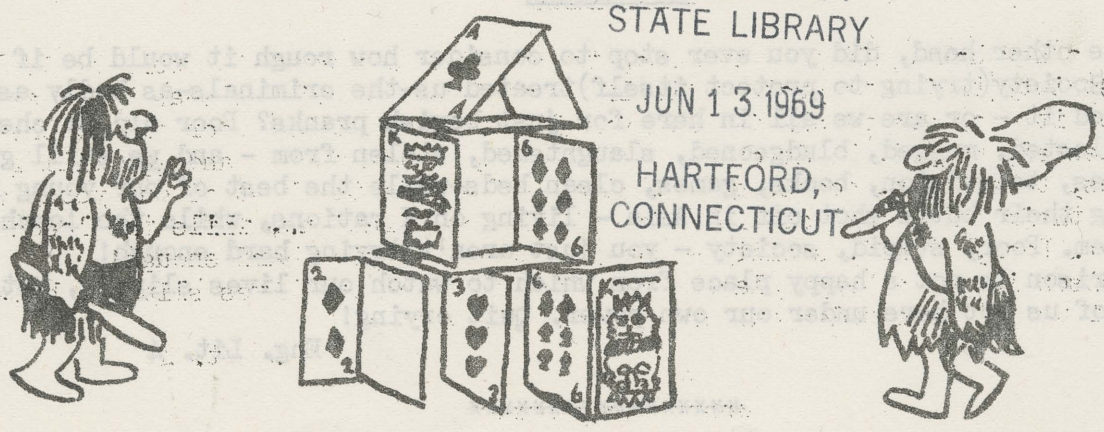

CHANGES IN THE JUDICIARY

The complexity of present day court organizations along with an ever increasing number of legal controversies has led to delay and confusion in the administration of justice. The situation cannot long endure if justice under law is to continue as the foundation upon which Americans construct their democratic way of life. Too many courts operate under constitutional provisions enacted at a time when the horse was a means of transportation and the candle lighted our way. When faced with the choices of progress or stagnancy and consequent deterioration, man has adopted and developed new, more efficient means for achieving his ends. Judicial Administration must meet its challenge now.

The problem has not been ignored. On the contrary, many states have had success in their efforts to revitalize their judicial machinery and to unify their court systems. Many states continue to work for reform where needed. Without a doubt the future holds promise of additional change and improvement. But improvement must come by way of examinations of first principles and overhauling the entire structure. Too much has been attempted in piece-meal fashion, and failure is so often traceable to those well intended but incomplete efforts. Effective revisions for a judicial system must have as a core for growth at least the following: controls for efficient administration of the courts built into the system itself, competent judges selected on a non-partisan, non-political basis and a simplified and unified court structure. These elements are not definitive but they are a necessary beginning if the role of the law is to be one equal to society's demands.

To persist in believing that the courts of today are effectively handling the situations arising in the communities, suburbs and the ghettos is to give credit to a system that has long been decayed by corruption. The crime rate that is so prevalent in the courts today has been established by the members of society that refuse to allow freedom of choice and changes so necessary for a democratic nation.

The sentences are far too exorbitant for the crimes committed and the crime of punishment is a never ending battle against society and the less fortunates. Those of you who know me realize that I speak from experience of dealing with those who fancy themselves the lawmakers and the pillars of society. They do so to protect an image of wholesomeness and purity not to better those they punish. We cannot expect these people to open their homes to us and their businesses. So we must hope that that the judicial fortress of society will make the necessary changes and allow room for criticism and enlightenment.

I for one sincerely hope that the new administration in the nation's capitol will bring a new law and reform to our courts of conviction.

"WHO IS YOUR KEEPER?"

At birth: you have been born into the world. You are cuddled, pampered, shown affection. You are cared for, because you are helpless. You are loved. You are dependent. Who is your Keeper? Your parents. They care for you, provide for you, etc. You are their responsibility. They are your keepers. You have two keepers.

Youngster: you've grown. You can get around, help yourself. You are not entirely held responsible for the mischievous things you do. You are chastised and lectured, at times. You are shown affection, loved. You attend grammar school. You are dependent. Who is your Keeper? Your parents and teacher. Your parents continue their obligations, etc. Your teacher must maintain the responsibility of your parents to a degree, when you are in school. They are your keepers. You have three keepers.

Teenager: you've grown a little older now. You really get around. You need not be assisted or cared for as much now. You can think clearly for yourself. You are held only half responsible for your behavior. You are chastised and lectured at times. You are loved. You attend high-school. You are dependent. Who is your Keeper? You, your parents, your teacher. Your parents continue their obligations, etc. Your teacher must continue to maintain the duties passed down, when you are in school. You must try to protect yourself, among other things. You all are keepers. You have four keepers.

Adult: you've finally reached maturity. You are not a newborn, youngster, teenager. You think entirely for yourself. You are held entirely responsible for your behavior. You provide for and protect yourself, etc. You are not chastised and lectured now. Maybe you are loved. You are independent. Who is your Keeper? You. You are your own keeper. You now have one keeper.

It is essential at times to ask yourself that question. Who is your keeper? You are your own keeper. You can not expect your parents, teachers, or anyone else to live for you. It is up to you to make your life desirable and satisfactory. As adults, too many think they have keepers, maybe not in the conscious mind, but in the sub-conscious mind. They have evidently, not matured. They seem to hold everyone, other than themselves responsible for their own failures, misery, misfortunes, etc. They seem to feel that someone, if not everyone, is obligated to them, which is utterly ridiculous. True, they have matured physically, but they are as the newborn, youngster, and teenager in mind. They seem to feel that other are still obligated, to be their keepers.

If you happen to think or feel like this at times, consciously or sub-consciously, it is time for you to grow up and face reality, and ask yourself, who is my KEEPER, other than myself?

ARE WE, NOT HUMAN ?

I have sacrificed my original article for this week, to draw your attention to the disposition in general, of the employees of this institution, for I feel it is mine as well as your obligation to "request", and "seek" human treatment. I have found and you've probably found also, that there are quite a minority of employees working here at the institution, that have that so called, "don't give a damn attitude", as to whether the inmates live or die, see or go blind, among other things. To a degree, as an inmate with not much confinement time left, can tolerate a lot of things, but I can not and will not allow inhuman treatment to go un-noticed, or to be ignored. Those of you who have long terms to complete, are actually the ones

that must decide whether to remain a mistreated individual, or an individual who is treated human and shown human respect, but I, as well as others in my category of only a short time left to complete confinement, must also decide, regardless of the short time left. It is an obligation.

This past week, and this week as well, three incidents occurred, that were definitely deliberate, inhuman, inconsiderate, and un-natural for employees who are (I emphasize) suppose to be assisting in the rehabilitation and physical welfare of the inmates of this institution. I was unfortunately involved in one particular incident, and I witnessed two.

(1.) An inmate (not mentioning his name) came to sick call, seeking to see the doctor for an examination for his eyes, but was refused, before he could complete his request. He asked for an appointment, but was refused this also. He was quite calm and orderly in every respect, but was threatened to be sent to segregation, if he insisted upon seeing the doctor, or asking how he could get an appointment.

(2.) An inmate went to see the psychologist to see about the medication he was receiving for a nervous condition, that was not taking effect. He was told in a tone of voice that was nasty and infuriating: There is no time to be bothered with you, or your problems, now get out of my office!

(3.) Three inmates were ordered out of the sick room, for merely smiling.

These incidents may sound ridiculous or exaggerated, but they are not. They may seem un-important, but being logical, I feel if this happens once; the same thing will happen again, and again, and again, maybe to someone who is seriously ill. It is unfortunate that situations of this kind, continue to be ignored, and practiced more and more. The least, "we can do", is to "request" human treatment and consideration, now not tomorrow, for it maybe too late. We are obligated to ourselves, to make sure we are in good physical and mental condition at all times, "if we want to go on living". We can not, and should not stand by and ignore inhuman treatment, in no way, form or fashion, for we would definitely be endangering our own lives.

I hope those of you who read this important article of concern, will make an effort, and wake up to the reality, and the Nature of our present conditions in this institution. There are various other things that need adjustments in this institution especially confused and un-necessary rules, but our health is the most important. I now ask all of you, including myself, are we, not human?

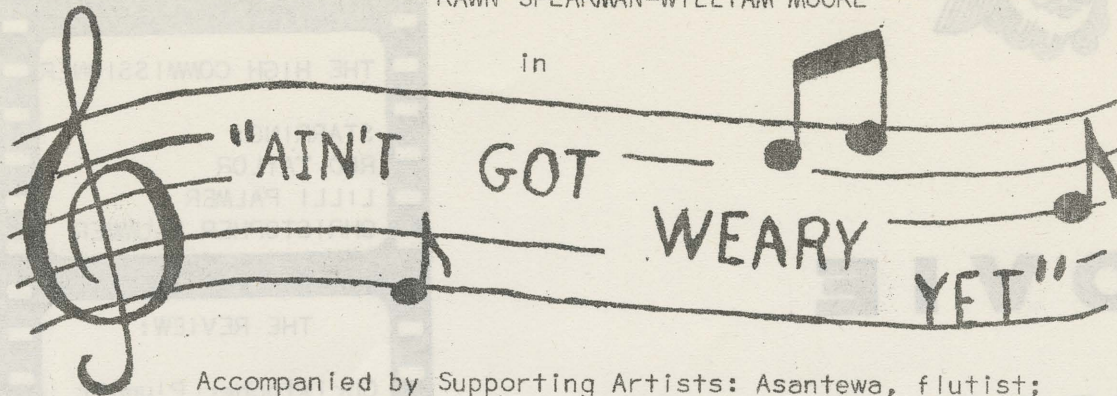

MORE HARM THAN GOOD

Do the nation's correctional facilities, especially institutions for juveniles, do more harm than good?

In many cases, this may be so

While authoritative, up to date national statistics are hard to come by, the President's Crime Commission noted that a "substantial" percentage of the 2.5 million persons admitted each year to the correctional system become recidivists; they go on to commit more, and often more serious, crimes. In 1962, for example, 79 per cent of the offenders committed to the Massachusetts Correctional Institution at Walpole had previously served time in correctional institutions that did not, for them, correct, or in reform schools that did not, for them, reform.

In his series on "Children in trouble," Christian Science Monitor reporter Howard James finds juvenile institutions across the country characterized by the mixing of hardened hoodlums and simply neglected children; emphasis on confinement and punishment, often physical, instead of rehabilitation and treatment; widespread homosexuality; deliberate psychological as well as physical isolation from society; and the fostering of robot-like dependency which makes difficult, if not impossible, a successful adjustment at the end of confinement.

George F. McGrath, former Massachusetts correction head and now chief of the New York City correction system, told James that correctional agencies "contribute enormously to the crime rate."...

What all this calls for, of course, is improvement of all correctional programs, especially those treating people who might form the nucleus of the coming criminal generation. This, in turn, means not only more money, more rehabilitation personnel, and more programs aimed at reform and less at revenge, but also finding new ways of dealing with offenders—such as community-based treatment facilities—that will keep the number actually institutionalized to a minimum. It also means increased usage of the non-institutional correctional approaches such as probation and parole.

Such reforms will necessitate taking a broad overview of the criminal justice system. If the goal of the system is an orderly society, is that goal served merely by the dispensing of justice? That is, is it enough to arrest an offender properly and judge him fairly if the end result is a sentence to an institution that will return him to society with an attitude more clearly anti-social than at the beginning of the process?

To have and hold you tight.

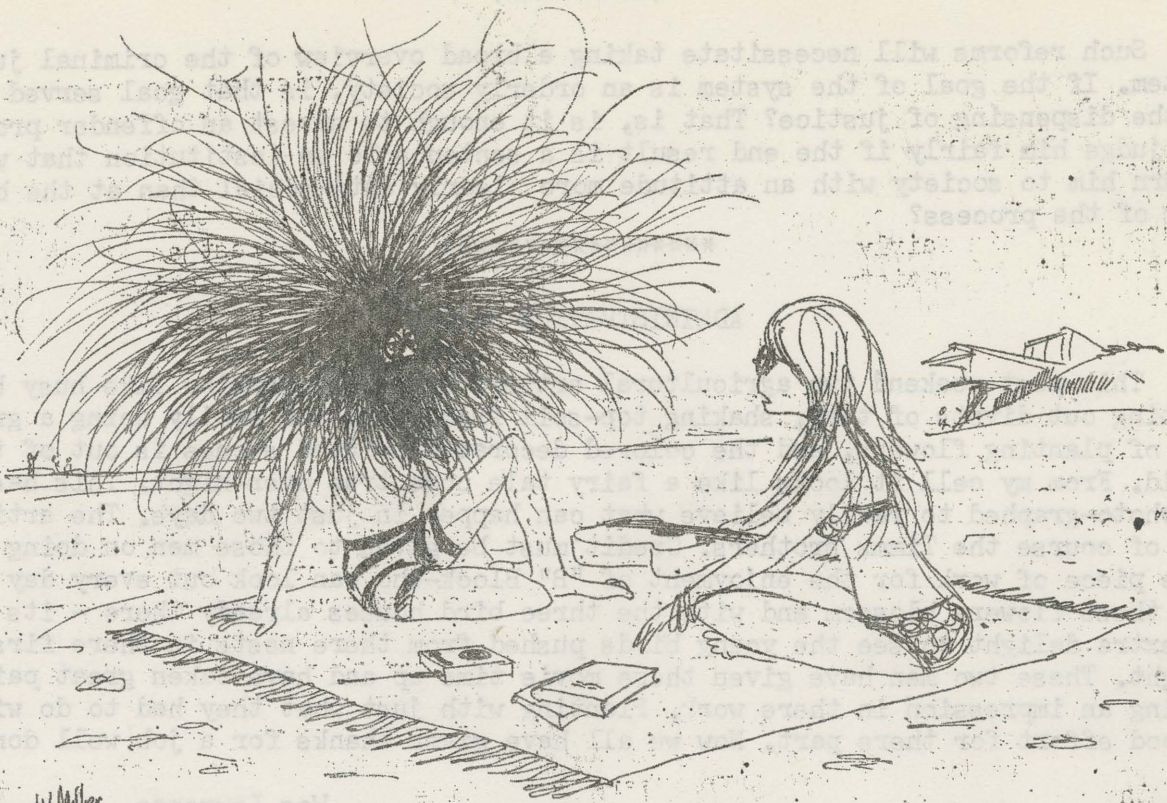
Since you've been gone the way is long

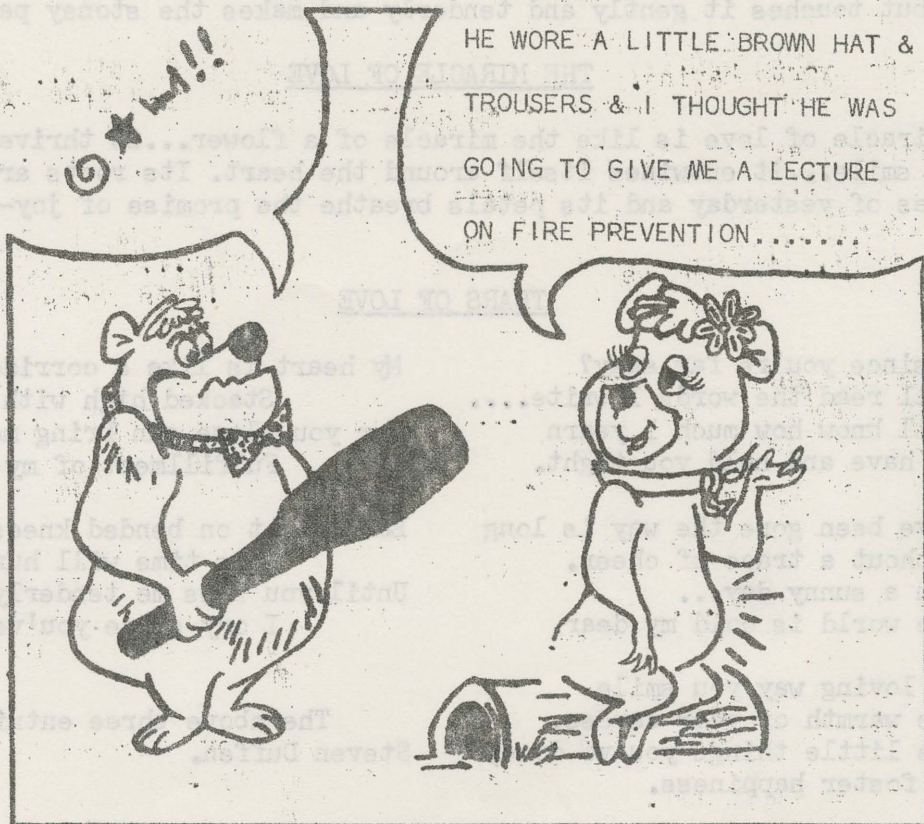
