COMMENTS ON SOMEONE & SOME EDUCATED GUESSES

A week or two ago someone wrote to the editor with comments on DIARY OF AN UNBORN CHILD, a piece that had been printed by the Scene several weeks before. The commentor did not identify himself beyond a signature: "English Lit. 4". With little or no regard for my own limitations in the area of evaluating humans and their emotions, some of which are severe, I will now comment on the nature of the Commentator.

Writing reveals a lot about its author, and the author of the comments on an UNBORN CHILD shows himself to be one very good writer. Also he indicates that he reads the German language in his mentioning difficulties in translating. If he translated the article he must be able to read the language of the original, naturally. To speak humorously about WWII Germany, yet to keep the facts straight, takes some kind of knowledge of the subject. Commentator has a good background in WWII German history which shows both in his serious comment and in his semi-humor, or sarcasm, or whatever he considers it.

Commentator's comment on German Mystique tells us that Commentator is aware of the "German Question", probably from several different points of view, and therefore also familiar with German history in general. This German Mystique comment is crucial in my evaluation. Ordinarily one who is interested enough to be cognizant of something like this, and disapproves, expresses himself in dogmatic, even hateful terms: Common man has become fanatical when in possession of this type of information. Commentator isn't fanatical, content to make one simple statement. He is probably quiet-spoken, friendly, as are most intelligent, yet non-fanatical people.

Now, if you will, a description in short of our Commentator: A man of semitic origin, or a converted Jew, speaking excellent English, probably with no accent and certainly not with a German accent, quiet in manner and at least outwardly friendly to almost everyone. If he has a job, if he is a prisoner and not a civilian, which is a possibility, and if he has been here any length of time, he is probably a clerk or the equivalent, but if he is new, then he might be doing any kind of work.

Such are my thoughts, Set down here, For no particular reason.

The adjustment of instruction to the powers, capabilities, and interests of the learners does not mean the watering down of the educational program. Rather, the appealing to their interests will be a decisive factor in their motivation. An old saying is "You only get out what you put into something." The motivated learner will be stimulated to be more studious, and have more facts on whatever subject he is interested in.

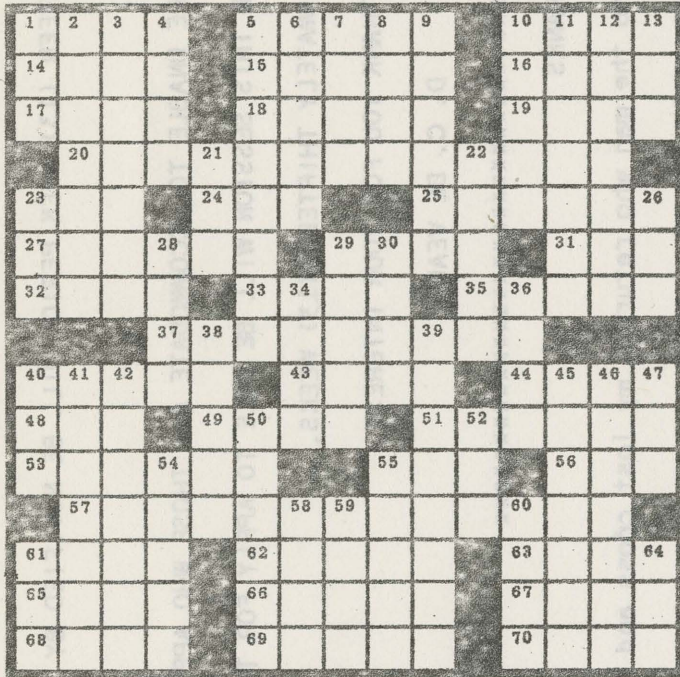

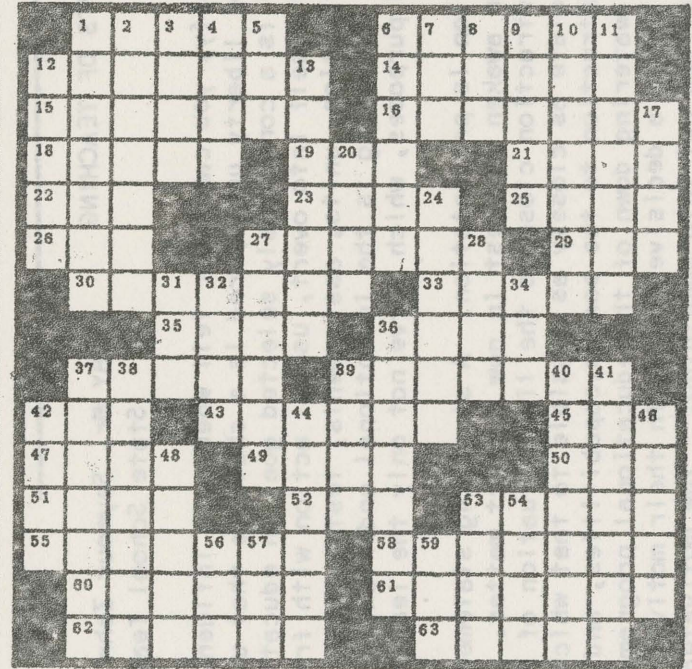

Mon. 3/18/69 The Bullets rolled up thier eleventh straight win in a row tonight by squeezing by the hawks...54 to 48. The Hawks tried desperately to pull off the upset, but Knighton's clutch scoring in the second half was to much for the Hawks to overcome. Held to only 4 points in the first half, Knighton turned it on in the second half to score 19 big ones as he ended up with 23 for the night to take game honors. The Hawks Smith was close behind as he hit the nets for 22 points. At halftime the game was tied 23 all. The Bullets out-rebounded the Hawks 52 to 44 as Berry had 16, Knighton 12 and May 11. Top rebounder for the Hawks was Markey with 15. The Bullets did very good at the foul line, as they hit 14 out of 18. The Hawks did well also hitting on 8 for 17, as the Bullets had 13 team fouls called on them, compared to 11 on the Hawks. Also scoring for the Bullets was Berry with 15, Johnson and May 6 each, Keeby and Murrell 2 points each. Hawks scoring were Markey 9, Cade 7, Santos 6 and Gilmore 4. The Bullets lead the league, while the Hawks in loosing are now tied for third with the Lakers as each team has a 6 won and 7 loss record. This was the forth meeting between these two clubs and the Bullets have won all for by the scores of....52-43, 56-51, 43-34, 54-48.

Wed. March 19, 1968 Durnell had a field day tonight as he pumped home 22 points and grabbed 24 rebounds in leading the Lakers to an upset win over the second place Knicks...68-57. This was the fourth meeting between these two teams this year and the Lakers have won 3 of the by scores of 51-50, 55-46, 68-57. The Knicks won the other by the score of 60-50. Trailing 48-44 in the final period, the Lakers Durnell and Rooney ran wild as the scored 20 points between them for a 20 to 9 point advantage in that period. The leagues leading Rooney ended up with 19 points for the night. Harper had 10, B. Nelson 6, L. Nelson 5, Reed 4 and Oliver 2. The Lakers had a big rebounding edge 68 to 53. Top scorer for the Knicks was Taylor with 17, Hewett had 16, Anderson 13, Pressley 8, Rogers 2 and Holmes scored 1 point. The Knicks did fairly well at the foul line, hitting 9 out of 18, while the Lakers did poor as usual at the line hitting only 4 of 25. The Knicks were guilty of 20 personals, while the Lakers had 13 called on them. As foul shots go, the Knicks have hit on 119 free throws out of 230 attempts for a 57.8 per cent shooting average, while the Lakers have the worst average in the league hitting on 87 out of 282 shots for a very poor 30.9 percent.

Markey had 31 points, Smith 30 and Cade 22, in leading the Hawks to a lopsided 93 to 48 shellacing of the Celtics. The 93 points rolled up by the Hawks was the highest point production this year by an intra-mural team. The old record was the 90 points the Knicks had against the Celtics earlier this year. Markey's record 31 points in this game tied the most points by a player this year as Anderson had 31 earlier this year against the Celtics. The Celtics who seem to be at the receiving end of most records this year lost their 14th straight game this year. These two teams have met four times this year with the Hawks taking all of the games by scores of 59-46, 65-59, 58-57, 93-48. Top rebounder for the Hawks was Cade with 16. Holloway had 22 for the Celts. The Celtics hit on 10 of 22 from the foul line, while the Hawks hit 5 of 14, as the Hawks had 15 personals, the Celtics 10.

Sat. March 22, 1969 Bullets 70 Knicks 51

This afternoon the Bullets racked up their 12th straight win in a row as they rolled over the second place Knicks 70 to 51. Trailing 28 to 24 at halftime, the Bullets outscored their opponants 46 to 23 in the second half to win going away. The Knicks Anderson was high scorer for the afternoon with 28 points as ne took over second place in total points in intra-mural with 235. Rooney of the Lakers leads with 240. Taylor had 13, Holmes 6, Pressley and Rogers 2 each to round out the scoring for the Knicks. For the Bullets Knighton had 17, Berry 15, Johnson 14, Keeby 8, May and Murrell 6 each and Lynn 4. Knighton and Berry picked off 22 rebounds apiece to lead the Bullets, while Pressley had 14, Holmes 11 for the Knicks. The Bullets had 59 rebounds the Knicks 44.
