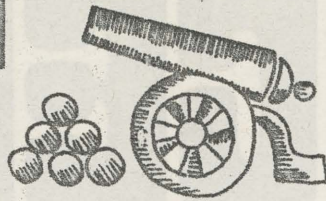
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Editorial Shots

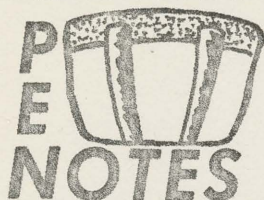
A Reader's Opinion!

FLIMSY LEGAL TECHNICALITIES

One of the most important ideas behind our present News Media is the reporting of "Truthful & Accurate" news. On Sunday the 12th of August 1970 an article was published about the Warden and the institution. After having read the article of three pages, from one of the States Leading Newspapers, I find an air of disgust reaks around the article.

Let us start from the beginning, where the Warden was supposedly out front when the guests started arriving, and paced the gym while watching inmate's with their family and friends eating and drinking. If this is all supposed to have taken place in June of 1970, as the article suggests, then I ask everyone that was there if they remember how untrue it is, because we all ate in the "Left Hand Side Of The Main Chow Hall." But, if you all think back, to this June of 1970, the Warden did not even attend the Graduation. As a Double check look at the last edition of "The Bridge" (Summer 1970 Vol. X No. 11) and you can see that Mr. Adams was not present at all. On page 29 of that same issue you can read as to how the "Mammoth Buffet" was served in the "Dining Hall" (not in the gym as was erroneously written in the Sunday Paper). The Graduation of 1969 was entirely held in the gym, but Mr. Adams was not the Warden then, as can be seen from "The Bridge" (Summer 1969 Vol. IX No. 11). This feeble attempt of melodramatic reporting of high detector readings, instead of being cause for worry, was probably the result of an inexperienced detector operator or inaccurate meters and calibration (or even a figment of someone's imagination). One of the major points of controversy that I have with the article is the statement pertaining to "Writs of Habeas Corpus! I'm taking it from the exact wording, "Are filed by the dozens of inmate's who hope to overturn convictions on, "FLIMSY LEGAL TECHNICALITIES".

There is probably more truth to these Writs, then was done in the writing of a good part of this Htd. Courant Article.

THE CASTLE - Eddyville, Kentucky:

A pay increase to an hourly pay plan has been announced for the men employed by the Industries Section at Eddyville.

The plan is based on the job, not individual skills with a scale beginning with 6¢ up to 15¢ PER HOUR. In addition a bonus plan of an additional 10% will be given men when the Industries unit exceeds 5% over average production.

A.C.I. - Cranston, Rhode Island:

A radical new program was instituted at the direction of the courts to "establish due process protection for the inmates. The program is to run on an 18 month trial basis. At the end of this period the court will study criticisms of the new rules and offer modifications or decide to scrap the whole thing.

ENCHANTED NEWS - New Mexico:

Inmates of the N.M. penitentiary are giving solid backing to a new project in behalf of 'outsiders'. POWER DRIVE is a concerted effort for Prisoners Of War Effective Release! The word is instituted to effect release and humane treatment of men who are POW's in North Viet Nam. This project has the wholehearted support of the prison Administration.

QUESTION: "Why is it we can't take our radio's to work with us if it is approved by our boss."

Legal Note

Mr. Editor:

It would seem to me that the entire population has been laboring in the depths of controversy regarding the Legal Notes copied from various legal books under the authorage of Mr. James William Mohan, an Inmate of this institution. It would seem that some amount of authenticity would be secured before materials that are to be used in securing that most precious possession "FREEDOM" are in fact printed for the general population consumption.

To get to the most pertinent point I will deal with the most recent publication in which there is a printed Motion for Transcript. When a 'Motion' per se is made the person making this motion has two (2) designations ie. he is either the Defendant as is the case most often or he is of course the Movant. Therefore, the first sentence is not correct and should not be accepted because the party cannot be a Petitioner, when in fact no 'Petition' is submitted. Additionally a motion requesting Court documents such as a transcript to be used in Post-Conviction proceedings after a verdict has been returned and no appeal is scheduled for argument before the appellate Court cannot be deemed frivolous not sought as a means for delay. There is no delay present so none can be perpetrated.

In paragraph 2 it states that the said transcript is for use in the defense of the above entitled cause. There is no defense after a conviction because the 'Above entitled cause' has been terminated and rests in the hands of appellate procedure. An appeal is not a defense but a consideration of the record sub-

mitted by the Court below, it is also a hearing on facts already determined.

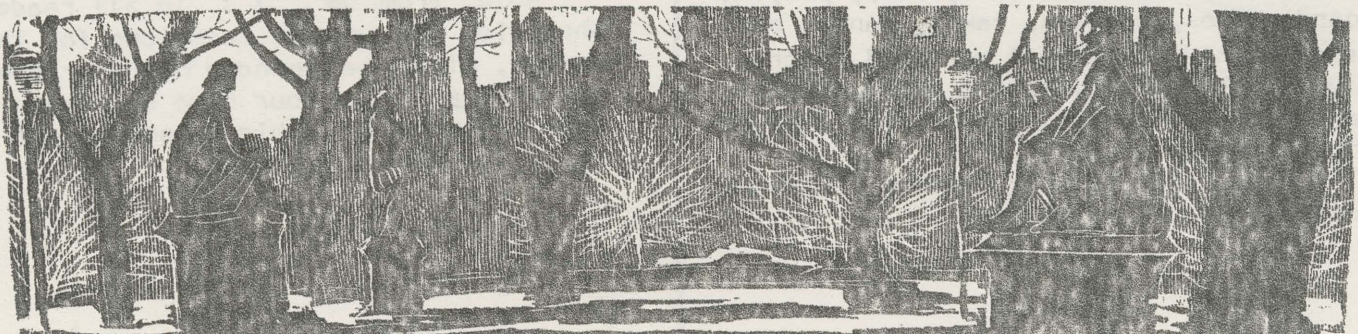
Immediately prior to the 'conclusion' the case of Wade v. Wilson adopted from the United States Law Week is cited. I am the only incarcerated person in the United States that receives the United States Law Week and the matter of Wade v. Wilson reported May 7, 1970 in the Northern District of California deals with the California Statute that when two defendants are tried as co-defendants only one transcript is supplied by the State. The matter involved one co-defendant refusing to give the transcript to his partner and for five years the aggrieved party was trying to obtain a copy from the State. The matter was remanded to the State Courts for hearing on the relativeity of the State Statutes. Thus the case cited in the Motion for Transcript is incorrect unless it applies to a specific party.

This article is submitted only so that many of the inmate residents that wish to inquire about obtaining a transcript will not fall victim to inaccuracy or incompetence.

As you remember, the "Rap of the Gavel" was required to have the articles authenticated. Hence, the reason for its termination among other printing errors attributable to the 'Scene' staff as voiced by Mr. Leroy Nash formerly editor of "Nash's Corner."

You would do well to draw experience from these notes when in fact they deal with the residents essential lifeline in here.....HIS TIME!!!

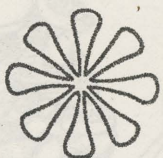

Wanted to Help Others

Ex-Convict's Dream Shattered

Robert Glazier, a crusty, 62-year-old-ex-convict, came to Hartford six years ago from Chicago with a dream to help people like himself begin new lives.

His dream became a reality two years ago when he founded Helping Ex-Prisoners Live Positively, Inc. Today, the program, operated out of drafty, second-story offices above a cafeteria on Union Place, will be phased out because of lack of funds.

Glazier, who spent a third of his life in reformatories and prisons, has accepted a job in Boston as director of a program similar to HELP.

The white-haired old man is angry. He can't understand why a program that has helped about 1,500 people, most of them just out of jail or prison, is going to be ditched because of cutbacks in the poverty program.

"Everybody is willing to give us a pat on the back for doing a good job, but when it comes to money they just don't want to know," he said.

Glazier said he was incarcerated at the Meriden School for Boys in the early 1920's "when it was really tough." He said he can still remember a nurse at the juvenile corrections center who used to "bat the hell out of you like a man."

From Meriden it was a 22-year period behind bars, including the Cheshire reformatory, the old Wethersfield State Pris-

on and a penitentiary in Atlanta, Ga.

"I've been straight now since 1959. I'm not saying I saw God, or anything like that. I'm just too tired," he said.

He hitch-hiked across the country from 1959 to 1964, holding down more than 40 jobs until his record caught up with him, seeking a new life.

"I went everywhere I heard of a prison association or an organization which helped ex-cons," he said. "I never found one that was doing the job that needs to be done. I had a two-fold purpose. I wanted to find help for myself and somehow learn how I could help others."

Glazier founded HELP after leaving the Revitalization Corps and the Community Renewal Team as a rehabilitation specialist. He sought out an old friend, Charles Taylor, who he met at Cheshire in 1927, and the two of them began drumming up business.

HELP, which is scrawled on a small piece of cardboard on the door of the run-down office complex, is known by every ex-convict in the state who has ever needed a job or a lending hand.

The two old ex-crooks have four other partners in rehabilitation. One of them, Alfred Cooper, 30, was once on the FBI's most wanted list for kidnapping, attempted murder and armed robbery. He was acquitted two years ago.

"He's just a kid," Glazier said. "He's only been in prisons for seven years."

Ex-cons trust Glazier, Taylor and Cooper because they know these men have been on the inside of a prison.

"These funding organizations have a hang-up with volunteers. They commend you for your efforts, but the money always goes to the professionals," Cooper said.

Cooper said the saddest thing it in the bud before it spreads," about the program being phased out is that a proposed community house for 16 to 21-year-olds will go down the drain with HELP. The house would be a home for young men who need some place and somebody to keep them out of jail or prison.

"It's a program to prevent crime. It's like pulling weeds up from a garden. You have to nip it in the bud before it spreads," Glazier said.

Pair of Ex-Cons Open New Store To Find It Robbed

NEW YORK (AP) — An employe of a store operated by ex-convicts, finding it had been burglarized of \$1,000 worth of cash and goods, said Friday "I used to be a burglar myself—it's kind of ironic."

Stanley Eldridge, 20, recently released from the Rikers Island prison, discovered the burglary when he arrived to open the store.

"I didn't think we'd come to it, but I guess we'll have to have a burglar alarm installed," said Prentice Williams, 33, another ex-convict who is now outside sales co-ordinator.

Citizens Against Jail Site Plan Protest By Picketing

EAST HAVEN — The proposed jail site on North High Street will be the scene of picketing at 7 p.m. Sept. 3 when the Citizens for Better Government hike to the area, erect a "No Jail" sign and stage a protest.

The entire 15-member board of directors will be on hand and Edmund Palumbo, chairman, has announced that any interested residents may participate.

Meanwhile, Thursday night CBG membership met to sign petitions against the jail and made plans for members to place similar petitions in local stores and canvass local streets obtaining additional signatures.

Petitions will also be placed in the town hall in the tax office for the benefit of those who will not otherwise have an opportunity to sign.

In other activity, CBG has ta-

bled the question of payment of dues and initiation fee for joining CBG pending further discussion.

Letters have been sent to Mayor Frank Messina and Board of Finance members after CBG unanimously agreed that in view of the town administration's failure to appropriate money, they oppose the plan to purchase North High Street property for a public works garage, the building of a garage and the purchasing of equipment. In addition, members have notified Town Council members of their opposition, also saying "We are confident that each and every councilman will let their conscience be their guide regardless of party affiliation in determining whether or not townspeople should be further burdened this year with unappropriated expenditures."

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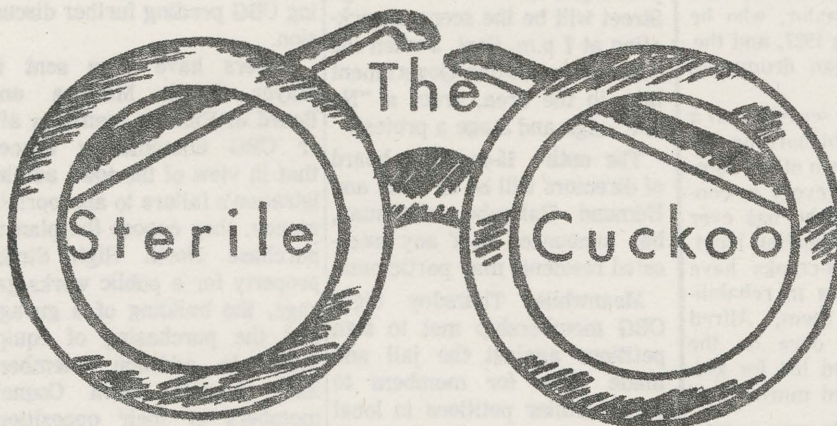

MAILING PRIVILEGES



Our Lady Has Appeared In Spain A "Last Warning For The World"

(Still Being Investigated By The Church)

In an amazing series of appearances at the tiny mountain village of Garabandal, Spain, from June 18, 1961 to June 18, 1965, the Mother of God has again warned the World of approaching disaster. This time of World-wide dimensions. All the revelations of Fatima have come to pass. Scoffers may find the documented records and photographs in the library of Congress, and in the casualty lists of World War II, Korea, and now Vietnam. The warnings of Garabandal are even more ominous. They came to an end on a note of deep disappointment, evidenced by the Virgin's "Last Message". Her chagrin was so great, as she explained later to Conchita, the chief seer, she could not bear to bring the message herself but sent it through the intercession of St. Michael, the Archangel.

Speaking for The Virgin the Angel said—"SINCE MY MESSAGE OF OCTOBER 18th, 1961 has not been made known to the world and has not been fulfilled, I tell you this is my last message. (honor). We must avoid God's anger with us by our efforts at amendment.

If we beg pardon with sincerity of soul He will forgive us. I, Your Mother, through the intercession of St. Michael the Archangel, want to tell you to amend your lives. You are already receiving one of the "last warnings." I love you very much and do not want your condemnation. Ask us sincerely and We will forgive you. You should make more sacrifices. Think of the Passion (suffering) of Jesus.

Ward off certain disaster by the Daily Rosary, Daily Mass, Daily Communion. Our Lady also requested the "Five consecutive First Saturdays" of Confession, Communion, five decades of the Rosary before Mary's Shrine or Altar, "keeping Her Company for 15 Minutes" with the intention of reparation". Her message means

THE WORLD MUST CHOOSE GOD'S WILL AND PEACE, OR, CONTINUATION IN SIN AND A MAJOR, WORLD WIDE DISASTER WHICH WILL DESTROY CIVILIZATION AND THE GREATEST PORTION OF THE POPULATION IN OUR LIFETIME.

Mass will be held at 8:00 A.M. in the Catholic Chapel with Confessions at 7:30 A.M. Aug. 7th is the First Friday in the month of July. All members of the population are invited to attend.

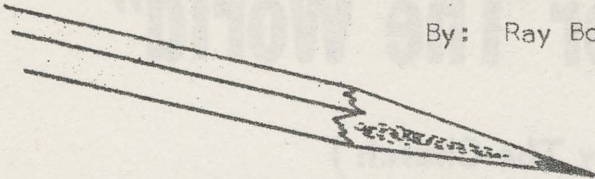
