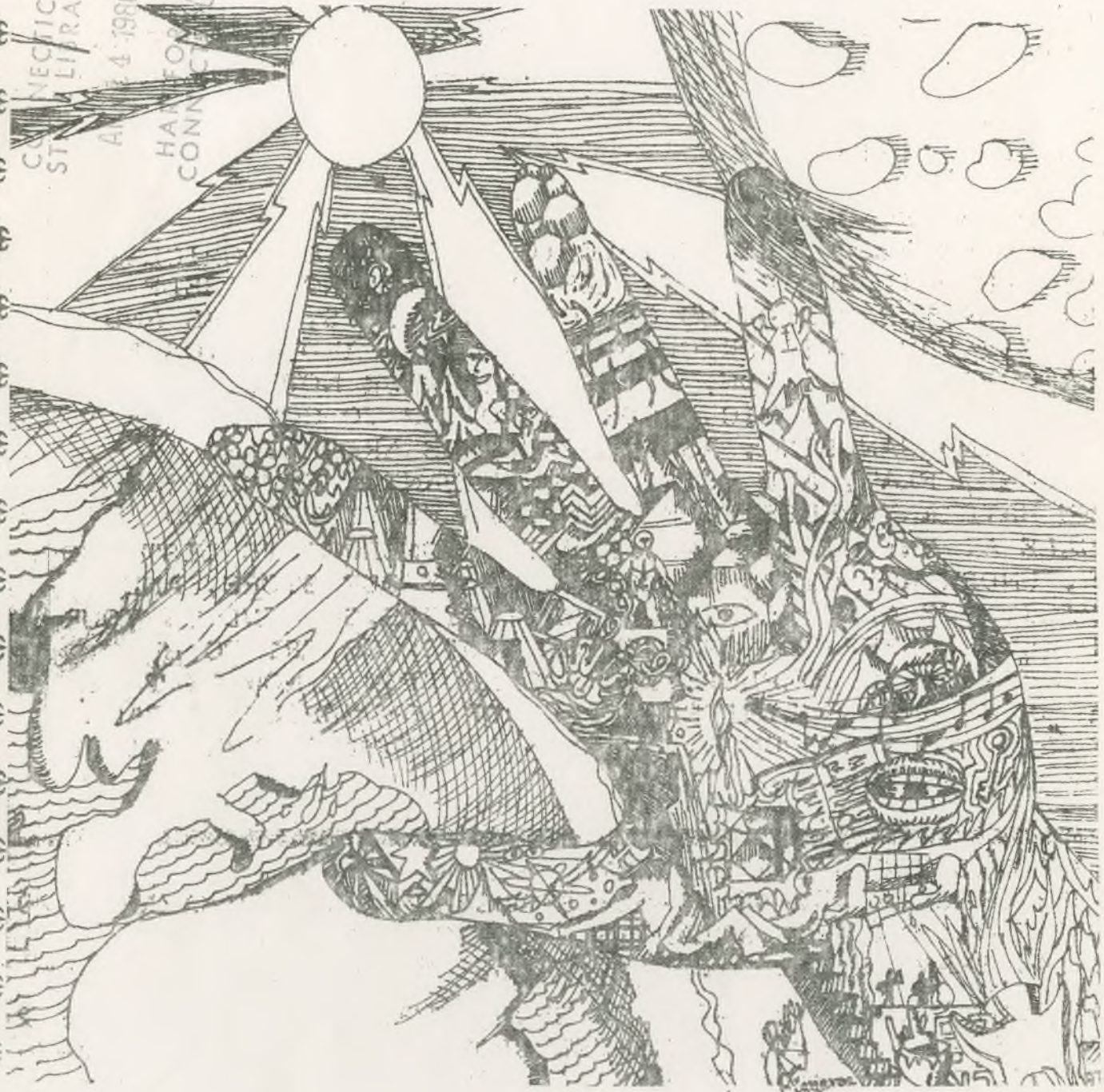

Article #1 Sexual Drive

The second most intensive drive that human beings have is that of sex. Hunger is the first. Our society, as in most, limits sexual expression through laws and other social restrictions. Awareness of the sex urge for most individuals is more persistent than any other drives which are not so likely to go unsatisfied; again, mainly because of the social limitations on sexual behavior. This continual conflict between the sexual drive and the culture restrictions on its expression, makes sex one of the most powerful forces influencing human behavior. Unlike most biological drives, sex is not essential to keeping an individual alive, though obviously, it is necessary to the survival of human beings, as a species.

The strength of the sexual drive is influenced by the presence or absence of certain hormones. These hormones in the male are produced in the testes and in the female, in the ovaries. Emotional and past learning play a part in determining both the strength of the sexual urge and the manner of its expression. Certain specific experience during the infancy stage are necessary to the development of normal sexuality.

In the male, androgens are the hormones that are produced by the testes. The supply is relatively constant, showing no monthly cycles as does the woman's hormonal system. Due to fatigue, and other physical and psychological factors there is fluctuations in the sex drive. For men, the sex drive peaks in their late teens and begins to decline in the early twenties. The gradual reduction in the sexual urge is due mainly by the decrease in the amount of androgen secreted. Other social factors contributing to a diminished sexual urge are the tiring of the sexual partner or of becoming preoccupied with social, family, and economic interests. All levels of the nervous system normally play a part in the integration of sexual behavior.

In the female, the ovaries secrete hormones called estrogen which influences the sexual urge, and progesterone which is important in pregnancy. The secretion of estrogen into the blood system is greatest each month just before and after ovulation. Ovulation usually occurs about halfway between two menstrual periods. Most experts think that it is this short time when women are most capable of becoming pregnant; but it is also possible that fertilization could occur at any time in the monthly cycle. The physiological responses of women during

sexual activity are similar to those of men.

In both men and women purely biological processes play only a partial role in sexual desire, rather than determining it almost entirely as in the lower animals. Difference in hormone concentration does not account for homosexuality.

A psychologist by the name of K.R. Hardy believes that sex is largely a learned appetite rather than an innate drive. This theory holds that sexual appetite grows with experience. In our society children are restricted from engaging in much sexual activity until after puberty when they are encouraged to show interest in members of the opposite sex. The dating couple will hold hands and through this experience the pleasurable feelings will reinforce their handholding behavior. Yet, at the same time there is no pleasure in holding the hand of an inappropriate sex partner. Thus the action of holding hands with an appropriate person is part of a learned pattern. As this is continually reinforced, other behaviors such as kissing comes to be added. When these are further reinforced by pleasurable feelings, embracing or petting may be tried. It is important to realize that as new sexual activities are engaged in, new sets of associations are formed and more and more cues come to be associated with sexual desires. This theory, then, indicates that desires are not irresistible drives but appetites which can be varies and adjusted. But whatever the theory, knowing more about sex, tells us more about human beings.

Legislators face decisions on criminal sentencing

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Should a criminal be freed from prison after serving only part of a sentence? Should a judge's decision on a sentence be final, or should the prisoner be allowed to appeal it? And what is the purpose of prison: punishment or rehabilitation?

Within the next month, the Connecticut General Assembly will try to answer those and other questions in grappling with a bill that would gut the present sentencing system and rebuild another in its place.

The bill, approved late last month by the Judiciary Committee, would abolish the practice of allowing prisoners to be released on parole, and it would eliminate the parole board. It would require specific sentences — five years in prison instead of two-to-five years, for example. It would bar prisoners sentenced to less than three years from appealing their terms. And it would give the state's correction commissioner authority to request early release of a prisoner in certain circumstances.

The new system would not apply to prisoners sentenced under previous laws.

The bill has broad implications, not just for law-breakers but for the rest of society, according to Howard Sacks, a University of Connecticut Law School professor who has studied the measure and opposes it.

He says it allows a sentencing judge "almost unfettered discretion" in imposing prison terms, leading to an increased possibility that criminals convicted of the same crime could be given different sentences.

"The general public ought to be concerned about justice," he said in an interview. "If you send people to prison unjustly, they may be even more wicked when they emerge."

The bill's main backer is Rep. Alfred Onorato, D-New Haven, who was a state prosecutor in New Haven 11 years. Onorato, a member of the Judiciary Committee, disagrees with the claim that the bill would lead to disparate sentences for similar crimes.

"An individual is sentenced on the basis of the crime he committed," Onorato said, not on the whim of judges and prosecutors.

Behind the bill lies the whole question of what purpose prison terms serve.

Richard Reddington, chairman of Connecticut's Parole Board, said that by the time a prisoner comes up for parole, the board has accumulated information on the prisoner's conduct in prison or in work programs. That

means in some cases, he said, the Parole Board is in a better position than the sentencing judge to make a decision on when a prisoner should be released.

But Onorato said the Parole Board should not "second-guess" the sentencing judge. He said the judge should impose a sentence based on the seriousness of the crime and the criminal's record. The board should not try to determine when a prisoner is rehabilitated, he said.

"The committee found the purpose of prison is punishment," Onorato said, "not rehabilitation."

Connecticut would not be the first to abolish parole.

The Maine legislature established fixed sentences and eliminated the state parole board in 1976.

Peter Tilton, assistant director of probation and parole in Maine, said the law was backed

by conservatives who wanted tougher sentences for offenders, and by liberals who considered indeterminate sentences a violation of prisoners' rights.

Reddington, who has examined the Maine system, said enrollment in education programs in Maine prisons dropped substantially after the new law was passed. Previously, he said, participation in such programs was considered by the parole board in the decision on whether to release a prisoner.

"There's no incentive for a prisoner in a system like that," Reddington said of the new system. "You're just warehousing people."

But Onorato claimed that one of the prime benefits of the bill he helped draft is that except for time off for good behavior, sentences would no longer be ambiguous.

"Nobody likes to go to jail," he said, "but at least the defendant, the family, the judge and the public would know when he's getting out."

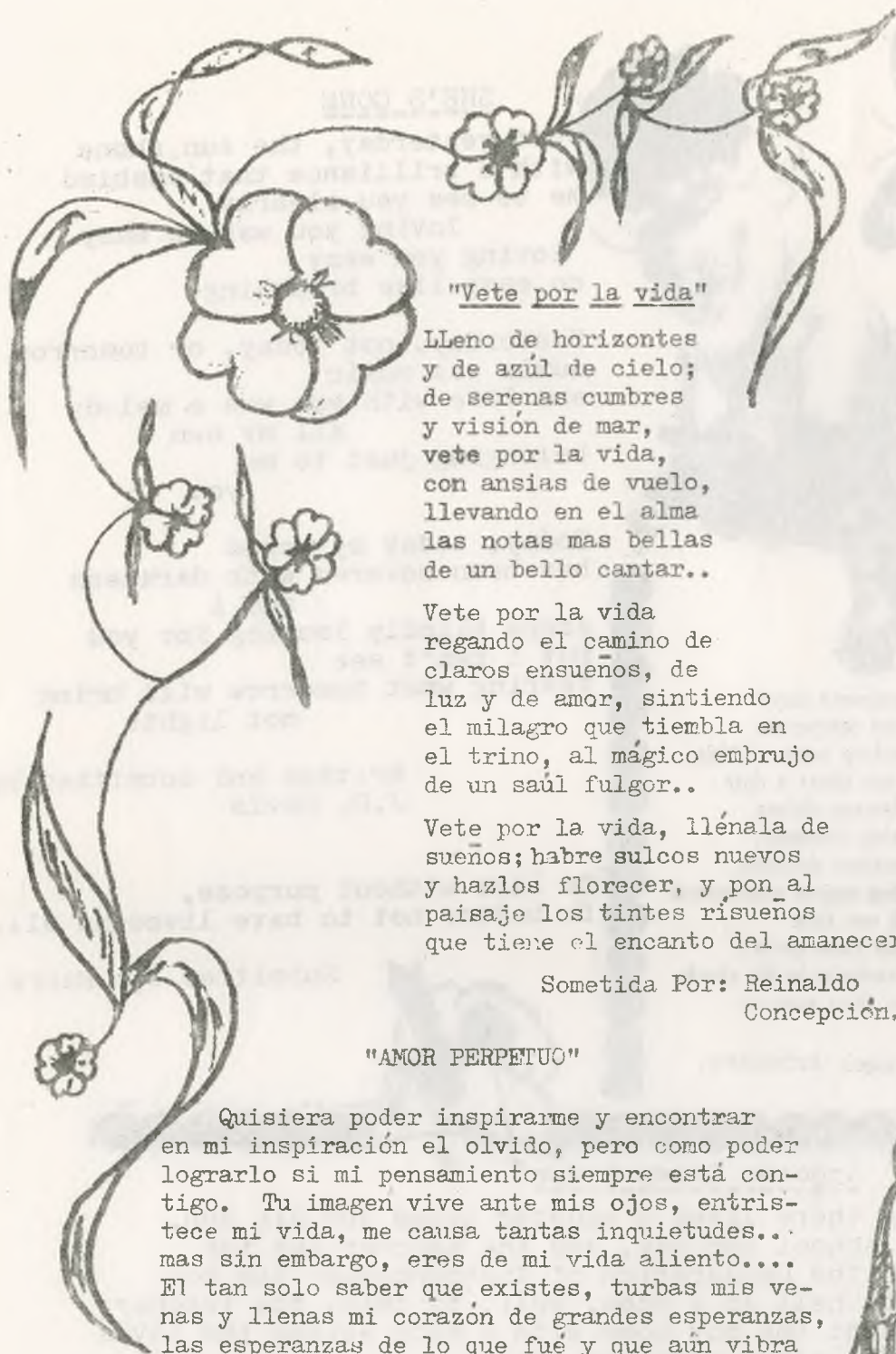

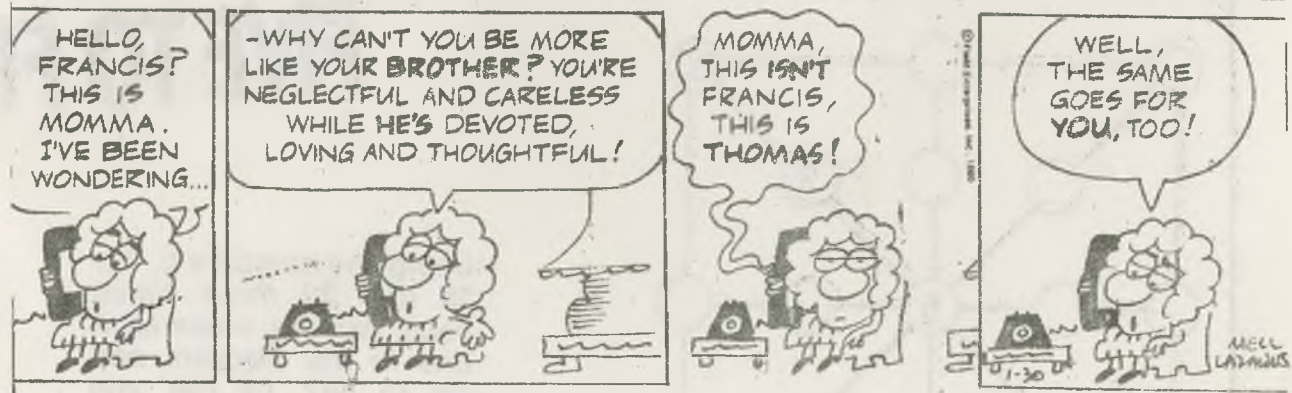

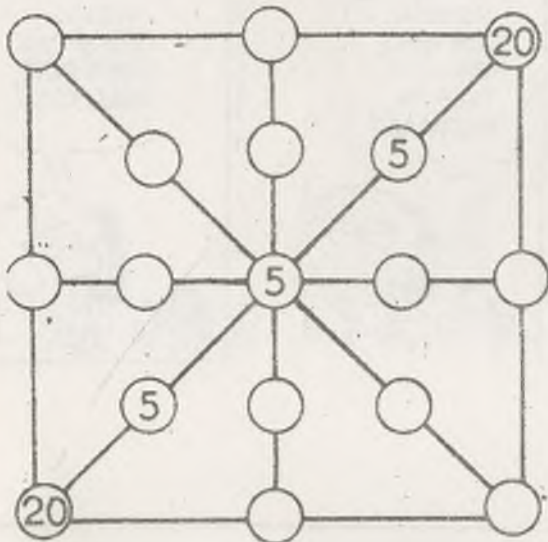
