The reader's attention is held by new developments throughout this book and the powers of the Grey - Eyed Women and what one man (Jack, a terminal cancer patient who is willing to take any risk to have his 2 month life expectancy increased) goes through because of them.

This is not strictly a Science Fiction, but rather a story of the powers of the mind and what it may be able to do, in the distant future. A great story. Well written. Published 1970.

TAU ZERO, by Poul Anderson \* \*

This is another space odyssey from Anderson's mind and pen.

Anderson is thouroughly familiar with the technical possibilities in space travel and gives the reader what may very well become tomorrow's reality.

The story takes place in a time when the Earth has been shattered by halocaust and has been repaired to a state of mutual control of the world along with binding treaties.

A five year journey to a distant planet, thought to be inhabitable, is the main theme along with the difficult adventures they face.

If this book wasn't written by somecne else it would have to be a Rod Serling story.


This is a Science Fiction of Earth bound nature.


A horror story that could take place now....TODAY!


Seven men, all in the same college class of 1942 and all successful in what they have done and everything to live for. Yet within a few weeks two members of the club are dead of apparent suicido.

As he uncovers more and more evidence of UFO's reality his own skepticism is lessoned, as his investigation proceeds he meets Mendelov and learns the truth concerning Unidentified Flying Objects. 274 Pages. Well written story. Published 1969.







OPPOSED TO EMPTY CRITICISM

Is our Constitutional System of Justice beginning to break down under the pressure of over-burdened courts, high crime rate, over-crowded jails and prisons and a changing of our moral ethics?

The provisions set down in the United States Constitution, for the protection of both the public and the accused, in criminal cases, seem to be straining the stitches of Our Lady Of Justice's well sewn garments.

In recent statistics, reported by Newsweek Magazine via the FBI, it was stated that: "The annual count of <u>KNOWN</u> "Serious Crimes" - The FBI catchall for everything from Auto Theft to Murder has reached five (5) million and is rising. Only one in five leads to an arrest, one in twelve to conviction. And half of the 300,000 convicts now in U.S. Penitentiaries are likely to get in trouble again once they go free.

Attorney General John Mitchell recently attributed our sad state of affairs in the courts, jails and prisons to, and I quote, "Astonishing Neglect." Of course he was referring to both public and private American citizens.

The public, because of these increasingly well known problems, has begun to deepen it's concern and wide-spread support for reforms is becoming more apparent each day.

Perhaps, being here in one of the country's over-crowded prisons, we can best testify to the facts and figures, but can we, as convicts, actually feel that the national condition of crime, arrest and prison is relevant to our present predicament or do we represent only the statistics people speak of? If the national figures are correct, half of us will remain out, once we are released and therefore rejoin the now aroused and concerned public.

Obviously, the decision to remain on the outside is the responsibility of the individual in question, but although the problems involved in doing so may be many, there are those who manage to overcome them.

Once re-established as an acceptable member of society a man could accomplish much to improve the conditions he once found himself living under by active participation in community and state affairs, but what of the men who return again to prison and those who still remain there? Can this man realize any significant accomplishments concerning reform and progressive change? I continue to insist that he can, if he will come forward with what he has to offer, in an intelligent, objective manner. Suggestions, solutions and meaningful discussion with those interested in hearing it and able to take action on these things, must surely be visible as our only means of reconstruction from within. If we refuse to recognize this and do not come forth, we must confess that we actually do not care very muctatall about our environment here and 1'm therefore refrain from downing it. sure that this will not occur so, in conclusion, I would suggest that whether it be through the various organizations formed or forming in the institution or on an individual basis, you voice your desires to, and ideas for, corrective changes that might serve to better your condition here and, perhaps, in the process realize some SELF-improvement!

Luckily none was hurt badly enough to be hospitalized, and all were released from the hospital after treatment.

It is good to know that in this age of apathy and non-involvement there are still some people around who can be depended upon to come forward and do what they can in an emergency situation. One of these men was asked the day after why he bothered to endanger himself just to save state property, and he responded by saying, "The state doesn't live in that cell, an inmate lives there, and it's his stuff that was burning." As far as this writer is concerned, that is a thought that should be sounded to every corner of this institution, the thought that every inmate should do their utmost to help their fellow inmates, and it's good to know that there are people we can rely on to follow through when we need them. 
