OMBUDSMAN is legislative commissioner for the investigation of citizens' complaints of bureaucratic abuse. The office originated in Sweden early in the 19th century and is still largely confined to Scandianvia (and New Zealand), though interest in it became widespread after the mid-20th centruy. The legislature appoints the ombudsman, but it may not interfere with his handling of particular cases. He is an independent and impartial argiter between government and the individual. His scope of authority covers all agencies, boards, and commissions, but sometimes excludes muncipal government (New Zealand and Norway), cabinet decisions (New Zealand, Norway, and Sweden), or judges (Denmark, New Zealand, and Norway). Counter balancing his vast jurisdiction is the fact that his power is solely recommendatory. He may suggest changes in government action but may not command them.

FUNCTIONS OF THE OMBUDSMAN

The ombudsman serves three related purposes: (1) redressing individual greivances; (2) improving the quality of administration; and (3) helping the legislature to supervise the bureaucracy.

REDRESS OF GRIEVANCES. On the average, each civil ombudsman receives more than 1,000 written complaints a year, in addition to the handful which he takes up of his own volition. The majority of these are rejected without investigation. In a number of cases, the citizen fails to state a complaint; the ombudsman sometimes solicits clarification and helps the aggrived person explain his grievance intelligibly. In other cases, the person or body complained of is outside the jurisdiction of the ombudsman, who may then instruct the citizen as to where to lodgel his complaint. Other applications are rejected because the party has not exhausted available administrative or legal remedies; again, the ombudsman describes these alternatives avenues of appeal. In giving advise, the ombudsman provides legal aid in administrative sphere—an area of the in which such assistance has otherwise been lacking.

The balance of the complaints are transmitted by the ombudsman to the agency in question for elucidation. His office could not function without the cooperation of the administration. This cooperation is almost always forthcoming; and the ombuds—man does not have to exercise his formal power to compel evidence and testimony, because the bulk of investigative work is done by the agencies themselves, the ombudsman does not need a large staff.

When the fact-finding process is complete, the ombudsman forms an opinion as to the correctness of the government's action. He does not merely impose his judgement in place of the administrator's but asks whether the administrator acted reasonably under the law. In the majority of cases investigated, the ombudsman finds that the agency acted properly and withing the scope of its discretion. In replying to the complaint, he explains why the agency action was unobjectionable.

In the remaining cases, the ombudsman comes to the conculsion that the agency acted improperly. He may express to the bureau and to the complainant his opinion that there was rudeness or unnecessary delay. If he feels that the decision of the agency, erroneous, he may state what a correct decision would have been, and, whenever possible, suggest a solution. He conveys his opinion and recommendation to the compolainant, udually after giving the authorities an opportunity to remedy the matter.

The ombudsman may not change the decision of an administrator but may only recommend a different decision. He relies upon his presitige and upon the reasonableness of his views to persuade the agency to alter its position. Vestigially the Swedish and Finnish ombudsman may prosecute erring officials, but even these offices rely primarily kpon censure.

IMPROVING ADMINISTRATION. The very existence of an ombudsman improves the general climate of public opinion toward government. Citizens who secure redress are, of course gratified. Others may become reconciled by the ombudsman's explanation of the basis for agency action.

ANNOUNCEMENT FROM JAMES R. BROOKWALTER,

CORRECTIONAL OMBUDSMAN

in Mid 1972, Commissioner John R. Manson, believing that the presence of an Ombudsman in a correctional institution would represent a new and very different mechanism for the resolution of inmate complaints, decided to @bcourage the development of an independent Ombudsman to serve the Connecticut correctional system. An Ombudsman is defined as an impartial independent person, operating within prescribed procedures and guidelines, for the purpose of investigating and recommending resolutions of inmate complaints and other matters relating to the administration and functioning of the correctional institution.

The one condition he imposed on the development of such a program was that the Ombudsman be totally independent, that is, that he not be selected by or employed by the Department of Correction and that he be authorized to publicly state when and why the Department's existing practises and procedures are inappropriate and should be changed. Consequently, the Commissioner requested that the Hartford Institute of Criminal and Social Justice, a private non-profit corporation ebgaged in planning and implementing new solutions to problems in the criminal justice system in Hartford, develop an Ombudsman program, hire an ombudsman and staff, and administer the program.

Since the date of my employment I have been engaged in an orientation process familiarizing myself with the rules, regulations, and operating procedures of Somers and Hartford, the two institutions where the program will initially operate, and talking to inmates and Department employees.

Now three months later I will begin taking inmate complaints. In the next week or so you will be receiving a copy of the agreement between the Department of Corrections and the Hartford Institute of Criminal and Social Justice detailing the procedures for making a complint and the manner in which compliants will be investigated and resolved. You will also receive copies of the form on which complaints should be made and at that time, may file complaints with me.

A great deal of effort has been invested in this program. With the cooperation and assistance of inmates and institutional staff the program can become an effective tool for redressing complaints.

EMPATHY UPFRONT

" Another View "

Empathy House is much more than a drug program organized to help an individual help himself break his drug habit. It is a conscious effort among individuals trying to determine their own weaknesses and then strengthen them. By relating ing groups, with honest intentions, one can learn about himself in terms of how others see him. Then by asking questions of the group and listening to responses openly, he may indeed get a better understanding of himself. Like, whether the image he projects is really a reflection of himself, or whether the image, as seen by others, is something other than the way he desires himself to be seen.

It is often because of this misrepresentation of one's self that an individual may become confused as to why other people respond to him in the way that they do. He then may feel that he is not being understood which can lead to disillusionment and disgust. He thinks that his feelings are unique and consequently tries to find other ways to release these feelings. Perhaps he will come across other people who have similar feelings. Their common bond, for identification purposes, will be a rebellious nature, actively expressed in a negative manner towards society.

Thus he flows along bringing forth all the frustrated parts of himself along with things outside himself that he feels will make him even more acceptable to his immediate friends. In a short time he convinces himself that this is the only lifestyle suitable to his needs and desires and thus he remains. He may question at times, as to why he is in this position, but by now it seems inevitable that he must stay. It seems that there is no change to make. He puts all his energies into being accepted and staying alive while hustling. He projects more images to hide his inner lacking of self confidence. These images may cause him to become separated from his family. He is finally busted. Then society stereotypes him by saying that he is an outcast and a criminal.

The saying that, "in every man, no matter how bad, there is good," goes unnoticed, except perhaps by the woman that loves him. No one can bring forth this good (postive initiative) but the individual himself and he has forgotten how. His previous lifestyle has his thoughts confined. He is a prisoner within himself and of the images he must now uphold.

I know that a great deal of this must pertain to most of us because each week I read the beautiful poetry published in the <u>Weekly Scence</u>. Even though all of us don't submit the poetry, we read it and relate the understanding we gain to our own tender feelings. I have seen some brothers watch other brothers' back to the point of jeopardizing themselves and yet still remain silent. This trait is one worthy of the most famous of men and yet we are immates in a penitentiary.

Empathy House is a school of learning for those who care to learn. It starts with one's own awareness of himself and his environment which is taught in Phase I, Then in Phase II or Phase III, or another house affiliated with Empathy, we apply what we have learned and effectively adapt ourselves in a postive manner to more avenues that are open within a free society.
