reference materials maintained in the library will be published in "The Scroll."

Inter-library loan privileges which enable inmates to have access to publications housed in libraries throughout the state are available under the inter-library loan services provided by the State of Connecticut Library.

If you wish to subscribe to, or purchase, a book, publication, periodicals, newspapers etc... Fill out a request slip to your counselor. Put your name and the title of the publication or book on the request slip. This procedure must be followed in order for the counselor to determine whether the publication you wish to order is approved to enter the institution. This step will save the time and effort involved in ordering and paying for a publication only to find that it has been returned to the publisher.

Books which we do not have in stock can be obtained through Inter-Library loan services only by request to the school.

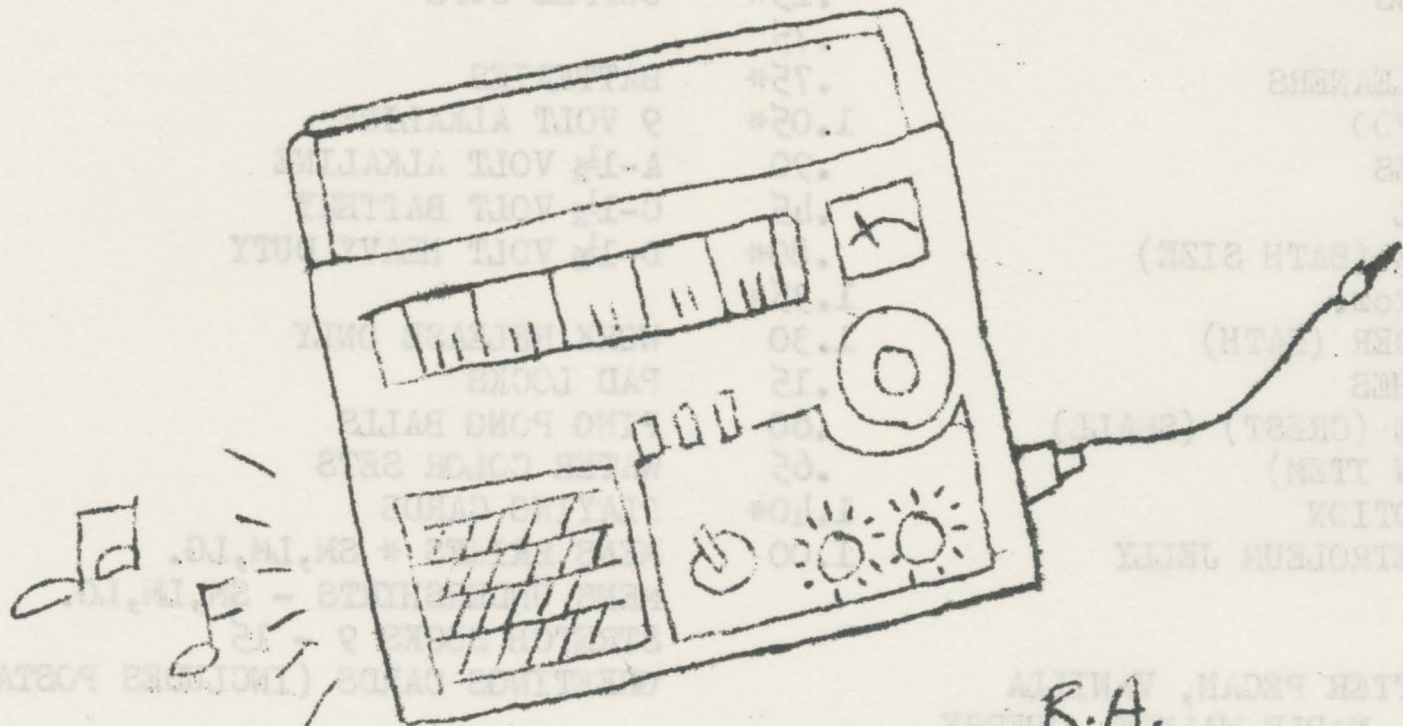

HIS FUNCTION IS TO ASSIST YOU IN PRESENTING YOUR VERSION OF THE SITUATION TO THE DISCIPLINARY BOARD. HE IS REQUIRED TO ASSIST THE BOARD IN UNCOVERING THE TRUE FACTS OF THE INCIDENT, AND DOES NOT FUNCTION AS A "DEFENSE ATTORNEY" HE IS ALSO A RESOURCE FOR YOU TO CONSULT IF YOU HAVE ANY QUESTIONS ON THE NATURE OF THE CHARGE, AND THE APPROPRIATE PENALTIES WHICH COULD RESULT. HIS RESPONSIBILITY TO YOU AND THE CENTER IS TO ASSURE THAT PROPER DISPOSITION IS TAKEN IN REGARDS TO THE DISCIPLINARY PROCESS.

OFFICIAL NOTICE TO ALL INMATES

LEGAL ASSISTANCE TO PRISONER: Free legal to all inmates is provided through all connecticut centers by an organisation called legal assistance to prisoners, (L.A.P.) Attorney Randy Moszy from L.A.P. visits our institution once a week to help the inmates with their civil and legal problems.-L.A.P. cannot help with criminal cases. these must go to the public defenders office or to a private attorney. You, can contact Atty. randy Moszy by writing to her at the L.A.P. office address: 340 Capital Ave. Hartford, CT. 06115.

CO-OP Services: Multi-service Center is an agency that serves those offenders in the greater Bridgeport area. The service provides through staff or referral, counseling, clothing and housing, employment referrals, and educational counseling. CO-OP deals with men and women presently incarcerated or recently released from a correctional center. They bridge the gap between ex-offenders immediate needs and the communities resources. The goal of CO-OP is to help ex-offenders to help themselves. For more information contact your counselor.

II P.M. COUNT: This concerns all east wing inmates. Immediately following the II PM. count, all inmates are expected to stay in their cells and remain there, the entire evening. The only exception will be going to or coming from the lavatory, or to inform an officer of something. Any inmate found outside his cell, loitering, talking loud, etc, will be subject to immediate disciplinary action.

MAIL FOR THE WARDENS: All mail or messages for Warden William Tuthill, Warden Bruce Goldson, or Deputy Warden Robert Gillis is to be placed in the box marked "WARDEN". This box is located in the old building near the entrance to the mess hall. It is located in the new building in each block.

CONTACT VISITS: Pre trial visiting is extended as a privilege to inmates in the pre-trial unit who meet the criteria specified in the NEW INMATE HANDBOOK. The visiting list for contact visits will be reviewed by the classification committee at the time the inmate is initially cleared for contact visits. Any change will be permitted through counselor referral to the Classification Committee. The list will include immediate family and wife or girlfriend only.

If you wish to use the Law Library, fill out a request slip made out to your counselor requesting permission to use the Law Library. When utilizing the Law Library please bear in mind that these are your law books and materials, and that it is up to you to take care of the materials there. In the past these materials have been torn mutilated and stolen. When you use books and other material from the Law Library, please return them as you received them. Another inmate may need them to assist with the legal work on his case. The importance of these materials to those who seek legal assistance cannot be stressed enough.

Sentenced men will be called to the Law Library, which is located in the school area, by means of the public address system. A pass will be issued to the person requesting use of the Law Library. This procedure will apply to all those who reside in the East Wing. You will be allowed the necessary time within the institutional schedule of this establishment. Materials in the Law Library may not be borrowed unless special permission has been granted. Anyone found with materials that were removed from the Law Library without permission will be subject to a disciplinary report. A typewriter, typing paper and carbon paper are available for use in the Law Library by request to your counselor if you are in the New Center, or your teacher if you are in the Old Center.

Notary Public services are available on request to your counselor.
