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
Inmate Furlough Procedures

Below listed you will find new institutional guidelines establishing minimum criteria for furlough consideration.

OUT OF STATE FURLOUGHS

Out of state furloughs may be granted effective October 1, 1974. Below listed you will find new Departmental guidelines establishing the criteria for such furlough consideration.

1. Applicants for out of state furlough must meet the established institutional furlough criteria.
2. Applicants must have sufficient finances or acceptable means of transportation to provide for travel, going and returning.
3. Men approved for out of state furloughs may not travel more than 200 miles one way. Exceptions to this 200 mile limit may be considered depending upon individual circumstances. All exceptions must be approved by the Deputy Commissioner of Community Services.
4. Men approved for out of state furloughs must waive extradition in advance of leaving on said furlough.
5. The travel time for out of state furloughs will be limited to three (3) days. Exceptions may be made depending on individual circumstances. All exceptions must be approved by the Deputy Commissioner of Community Services.

Inmate Furlough Procedures

Below listed you will find new institutional guidelines establishing minimum criteria for furlough consideration.

Inmate will apply for furlough consideration to his assigned counselor using the appropriate form. The counselor will review said application for purposes of verification of minimum criteria and either place the applicant on a furlough docket or return application with advisement.

I. Time Consideration:

- a. A minimum of six months good work and conduct in this institution subsequent to initial Classification Committee action and a quarter of the sentence fixed minimum will be required.
- b. Men with detainers, warrants, and/or consecutive sentences will not normally be considered for furloughs.
- c. Men with life sentences will receive special consideration based on their individual merits.
- d. A minimum of three months good work and conduct subsequent to Classification Committee action will be required for men returned in parole violation status.

II. Work and Conduct:

A Poor Work Report and/or a Misconduct Report will normally disqualify a candidate for furlough consideration for a minimum of 90 days subsequent to the date of the report.

III. The Offense:

The following will generally exclude a man for furlough consideration:

- a. Individuals with a history of aggressive and/or assaultive sexual behavior.
- b. Individuals with a background of violent or assaultive behavior.
- c. Individuals convicted of a crime of notoriety.

IV. Length and Frequency of Institutional Furloughs:

Furloughs may be granted up to three days or any portion thereof unless otherwise informed. Men who have received furloughs regardless of length, may

not normally apply for subsequent consideration in less than three months.

V. Home Visits:

Members of the community receiving men approved for furlough are to be from a man's visiting list and preferably members of the immediate family.

Furlough Committee:

Fulfillment of the minimum criteria establishes eligibility for furlough consideration and should not be interpreted as a guarantee. If applicant is accepted and placed on docket, he will subsequently appear before Committee and be told of their decision. If the application is approved, standard Department of Correction furlough forms will be provided and the completed forms and Committee's recommendation will then be submitted to the Warden and Deputy Commissioner of Community Services for their consideration and final decision. However, if a man is denied a furlough, the reasons for denial will be given to the candidate with a recommended day for reapplication.

Criteria for Community Release Programs

Any inmate wishing to be considered for Work and/or Educational Release Programs in the department must apply through his institutional counselor. Men applying for work release consideration must meet the following requirements:

- a. Must have a financial, vocational, or educational need.
- b. Must be considered to normally qualify for minimum custody status.
- c. Must be within one year of parole eligibility or release date.
- d. Must not have a history of serious emotional or psychiatric disorder.
- e. Must not have a serious background of violent or assaultive behavior.
- f. Must not have been convicted of a sex crime involving minors or use of force.
- g. If involved in the use of hard narcotics, an individual would only be accepted for a community release program if he is involved in a drug treatment modality while in community release.

TELEPHONE PROJECT - HOME PHONE PROGRAM

EACH MAN IS ENTITLED TO A PHONE CALL HOME SUBJECT TO THE FOLLOWING GUIDELINES:

1. You will be entitled to make one (1) phone call every thirty (30) days to those people on your approved visiting list and/or members of your immediate family
2. All calls must be made "COLLECT" and be charged to the person being called.
3. All phone calls will be limited to approximately five (5) minutes duration.
4. All calls will be made "PERSON TO PERSON" and "COLLECT".
5. If the party being called cannot be reached within one-half hour of the scheduled time, the call with regard to availability will be rescheduled at a later date.
6. All calls will be scheduled in the evening following the 8 o'clock break until 9:30 PM, or until calls are completed. THERE WILL BE NO PHONE CALLS ON WEEKENDS & HOLIDAYS.
7. To afford your privacy and intimacy with your family, phone calls of this program will not be monitored.
8. For those members of your immediate family who are not on your approved visiting list and you would like them to be on your approved telephone list, contact your Inst Counselor for the proper approval form.
9. The Home Phone Program is available to men in the population subject to the following:
 - A. Men will be eligible for the Home Phone Program subsequent to the initial Classification Committee action.
 - B. A poor Work Report and/or a Misconduct Report will normally disqualify a man from the Home Phone Program for a period of thirty (30) days.
 - C. Men in Administrative Segregation status will be eligible for this program (60) days subsequent to each individual administrative segregation recommendation. Continuation in this program by the men in administrative segregation will be contingent on each man's behaviour. A Misconduct Report will naturally effect the lack of participation in this program for (60) days.
 - D. If a Misconduct Report is connected to this program, the Disciplinary Committee will determine a date for reapplication.
 - E. Lesser infractions not warranting a Misconduct Report, but of such a nature as to be serious within the environment of segregation will be reviewed by the Classification Committee upon the written recommendation of the segregation block officer.

If you would like to schedule a phone call home, please complete the proper form which you may obtain from your block officer, and deposit said slip in MAIL BOX in the main corridor marked HOME PHONE PROGRAM MAIL BOX. SPECIAL NOTE: NO REQUEST SLIPS WILL BE RECEIVED BY MR. GABBERT AT THE EDUCATION DEPARTMENT AFTER SEPT 27, 1974. ALL REQUEST SLIPS MUST BE DEPOSITED IN SAID MAIL BOX.

All request will be scheduled on a first come first serve basis. You will be advised of the final date and time of your phone call when you receive your appointment slip. Please inform the party you wish to call the designated time and date as soon as you have been notified. ANY MAN NOT SHOWING UP FOR HIS PHONE CALL WILL FORFEIT THAT CALL FOR THE MONTH. A period of seven (7) to ten (10) days from your scheduling to your call will be maintained to give you an opportunity to inform your party.

WHEN I COME IN REPEATED CONTACT WITH THIS DAILY FACADE OF NORMALITY, I BEGIN TO ASSUME THAT I TOO DESERVE SUCH A LIFE, AND I GET ANNOYED WITH THE PRESENT AND LOOK UPON MY DIFFICULTIES AS UNJUST TRAGEDIES. AND BECAUSE I ASSUMED THERE WAS SOMETHING UNNATURAL ABOUT MY HAVING A PROBLEM, I ATTEMPTED TO PRESENT A PROBLEM - FREE APPEARANCE TOO. THIS I NOW KNOW CAN NOT BE.

Marijuana Element Retards Cancer

"Tests on mice:"

RICHMOND, VA. (UPI)

An agent in marijuana has retarded the growth of cancer in mice and researchers at the Medical College of Virginia are hopeful that it may be helpful in treating human cancer patients.

The findings were announced over the weekend by the Medical College of Virginia. The experiments are described in the new issue of "Science," the journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

The researchers present their findings Wednesday at a meeting of the American Society of Pharmacology and Experimental Therapeutics in Montreal.

The College said: "Experimentation conducted...demonstrated that marijuana's active molecule, delta-9THC, slowed the growth of lung tumors, a mammary tumor, and a virus induced leukemia, and significantly prolonged the life of the animals" inflicted with the illnesses.

The College said in experiments cancerous mice which were treated with high doses of delta-9THC lived 36 per cent longer than the untreated mice. Mice treated with a powerful drug now in use as a treatment for human cancer, however, lived 48 per cent longer than untreated mice.

The experiments were conducted by MCV pharmacologists Richard A. Carchman, Marvin A. Friedman, and Albert E. Munson and graduate student Jeffrey A. Levy. The researchers stressed their studies are still in the early stages and said further investigation will be necessary before the marijuana molecule may be used in human beings.

The researchers said implications of the discovery are so far reaching that years of research may stem from it.

Montville Prisoners Learn Self-Respect

If the drug-alcoholism treatment program at Montville state prison doesn't break an inmate of his habit, it at least will spoil his next high, says the director of the program. Prisoners enrolled in the "Altruism House" program live together family-style in special quarters on one side of the prison, meet for "rap sessions" about their problems and are assigned increasingly greater amounts of responsibility, said program director John Gallo.

"What we are trying to do is replace the need for drugs and alcohol with something positive like self-respect," said Gallo. "Eventually we hope that the residents in the program will be able to stand up and face the world on their own." Gallo, 29, said all incoming inmates with a history of drug or drinking problems are invited to attend group discussions. Those facing long sentences or who have a history of hard-drug use are invited to live in special quarters and are assigned a list of duties. "Responsibility Increases" The longer they are in the program, the more difficult the duties become and the more responsibility the inmate must bear. Each man is also given minor privileges that can be taken away if he shirks his assignments.

Admission to the treatment program is based on a man's history and his apparent sincerity in overcoming his problem. "If we don't accomplish anything else, at least we ruin it for a man the next time he gets high", said Gallo. "At least then he will realize it is he who is copping out and not society." Gallo said, "we are trying to make a man feel good about himself inside. We want a man to feel good not only in his head, but also in his gut." Drugs and alcohol are just symptoms-not the real problems facing these inmates, he said. "The underlying problem-whether it is lack of self-esteem or fear of failure-is the one the program tries to reach," said Gallo.

"Help On Outside" Once an inmate in the program is released, he is referred to a half-way house or a community drug program run by the Southeastern Council on Alcohol and Drug Dependency. Richard Galligan, the liaison between the Montville program and the state Department of Correction, said Altruism House was a qualified success. "Anyone who tells you that this or any other drug program is 100 per cent effective is lying," Galligan said.

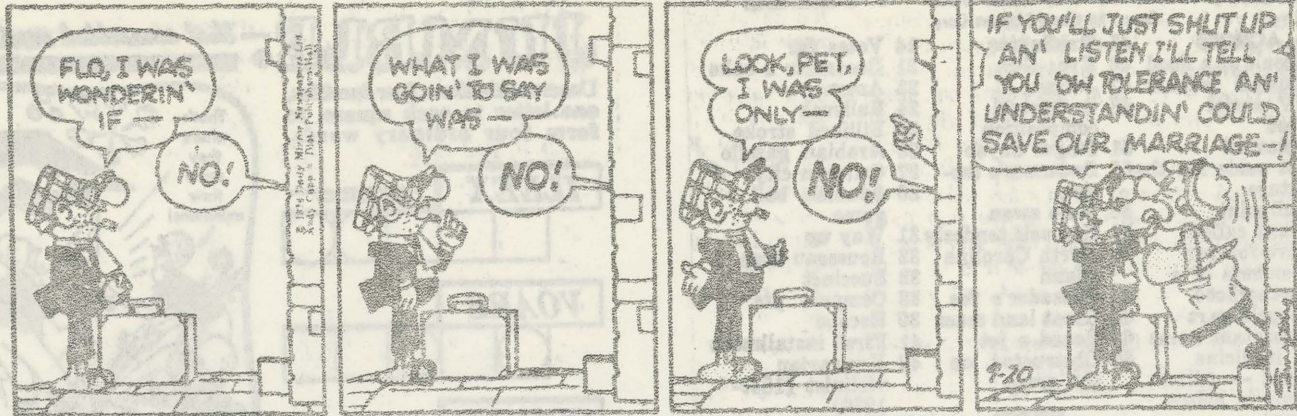

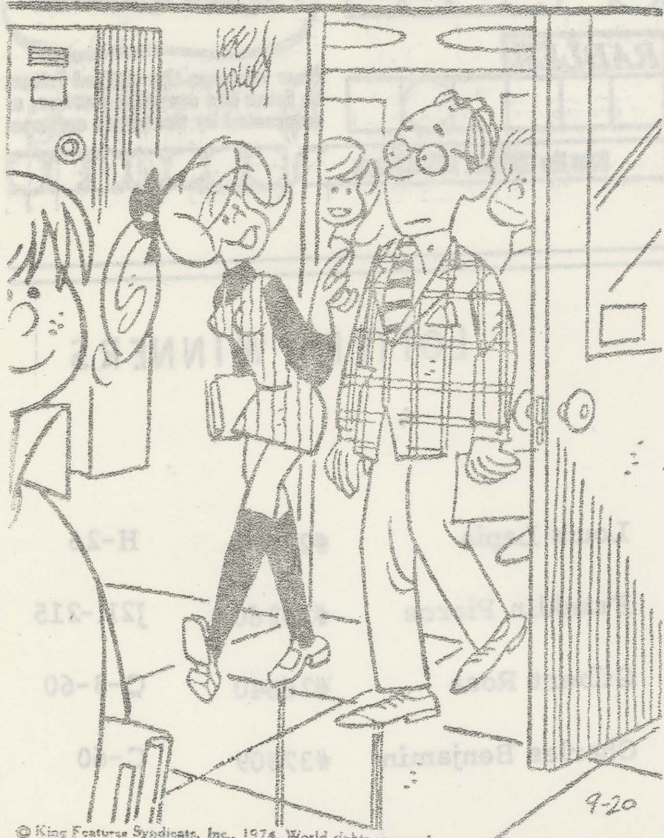

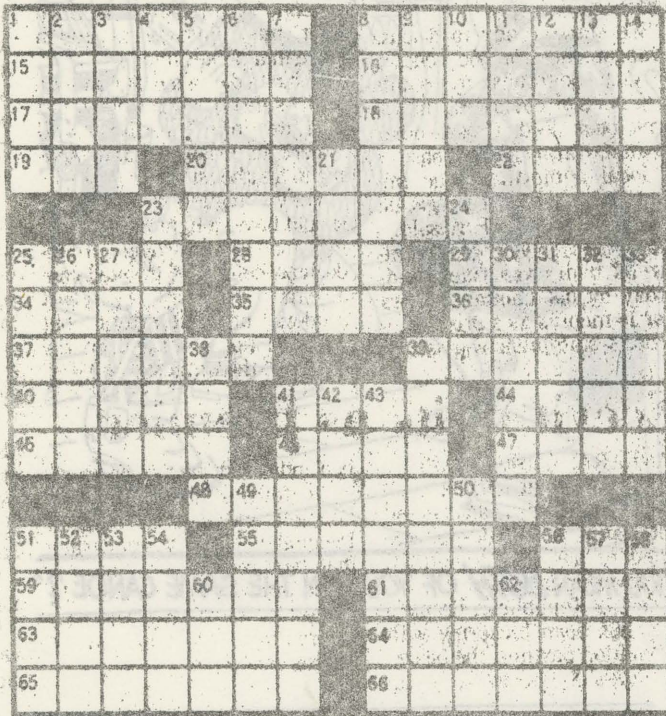
