

There are many illnesses, of which probably only about fifty percent are of a physical nature. The other fifty percent is psychotic and psychological. Many times our families and friends are aware there is a problem, but just as often they are not aware of what the problem is. It is also true the individual quite often doesn't realize he has a problem, and when the actuality of it comes to light he feels he can handle it himself. Usually this is impossible! It is often up to the individuals family and friends to seek the necessary help he needs. In order to do this first the family and friends must realize and admit there is a problem, and that by helping their loved one they are helping themselves.

The following, in part is from aletterconcerning Alcoholism. If read with an open mind it can be applied to any situation in life, just by transposing the word Alcohol, Alcoholic

or Alcoholism to whatever word fits you.

HOW CAN YOU HELP!

Contrary to popular opinion, there is hope for the suffering alcoholic, and for his famliy. The first thing you must WANT to be helped. Then and only then is it wise and imperative to seek A.A. or the help to your problem.

A.A. as with anything that is good, can be difficult to find, because as like most good things there is little advertisement. The telephone book or information is a good place to begin. Most agencies are listed. Here, by using the Request Form we can direct our pleas. It is best you allow your friend or loved one to speak in complete privacy with the A.A. Twelve Steeper (as they are called) or the individual representing the agency you have gotton in touch with. This will make it much easier for all concerned.

Try to understand that NO alcoholic can be helped until this individual really WANTS to be helped, this applies to all problems, and also it is sometimes easier to talk to a complete stranger than to members of one's family.

Once this individual Accepts the help of A.A. (or whatever) -- leave them do their "own

thing"--A.A. (or whatever) is experienced in this area. YOU ARE NOT.

If you are not a suffering alcoholic, or of whatever the disease yourself, you cannot possible understand what this person is going through—no matter how long you might have known or lived with this individual. Don't expect miracles. The transition from "ill" to "well" takes time. No two people are alike, and each individual has to find his own way through the basic steps of their program.

Alcoholism, as does many other diseases, affects the entire family. Thats why it is imperative for the family and friends to learn as much about the disease as possible, because after being subjected to a condition for years it is most assured that it has left adverse efforts on those who have been involved. As our loved ones and friends learn more, their own thinking changes. They overcome their fears, resentments and anxieties. The more understanding on the part of all who are involved the easier the affected cure can be applied, and a more harmonious relationship can and will result. This is exactly why there are so many different programs.

There is a truism in this letter, in that regardless of how close we are to a loved one or friend, it is extremely difficult to completely understand another's problem. It takes some type of professional help to affect a cure. The cure should be "A DAY AT A TIME". FOR-IVER, is a long, long time and many looking at it from this point become very discouraged; we can't do anything about Yesterday, Tomorrow is a long way off, but, we can certainly be responsible and do something about Today. This should be our desired goal; that of b coming a more mature, better and responsible person Today. If there is a tomorrow, by doing our best today, it will help to ease the burden of each tomorrow as, and if we get these

Nor can we quarrel with the proposition that "No man should be sent to a penal institution until it is definitely determined that he is not a fit subject for probation" The problem arises when we come to the task of identifying dangerousness as a reliable basis for the imposition of the sentence. THE PERSONAL PRICE OF BEING ALCOHOLIC

The men and women who have drinking problems comprise a tiny proportion of the total American population, but the misery they cause themselves and others is enormous. If one considers only the personal cost of drinking problems; the price is exorbitant. The life expectancy of alcoholic drinkers is estimated to be shorter by 10 to 12 years than that of the general public. Studies indicate that the mortality rate for such persons is at least $2\frac{1}{2}$ times greater, and they suffer a disproportionate number of violent deaths. According to the latest national figures (for 1968) alcoholism-accounted for about 0.7% of all deaths. This figure has reached an alarming increase in the past 5 years. This figure includes Alcoholic Cirrhosis and Alcoholic Psychosis. Alcoholism appears as a cause of death on more than 13,000 death certificates yearly. Many authorities contend that this figure is unrealistically low. Undoubtedly alcohol and its abuse contribute to many deaths which are attribtued to other causes. In many cases physicians avoid putting alcoholism on death certificates because it embarrasses survivors of the deceased.

Individuals with drinking problems are known to have many chronic, and even fatal diseases which are related to their drinking. Cirrhosis of the liver is perhaps the best known of the diseases such as "Gin Drinkers Heart", "Beer Drinkers Heart", Wine Drinkers Heart", as well as irritations of the mucous membranes of the mouth, Wernicke's disease, and many others such as Korsakoff's disease, and "Alcoholic Pellegra" have often been attributed to nutritional deficiencies attending alcoholism, although more recent studies suggest that alcohol itself may play asignificant role in some.


The effects of the problem of alcoholism are not limited to the drinker alone. His family, his employer, and society at large are all harmed by his behavior, and all have a stake in helping to prevent the disease from becoming more severe. If one considers the ill effects of drinking problems on just the families of the drinkers, some 36 million Americans can be regarded as caught in alcohols web; unhappy marriages, broken homes, desertion, divorce, impoverished families, and deprived or displaced children are all part of the toll.

The cost to public and private agencies for support of families ravaged by alcohol problems has been estimated at many millions of dollars a year. The cost in human suffering is incalculable, it should, however, be understood that when excessive drinking underlies these social catastriophes, it may not necessarily be the primary cause, but if you have a drinking problem, NOW is the time to do something about it, and the only place to do it while you're here is a A.A.

TO ANYBODY THAT IS INTERESTED

A.A. Programs is for man or anybody else that wants help. Now you can't get help if you just sit around, you have to ask questions, listen to different people talk and especially listen to the outside speakers that come to our A.A. meetings. They have the experience of A.A. and know what they are talking about. And then when the speakers are all done telling their experience about what alcoholic did to them, don't be afraid to raise your hand and ask questions if you have questions. That's the way you are going to get things off your mind, and learn more about A.A. at the same time. And I also would like to say get involved in the TWELVE STEP MEETINGS, they are very interesting, and you do learn about A.A., you only go to these meetings once a month, so let's see more people at these meetings. Because the more you get involved in A.A. the more you accomplish for yourself. And the more you will know when you go home, and go to the meetings outside. So I would like to see every member of A.A. Program, get involved, and get something out of A.A. I know I'm getting something out of it, and the more meetings I go to the more I learn. So get involved with the A.A. Program, and you won't be sorry for it, you defintely will gain by it.

ROSS PASSES COLTS PAST JETS 20-6

Herbie Ross completed 6 of 6 passes in the first half as the Coltscran up a 14-0 lead, and the Colt defense gave up 41 total yards in a Intramural League game Sunday.

After the opening kick-off the Jets could do nothing and the Colts offense took over on their own 28 yard line. And take over they did, as Gray took the ball 10 yards on his first carry of the game and Roberson followed suit.
