As far as possible, all points are illustrated by photograph, including 16 pages in color - usually by pairs of pictures in which the effect is introduced in one and not the other. Published 1960.



THE SIGNIFICANT MODERNS, by C.J.Bullet ***** Mr. Bullet has seemingly done an enormous amount of research into the all of all the great artists of the art movement occurring during the first quarter of the present century. Now that this Modernism has run its course; from Cezanne to Picasso, it has been treated here with an in-depth study, with may illustrations of each artist's works.

The list of artists discussed in this book are many and a few of the better knowns are: Renoir, Van Gogh, Gauguin, Matisse, Picasso, Cēzanne, Toulouse Lautrec, Rousseau, Chagall, Dali, and El Greco. Published 1936. 274 pages.

This small volume is an excellent way for the beginner to acquire a good knowledge of drawing and sketching, in many aspects of art, such as texture, strokes, pencil materials, reflections, balance, light, techniques of drawing different objects. Much discussion of composition makes up this book and this being one of the most important aspects for the artist makes this an exceptional book for study use. For the painter, the techniques used by Arthur Black are almost in the form of a painting and need only be filled with color. Published 1950. 109 pages.



INASTIPS GORNIER

This column contains the opinions of an inmate with 23 years experience here.

ITEM: Including emergency sick-calls, more than four hundred men go to sick-call here each week; — and more than 200 men line up at the window each day for restricted medication, a large amount of which is tranquilizers. Tension, caused by offensive noise, might be a contributing factor toward such needs.

ITEM: During the past three months inmates of this correctional center have sucessfully undergone more than 100 major and minor surgical operations.

ITEM: About 7 inmates per week are scheduled to come to hospital clinics to be examined or treated by one or more of the 21 consultant physician specialists who come here on schedule from outside hospitals to handle our patients.

ITEM: Prolonged and bothersome tensions, and the resultant emotional disturbances, which often lead to physical ailments, or to insanity, are symptoms more than they are causes. Symptoms of improper thinking. Symptoms of improper or dangerous reactions to conditions or to the actions of others. But few people under tension are willing to recognize it, even when it is pointed out to them, let alone try to understand how to control it and thus eliminate the I think some of them like to suffer, since they are often so bullheaded about learning to prevent it. The answer is simple, but putting it into practice takes effort. Learning how and when to take advantage of it is quite another thing, though the problem be recognized. First, one must be willing to learn fundementals: It is not what "they" do that causes our dangerous tensions and emotional disturbances. It is our own reaction

to what "they" do. When a man learns the simple art of controlling his own reactions, he will have learned the answer. A man either controls his own reactions, his own thoughts, or they control him, and maybe kill him. Know the truth, as the good book says, and the truth will set you free — from tension.

ITEM: Having written articles or columns for our publications for more than twenty years, I've learned to expect weird reactions from guys who want to copy my ideas, or join me in my efforts, or contradict what I write. 

I am in love with just what my mirror reflects, "me", with eyes, nose, mouth and cheeks.....



Income from dairy and livestock products has surpassed that from sugar. Also important are tobacco, coffee, pineapples, coconuts, fruits and garden truck. Sugar derivitives include Rum and molasses. Off island trade is mainly with the U.S. Spanish is the official language but most persons also Speak English. Public school education is tree and compulsory at the elementary schoollevel; English is taught as a language and is compulsory in all 8 grades. Chief religion is Roman Catholicism. Puerto Rico (or Boringuen, after the original indian name Boriquen), was discovered by Columbus Nov. 19, 1493. 

The capital of Puerto Rico is San Area 3,435 sq. mi. Flag: three red, two white horizontal stripes; star in blue triangle at staff. La Borinqueña. Puerto Rico is a hilly, tropical island lying between the Atlantic Ocean to North and the Caribbean Sea to the South. It is the easternmost of the West Indies group called the Greater Antilles, of which Cuba, Hispanida, and Jamaica are the larger units. It lies about 1,600 miles S.E. of New York; 500 miles N. of Venezuela. It is roughly rectangular, 105 miles long, by 35 wide. Numerous small islands include Viegues, Culebra and Mona. The soil of the coastal plain is fertile and there are many lush valleys, but there are dry areas in the south which need irrigation and an extensive system has been constructed by the Government. The climate is mild. with a mean temperature of 76%; the mean maximum is 82*. The highest point is Cerra de Punta at 4,389 feet, near the island center. President Truman, on August 5, 1947, signed an act giving Puerto Rico the right to choose it's chief executive by popular vote. An act of 1950, affirmed by special election, June 4, 1951, permitted Puerto Rico to draft it's own Constitution. One, similar to that of the United States, was approved in a conven tion February 4, 1952, and ratified by a popular vote March 3, 1952. President Truman signed, July 3, 1952, a Congressional resolution approving the new Constitution, elevating Puerto Rico to the status of a free Commonwealth associated with the United States, effective July In 1961 Fresident Kennedy ap-25, 1952. pointed two Puerto Ricans to important posts in his administration. In a July

23, 1967 referendum, Puerto Ricans strongly favored continuation of Commonwealth status. The vote was Commonwealth: 425,081 Statehood: 273,315; Independence: 4,205.

The Legislative Assembly consists of Senate and House of Representatives, whose members are elected by direct vote every 4 years. Eight senatorial districts elect two senators each; and 40 representative districts one member each; also 11 senators and 11 representatives at large. It's President, Commissioner in the U.S. Congress, does not vote. Puerto Ricans were granted American citizenship under the Organic (or Jones) Act of 1917. They do not vote for president, unless they move to the 'J.S., where they come under Executive power is vested local laws. a government or Governor elected by direct vote. There are 9 executive departments, each headed by a Secretary; State, Justice, Education, Health, Treasury, Agriculture, Commerce and Public Works. The governor is Luis A. Ferre, elected The Judiciary is vested in Nov., 1968. a Supreme Court and lower courts. The Commonwealth's "Operation Bootstrap "program for economic development has radically raised the standard of living; per capita income for 1969 was \$1,234, up \$469 from 1963. Puerto Rico derives its largest income from manufacturing. Products include textiles and apparel, electrical and electronic equipment, plastics, and chemicals. The chemical products include pharmaceuticals, cosmetics, ammoniated super phosphate, ethylene glycol and potassium sulphate. Gross capital investment in 1969 reached \$109 billion; gross product was \$409 billion. Mineral production is mainly construction materials, with cement accounting for a large
