## PARDON BOARD APPLICAT $\mathcal{P}$

All inmates who are planning to make application to the Board of Pardons for appearance at the fall sessions are encouraged to submit their requests to Mr. Farnham, Supervisor of Records, as soon as possible.

These requests should be submitted immediately, if possible, and inmates are reminded that the last day for receiving requests is February $16,1970$.

## APPLICATIONS RESULTING IN A STARRED (*) CASE

Under the established rules of the Pardon Board, cases cannot be heard if the petitioner has:
(1) appeared within a year
(2) served less than a year
(3) appeared or was eligible for parole

It is also the policy of the Board not to hear a case if the petitioner has any pending legal action such as an appeal or a writ of habeas corpus.

A starred case in one of these categories is very rarely heard. By therefore, walting for a regular session, not only are inmates saved the labor of preparing required letters, but friends, lawyers, prison staff, State's Attorneys, and the Board is spared the effort which should be given regular petitioners.

It is suggested that before undertaking the task of a starred pet$i t i o n$, an inmate should seek the advice of the prison staff, which will be readily given.
