MESSAGES FROM THE WARDEN'S OFFICES

Inmates are allowed to take out no more than one carton of cigarettes when leaving this facility. This restriction will apply regardless of the status of release.

All inmates should be aware that there is a urine test which provides for the detection of THC. THC is the active ingredient in marijuana and marijuana derivatives. You are hereby advised that this test will be used when we have reason to believe you may have used marijuana. A positive reading will result in disciplinary action.
**Warden William Tuthill

You should be reminded that you are always subject to search of your person (pat down or strip search), at any time, and at the discretion of the staff member who wishes to do so. Such searches may be at random and without cause. You should expect to co-operate with such searches, as failure to do so will result in disciplinary action.

All cell doors are to be kept clean and free of obstructions. The inmates assigned to these cells are warned that if they do not maintain these cells as indicated, they may be subject to disciplinary action. **Warden William Tuthill

Each man is responsible for the condition of his cell. Below is a list of rules which must be adhered to:

1. Nothing will be hung or pasted to the cell bars, doors, or windows in anyway.
2. No more than 3 books, 15 letters, or 5 magazines, are to be kept in at any time.

Effective Monday, 12/7/81, pre-trial inmates housed in double cells are allowed access to the Assembly Room for the purpose of reading and/or writing on a controlled basis, by schedule and advance sign-up procedure. The room will be available Tuesdays, Fridays, and Sundays in three one-hour periods, beginning in the evening at 6:45 P.M. Requests to use the area should be directed to your counselor. You will Not have the option to choose a specific time. You are required to request the use of the room each time you wish to use it. You will be scheduled for one hour per request for the next available session. You may not request reading room access when you still have a request called over the P.A. System.

Regulations

Regulation for reading room use:

1. Once scheduled, you may not change the time period allotted.
2. The period spent in the reading room will not be interrupted by contact visiting. You should notify your visitors if you have requested reading room use.
3. No paper, reading, or writing materials will be provided.
4. Talking, horseplay, or any inappropriate activity is in contradiction to the purpose for which this room is provided, and results in immediate forfeiture of access to the reading room. Disciplinary action may also be taken if warranted.
5. Requests to confer with other inmates through the use of the area will not be honored.
6. Inmates assigned to use the reading room will be restricted to the area for the period specified. Use of the toilet is not allowed, nor will you be released back to your housing area before the scheduled time.

"'Son of Sam' says he belonged to cult"

DANNEMORA, NY (AP) - Son of Sam slayer David R. Berkowitz claimed Tuesday that he was the designated trigger man for a 20-member cult dedicated to "violence, depravity, sex, and murder."

Berkowitz made the assertion in a desposition he gave to attorney Harry Lipsig for a civil suit on behalf of victims' families and those wounded in the series of .44 caliber killings in 1976 and '77.

Berkowitz, serving a 315-years-to-life term at the Clinton Correctinal facility for six murder convictions, previously had claimed membership in a cult but had declined to provide details.

While still not disclosing any facts that could be used to corroborate or disprove his cult claims - claims discounted by the New York City Police Dept. which maintains that berkowitz acted alone - Berkowitz said in the disposition that:

*About half the cult's members, evenly split between male and female, are dead, either through acts of violence or suicide. The dead include John and Michael Carr, literally sons of Sam Carr, Berkowitz' former neighbor.

John Carr died in Febuary of 1978 at Minot Air Force base in North Dakota of possibly self-inflicted gunshot wounds. His brother later died in a one-car crash on a New York city highway.

*The cult's members, ~~even~~ were predominantly white and predominantly white-collar workers, with about 75% of them in the New York City area.

*Cult members killed animals as well as humans. Berkowitz said that it was his understanding that other members had also killed people.

*Members used hallucinogenic drugs.

*Although he bought the .44-caliber gun and ammunition used in his slayings, the ammunition was kept by the cult and dispensed to him for the killings.

Berkowitz emphasized that he was the lone gunman in the attacks in which he pleaded guilty, but maintained that other members of the cult- usually 3 or 4 at a time- accompanied him on his hunts for victims and served as lookouts.

While the victims were picked randomly, Berkowitz said, his cult associates assisted him in the selection process.

Berkowitz said it was posible that the Carr brothers were slain by other members of the cult to silence them because of "plain sickness, moral sickness."

" Only 10 States Celebrating King Birthday "

Nearly 14 years after Martin Luther King was gunned down, the drive to make his birthday a national holiday appears to have stalled, and the day is celebrated as a full legal holiday by only 10 states.

The civil rights leader's 53rd birthday will nonetheless be remembered today around the nation from an annual march through downtown Atlanta to a gospel concert in Chicago, candlelight service in Dayton, Ohio, and human rights award banquet in St. Louis.

The 10 states that celebrate full holidays for King's birthday are Connecticut, Illinois, Kentucky, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Missouri, New Jersey, Ohio and Pennsylvania. Some of those celebrate it on a Monday regardless of the exact date. Several other states give employees the option to take the day off as a "floating" holiday. And many cities, counties and school districts around the nation shut down for the day.

Legislation to make King's birthday a national holiday was introduced in Congress four days after he was assassinated on April 4, 1968, in Memphis, Tenn. The proposal by Rep. John Conyers, D-Mich., has been renewed every session since, but never cleared the house. Hearings are tentatively planned again for next month in a Civil Service subcommittee. Sen. Charles Mc. Mathias Jr., R-Md., is the chief sponsor in the Senate.

"It is long past time to recognize the contributions of Dr. King," said Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., in a speech Wednesday in Atlanta. "Martin Luther King's day must be a day for all Americans, for Martin Luther King's dream is the American dream."

In Pennsylvania, Gov. Dick Thornburgh read a proclamation renewing an annual plea to make King's birthday a holiday for the whole nation, as it is for his state.

"This brave champion of human rights advocated peaceful means to combat attitudes of hatred and intolerance," said Thornburgh. "He offered

a blueprint for racial harmony and social progress which has left an indelible imprint on society."

Opponents say another paid holiday for federal workers would cost too much, and some Southern conservatives have questioned whether such a high honor is merited for King, who would become the first black to be commemorated with a national holiday.

In Philadelphia, Mayor William Green is holding a breakfast to honor King, but the organization representing black city police officers has called for a boycott, charging the Mayor has not done enough to increase the number of black officers.

**** Note: It's really sad when one thinks of all the things that King stood for, and yet he's not considered worthy enough for the Government to make his birthday a national holiday. Yet Lincoln and Washington birthday's are celebrated, and they didn't stand and dedicate their life's like King did. I think that it's time the American People stood up and demanded that Martin Luther King's birthday become a "National Holiday".

" Aaron, Robinson join Hall 1st try "

Hank Aaron and Frank Robinson, two of baseball's greatest sluggers have entered the hallowed halls of Cooperstown in their first try but one of the top pitchers of their era, Juan Marichal, was again left standing at the door.

Aaron, broke Babe Ruth's mark of 714 to become the all-time home run leader with 755, came within nine votes of becoming the first unanimous selection to the Hall of Fame. With 75 percent of the vote necessary for election, Aaron received 406 of a possible 415 votes to finish with a percentage of 97.8.

Only Ty Cobb, who received 98.2 per cent of the vote in the first balloting in 1936, received a higher percentage and only Willie Mays, who got 409 of a possible 432 votes in 1979, received more votes.

Aaron, who played from 1953-76, had a .305 lifetime batting average, 3,771 hits, 2,297 RBI's and led or tied for the league lead in homers and RBI's four times each. He had a single-season high of 47 homers in 1971 but hit 40 or more homers in eight seasons and 30 or more in seven other seasons.

Robinson also was an impressive winner, receiving 370 votes for a percentage of 89.1. Aaron and Robinson are 12th and 13th players elected in their first year of eligibility, exclusive of the five named in the first election.

Robinson, who ranks fourth on the all-time homer list with 586, played in 2,808 games from 1956-76 and compiled a .294 lifetime batting average with 2,943 hits and 1,812 runs batted in. He hit more than .300 in nine seasons and drove in more than 100 runs in six.

Robinson said winning the MVP award in both leagues (1961 with Cincinnati and 1966 with Baltimore) was the highlight of his career while Aaron said his biggest thrill was a home run he hit in 1957 to clinch the pennant for the Milwaukee Braves.

" ATLANTA TRIAL SHOCKER "

ATLANTA - Wayne B. Williams and Nathaniel Cater sat together on a park bench about a week before Cater's body was found in the Chattahoochee River, a witness testified yesterday at Williams' murder trial.

The surprise testimony marked the first time anyone had told of seeing Williams with either of the two youths he is accused of killing.

Williams has denied knowing them or any of the 26 other young blacks whose deaths have been investigated by a special police task force.

Margaret Cater, who said she had been a friend of Cater's since 1978, testified that she saw Williams and Cater on the bench near the apartment of Cater's parents.

Williams, a 23-year-old black free-lance photographer, is charged with killing Cater, 27, and Jimmy Ray Payne. No arrests have been made in the 26 other slayings.

Prosecutors contend Williams threw Cater's body off a Chattahoochee River bridge before dawn on May 22, 1981, two days before the body was found downstream.

" Cop claims Tut's curse felled him "

SAN FRANCISCO - King Tut's mask. Does it carry a curse? Police officer George LaBrash of San Francisco is hoping the courts give credence to the Egyptian curse of the dead.

Superior Court Judge Richard P. Figone said yesterday he would rule within 60-days on LaBrash's claim for \$18,400 as disability.

LaBrash claims the spirit of Tutankhamun, the Egyptian boy king who lived 3300 years ago, hexed him while he guarded the famed King Tut exhibit in San Francisco in 1979.

LaBrash, who watched over the most precious piece exhibited, King Tut's gold burial mask, one of the world's greatest archeological finds, said he suffered a stroke while standing guard. He blames the stroke on a

course which ancient Egyptians believed afflicts those who disturb the dead.

" Nuclear Jets in Cuba? "

WASHINGTON - U.S. SPY planes have spotted crates of new Russian jet fighters with possible nuclear capability on an airfield outside Havana, the Pentagon said yesterday.

Defense officials suspect that the planes are a bombing version of the super-sophisticated MiG-23 Flogger.

If so, it could mean a violation of the 1962 Washington-Moscow "understanding" that ended the Cuban missile crisis.

The Russians at that time promised to send no more offensive weapons to Cuba.

The MiG-21 and MiG-23 fighters sent to Cuban President Fidel Castro since 1962 have been described by Washington and Havana as defensive, meaning they are armed to knock down enemy planes.

The Washington Post reported and the New York Post confirmed yesterday that the Pentagon believes the new planes are offensive weapons.

A senior Pentagon official said last night, "What we've seen is a heck of a lot of crates and many of them house that kind of aircraft.

He noted that the Flogger is a version of what Moscow often sends to its Warsaw Pact allies.

But he added that the Pentagon is not concerned that the Flogger can carry A-bombs because "no one believes Moscow would give Castro nuclear capability."

But there is concern that the new warplanes "will give Cuba the capability to go beyond the confines of their own defense needs."

It is feared that the new planes will allow Cuba to send its older aircraft to Nicaragua to be used to help leftist topple the government of El Salvador.

The arrival in Cuba of the shipment of six to eight planes creates a dilemma for President Reagan.

Pair Found Guilty In Purolater Killings

WATERBURY- A Superior Court jury Tuesday found Lawrence Pelletier and Donald Couture guilty of felony-and intentional murder charges in connection with the April 1979 shooting deaths of three Purolater Security Corp. guards during a \$1.86-million robbery at the firm's Dunbar lane depot here.

After deliberating 24 hours during a five day period, the jury found Pelleteir and Courture guilty of 10 of the 11 charges pending against them. There was, however, one acquittal. The jury found Courture innocent of intentional murder in the death of William West, one of the three slain guards.

Pelletier was found guilty of three counts each of intentional murder and felony murder, while Courture was found guilty of three counts of felony murder, but only guilty of intentional murder in connection with the death of Leslie Clark.

A third charge of intentional murder originally lodged against Couture in connection with the death of Edward Cody, an off-duty Hartford policeman who worked a second job with Purolater, was dismissed in January 1981 because of faulty wording in the indictment.

Couture, 29, of Wallingford, and Pelletier, who will turn 39 today, stood mute and expressed no emotion as jury foreman Robert D. McKinnon announced the verdicts and the remaining jurors indicated their agreement when polled by the court clerk.

The verdict brought an end to a lengthy trial, during which some 57 persons testified for both the state and the defense and more than 300 pieces of evidence were made exhibits. The verdict came at 5:15 pm on the 33rd day of the case. It took nine weeks to complete jury selection and 10 additional weeks to bring the trial to its verdict.

Security was tight, with a large contingent of Waterbury policemen, state police troopers and county sheriffs filling the courtroom, along with members of the slain guard's families, court observers and spectators with no personal interest in the outcome of the case, as the verdicts were returned.

Judge T. Clark Hull, who presided over the two-month trial, warned those in the packed courtroom against any outbursts. There were none, but members of the victims' families
