It is also true the individual quite of ten doesn't realize he has a problem, and when the actuality of it comes to light he feels he can handle it himself. Usually this is impossible? It is often up to the individuals family and friends to seek the necessary help he needs. In order th do this first the family and friends must realize and admit there is a. problem, and that by helping their loved onc they are hclping themselves.

The following, in part is from aletterconcerning Alcoholism. If read with an open mind it can be applied to any situation in life, just by transposing the word Alcohpl, Alcoholic or Alcoholism to whatever word fits you.

HOW CAN YOU HELP!
Contrary to popular opinion, therc is hope for the suffering alcoholic, and for his famliy. The first thing you must WANT to be helped. Tren and only then is it wise and im perative to seek $A . A$. or the help to your problem.
A.A. as with anything that is good, can be difficult to find, because as like most good things there is little advertisement. The telephone book or information is a good pli.e to begin. Most agencies are listed. Here, by using the Request Form we can direct our pleas. It is best you allow your friend or loved one to speak in complete privacy with the A.A. Twelve Steeper (as they are called) or the individual representing the agency you havegottin in touch with. This will makc it much easicr for all concerned.

Try to understand that NO alcoholic can be helped until this individual really WANTS to be helped, this applies to all problems, and also it is sometimes easicr to talk to a complete stranger than to members of one's family.

Once this individual Accepts the help of $A$. $A$. (or whatever)--leave them do their "own thing ${ }^{97}-A_{0}$. A. (or whatever) is experienced in this area. YOU ARE NOT.

If you arc not a suffering alcoholic, or of whatever the disease yoursclf, you cannot possible understand what this person is going through-ono matter how long you might have known or lived with this individual. Don't expect miracles. The transition from "ill to "well" takes time. No two people are alike, and cach individual has to find his own way through the basic stcps of their program.

Alcoholism, as docs many other diseases, affects the entire fam ly. Thats why it is imperative for thn family and friends to learn as much about the disease as possible, because after being subjected to a condition for years it is most assured that it has left adverse effcrts on those who have been involvod. As our loved ones and friends learn more, their own thinking changes. They overcome their fears, resentments and anxieties. The more understanding on the part of all who are involved the easier the affected cure can be applo ied, and a more harmonious relationship can and will result. This is exactly why there are so many differont programs.

There is a truism in this letter, in that regardless of how close we are to a loved one or friend, it is extremely difficult to complctely understand another's problem. It takes some type of professional help to affect a cure. The cure should be "A DAY AT A TTMFT" FORSVER, is a long, long time and may looking at it from this point become very diccoiraged; we can't do anything about Yestarday, Tomorrow is a long way off, but, we cais certainly be responsible and do something about Today. This should be our desired goal; that of b .oning a more mature, better and rosponsible person Today. If there is a tomorrow, by doing our best today, it will help to ease the burden of each tomorrow as, and if we get thico

"I know that Pete isn't going to like what I'm going to say", cut in one of the artists, "But this is the truth. Pete is not an ordinary scrt of person, well, as you can see, he's not Mr. Hoaglund, he's Pete, and we're Pepper and Paul and Woods... he knows that $I^{\prime} m$ a man... and I know that he knows... I enjoy studying with him... ${ }^{\text {m }}$

As I sat there listening to people talk about a media of which my knowledge is extremely, very extremely limited, I chanced to look around the room and for the first time noticed, I mean really noticed, the change that had come over the place from what I had seen four months earlier.

 IDENTIFYING DANGEROUSNESS
No one can find fault with the proposition that one convicted of crime of violence who is found to $k=$ dangerous should be confined for such period of correctional treatment or custody as is required for the protection of the public. No one will gainsay the importance of incapacitating, for as long as is necessary, a known dangerous offender from further criminal activity. Nor can we quarrel with the proposition that "No man should be sent to a penal institution until it is definitely determined that he is not a fit subject for probation ${ }^{1 m}$ The problem arises when we come to the task of identifying dangerousness as a rellable basis for the imposition of the sentence. JUDGE ALFRED P.MURRAH

The men and women who have drinking problems comprise a tiny proportion of the total American population，but the misery they cause therselves and others is enormous． If one considers only the personal cost of drinking problems；the price is exorbitant． The life expectancy of alcoholic drinkers is estimated to be shorter by 10 to 12 years than that of the general public．Studies indicate that the mortality rate for such persons is at least $2 \frac{1}{2}$ times greater，and they suffer a disproportionate number of tio olent deaths．According to tha，latest national figures（for 1968）alcoholism－accounted for about $0.7 \%$ of all deaths．This figure has reached an alarming increase in the past 5 years．This figure includes Alcoholic Cirrhosis and Alcoholic Psychosis．Alcoholism appears as a cause of death on more than 13,000 death certificates yearly．Many autho－ rities contend that this figure is unrealistically lowo Undoubtedly alcohol and its abuse contribute to many deaths which are attribtued to other causes．In many cases physicians avoid putting alcoholism on death certificates because it embarrasses sur＝ vivors of the deceased．

Individuals with drinking problems are known to have many chronic，and even fatal diseases which are related to their drinking。 Cirrhosis of the liver is perhaps the best known of the diseases such as＂Gin Drinkers Heart＂，＂Beer Drinkers Heart＂，Wine Drinkers Heart＂，as well as irritations of the mucous membranes of the mouth，Wernicke＂s disease，and many others such as Korsakoff＂s disease，and＂Alcoholic Pellegra＂have often been attributed to nutritional deficiencies attending alcoholism，although more recent studies suggest that alcohol itself may play asignificant role in some。

The effects of the problem of alcoholism are not limited to the drinker alone。 His family，his employer，and society at large are all harmed by his behavior，and all have a stake in helping to prevent the disease from becoming more severe．If one consim ders the ill effects of drinking problems on just the families of the drinkers，some 36 million Americahs can be regarded as caught in alcohols web；unhappy marriages，broken homes，desertion，divorce，impoverished families，and deprived or displaced children are all part of the toll．

The cost to public and private agencies for support of families ravaged by alcohol problems has been estimated at many millions of dollars a year．The cost in human suf＊ fering is incalculable，it should，however，be understood that when excessive drinking underlies these social catastriophes，it may not necessarily be the primary cause，but if you have a drinking problem，NOW is the time to do something about it，and the only place to do it while you＇re here is a A．A．

A．A．Programs is for man or anybody else that wants help．Now you can＇t get help if you just sit around，you have to ask questions，listen to different people talk and especially listen to the outside speakers that come to our AoA。 meetingso They ave the experience of A。A。 and know what they are talking about．And then when the speakers are all done telling their experience about what alcoholic did to them，don＇t be afrald to raise your hand and ask questions if you have questions．That＇s the way you are going to get things off your mind，and learn more about A．A．at the same time．And I also would like to say get involved in the TWELVE STEP MEETINGS，they are very interesting，and you do learn about $A_{0} A_{0}$ ，you only go to these meetings once a month，so let＇s see more people at these meetings．Because the more you get involved in A．A．the more you accomplish for yourself． And the more you will know when you go home，and go to the meetings outside．So I would like to see every member of A．A．Program，get invloved，and get something out of A．A． I know I＇m getting something out of it，and the more meetings I go to the more I learn。 So get involved with the A．A．Program，and you won＇tbe sorry for it，you defintely will gain by it．
