

Why Johnny Comes Marching Home Again, And Again, And Again . . .

Johnny has returned for another hitch, a reinlistment so to speak, and the questions echoed by his comrades 'outofarms'--"Watcha doin back?" -- are answered in the same mechanical way: "dit-dot...dit-dit-dot!" Which, in reality, signifies 'Help', but is interpreted, in the peculiarity of this 'Foreign Lesion', as a 'Hail Fellow Well Met'.

Johnny could well considered as a career in some circles; in his own (circle that is) he is a mere treader. Having followed the beaten path quite frequently his feet have grown weary of his mind; and the merrygor round becomes a see-saw of sadness. Johnny's mood, from despair in relation to family, friends, and failure, quickly changes. Likewise, the reality of conditions are surrendered to the false-facade of a 'Hell is better than no place to be'.

Having been ejected from the 'Assembly line of success' so often, and having found in the face of his forlorn-companions or the jaundiced-eye of his spiritual-groping some thing akin to understanding, Johnny's resignation comes as small surprise.

Johnny's knowledge of warfare is limited, to say the least, and the absence of a 'drill sergeant' on the battlefield of mind is bowel or rahter foul trouble and consequently, cause for constipa——unh! consternation; either of which can bind the thought of most G.I.s (Good Intenders). Yet Johnny is a 'Never-say-die Soldier' and this unfortunately, is his only consistency; everytime he abandons the field he has lost or left a limb which, in effect, handicaps his growth.

Johnny's inability to reconcile 'What expires' the trance is regrettably, quite common. In his unbalanced attempts to adapt to the right, and the subconscious ghost of inclination, he confusedly, conforms to the left.

This conformation akin, perhaps, to the suicidal who, growing weary of the 'Grotesque Gian', acts out what the word has failed to communicate!

(As a G.I.—again of Good Intentionsone must make preparations to alter the 'lines' of his/story!) Yet, and in the light of his intentions, Johnny is a commendable soldier. He should be awarded or granted a Purple Toe, a Blue Frill, or sumpun'. After all, Johnny's up against tremendous odds considering the countless civil/villians whose apathy can bewilder the best of soldiers; infiltrating headquarters....bombarding thought.....undermining thw will. The endless invasions destroying his desire to 'become'.

Consequently Johnny returns—'marching home again'—to the limited world where the challenge to achieve is alleviated; where the soldiers of a dubious salvation share with him the mis'ry of their being.! Johnny finds, in this skeletal-closet of mankind, a quasi peace shrinking the mystery of existence.

Alas, Johnny's search for a 'Place in the Sun' is salvaged in the shadows of eerie-fingers holding him tenaciously to the Ghost of the Past.


Let us bow our heads in reverence and moan.."When Johnny comes marching home again Hoorah? Hoorah?"

Doing my interview with Mr. John Widden and the men there in the Small Engine Repair Shop, I came away overwhelm with wonder on how with such a small area they could have such a broad spectrum of equipment onhand so that any man here at C.C.I. Somers can learn Small Engine Repairing.

This Small Engine Repair course was initially funded with a Federal grant. However this coming June 1973 the State of Connecticut will takeover the funding of this program.

All the men will have gained the knowledge of all phases of small engine repair when this course is finished. There are out-board, motorcycle, skimobile, lawnmower and a host of other types of engines that a man can work on in his studies of engine repair. The course consist of a 4 month program, and you must have a grade placement of at least 9.0 and one year or less to go on your sentence. Doing this 4 month program there will be 2 months of automatic teaching, which is done by the student by placing a selected film cartridge into a View Master he has chosen to learn how to assemble and disassemble his project. the next 2 months will be spent in practical and classroom aplication of which will consist of business procedure, tax and bookkeeping.

Upon Graduation, the men will recieve their diplomas along with the status of Technician. For the man that has the ability to chose, and wish to makea good choice, Small Engine Repair is highly recomended.

There are approximately 15 men that are taking this course at this time, and they are near graduation. Following are the names of the men that are in the Small Engine Repair Shop: Mr. John Widden, Civilian Instructor (good man), Richard Poidomani, their clerk, James Fuller, student and Assistant Instructor, who like to work on all engines, Jay Krakauske, Ed LaFlamme, Joe Pisarski,

Bruce Kranmas and Edward McNally who also like to work on all type of small engines. Ed McNally is also a Student Instructor. Bob Smith, Willie Harrell, Charles Dixon, Bruce Worthan, Glenn Lucas and David Silverstein these men have their specialties in eather out-board, marine, small and large engines.

To the men that have gone on before, to the men that are learning how and to the men that eill be learning in the furture, Apply this new learned skill of Small Engine Rrpairing and go Onward and Upward.
