## "A LESSON IN REVENGE"

It all began many years ago when I first went to work for the newspaper. I was the only reporter in the office when the story broke and my editor asked if I was interested in covering a murder case. I can remember thinking that this would be my big break. Oddly enough, it has turned out to be something that has haunted me since that day.

Even now I still have doubts about who was really at fault, and if there ever was a murder actually committed. I guess that it would be a lot easier if I began prior to the trial and filled in all the details, and then let you decide for yourself.

Frank had joined the Service shortly before the end of the war, as did most young men who felt that they had some kind of obligation to perform. It really didn't concern him that he would have to wait to complete his college education or anything else for that matter. He came home a hero, and finally, after taking it easy for a period of time, went back to school and obtained his degree as an accountant.

This is where it really begins, and the pattern is set up to create the events that later would put Frank in the electric chair, the last to be executed in this state. Also, one story that would for many years leave serious doubt as to whether an innocent man may have been put to death.

It isn't easy for a young man to rise to the position of head accountant for one of the largest firms in New York, but Frank had been able to do it. Hard work and a lot of long hours had helped but, he managed to get into the right social set and again use this to further his career. There seemed only one way for him to go and that was up.

I think his first mistake was getting married, not so much that there was anything wrong with marriage for him, but to whom he married. Ethel wasn't the right woman for him. Sure she was the necessary driving force that kept him going and trying to build a better life for them.

Ethel, as a young girl, had grown up never having the good things that she had seen other families with. Somehow, her father had been able to send her to a private school, but even this presented problems. The other girls came from families with money and it was hard for her to accept their having better clothes, cars, and even being able to spend more freely. She made a vow to herself that when it came time to marry, she would for money and social position, not for love.

Her attitudes about wealth had taken a tremendous toll of Frank over the years. He resented going home after working all day, for when he arrived there was the constant nagging. "Wasn't a man's home his castle?" he thought. How foolish he felt, he had been all these years. It was because of this, that he was arrested and tried for murder.

I made a request, through the warden at the State Prison, to Frank for an interview before his execution day. He sent word that he would see me only if I would write the story from his point of view. Naturally, being a young reporter, I was more than happy to accept his terms and we arranged a date that was to be one of many.

Our first meeting seemed to be more of a feeling-out period. He seemed to be trying to find out if he could trust me to print his side, and I was really trying to find a key to this puzzle of a man. Maybe it was because of this honest searching on both our parts, that we grew closer together in his last few days.

Frank, was truly a very honest and sincere man, and I found myself becoming more intrigued with his intelligent and open ways. To this day I can readily understand why he was so successful until his trial. He freely admitted that he made all the preparations to kill his wife. After taking her abuse for so many years, he finally started getting ready to do it. Buying poison a little at a time, selling off all their property and putting everything in order, he decided on a date. He brought a one-way plane ticket to the West Coast. Now all he had to do was wait until the end of the regular work day, go home, and put his plan into effect.

Upon arriving home, Ethel was her natural nasty self, and started in as

soon as he had opened the door. She had told him that supper would be a few minutes late, which was unusual, but he really didn't mind this time for it would be the last meal that they would have together.

They began to eat, when Frank said that he felt kind of dizzy and that he seemed to have lost control over his muscles. Ethel sat there with a know grin on her face and watched him as he slumped from his chair onto the floor. She quietly got up and walked around him to the phone and made a call. When she returned, she told him that the reservations desk at the airport had called that morning to confirm his flight. This had caused her to become curious, and in checking, she had found both the poison and all the papers that he had signed over.

Ethel dragged him through the house out to the hole that he had dug for her in the back yard. She got into the hole and put the gun in his hand and squeezed the trigger. Frank started to come around, and he could still smell the acid smell of gunpowder as the wail of police car sirens could be heard coming down the street.

Many years have passed, and I'm still working as a court reporter, but of all the cases that I have covered, this one remains the most bizarre. I was with Frank till the very end, and to this day I wonder if he was guilty. Was he?

If previous efforts are any indication of success, then hefty grosses are indicated for the bank robbing team of "Thomasine and Bushrod." Star-author-co-producer Max Julien is reunited with Harvey Bernhard, who produced Julien's hit "The Mack," while director Gordon Parks jr. won instant acclaim for "Super Fly." Top off these names with that of leading lady (and associate producer) Vonetta McGee, one of the prettiest and most popular black actresses in films, and you have a good package. Julien's story combines black exploitation elements with traditional Western ingredients and remains within PG bounds. Set in 1911 Texas, the plot is full of comedy situations despite some nasty killings and a tragic ending. Dialog is more contemporary than period, while the basic story and at least one scene are similar to the current "Sonny and Jed," prompting the observation that the two films shouldn't be booked on the same bill. Parks uses a long series of sepia-toned still pictures for a pleasant interlude. Both stars are good in their parts, Glynn Turman is colorful and there are fine bits by Juanita Moore and Joel Fluellen. Veteran Lucien Ballard color-filmed "T&B" in handsome New Mexican locations, particularly Santa Fe.

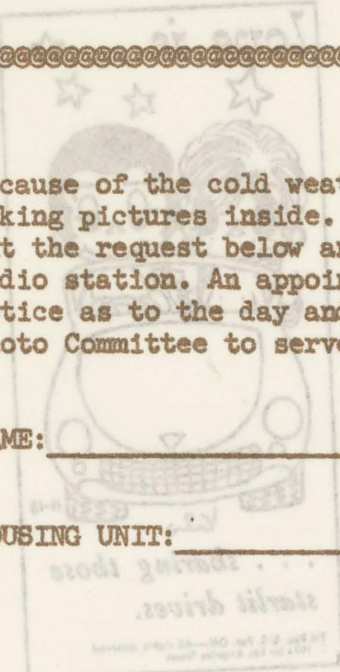

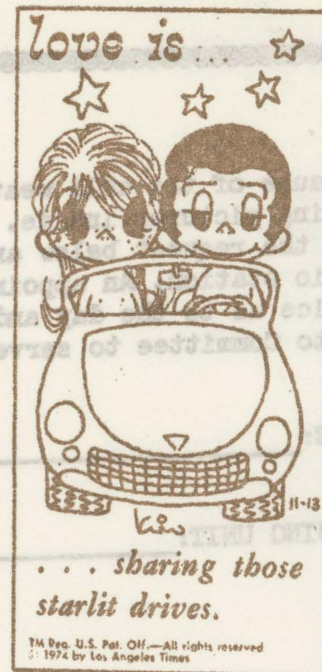

# Christmas Packages

## CHRISTMAS PACKAGES

A notice approved items for Christmas packages is available from block officers. In order to make this information available to family and friends on your approved visting list, men should enclose the Christmas packages list in the appropriate outgoing letters.

Christmas packages may be mailed or delivered in the course of regular visits during the Holiday season from November 30, 1974 through December 31, 1974, subject to the following limitations.

1. There will be a limit of one package from each person on the inmates approved visting list.
2. All packages must have the following information VERY CLEARLY written on the outside.  
Inmates name and number  
Connecticut Correctional Institution, Somers  
P.O. Box 100  
Somers, Connecticut 06061  
and  
Complete name and address of the sender
3. All packages are subject to inspection and all unauthorized items or excessive quantities of approved items will be returned to the sender at the inmates expense or donated to a charitable organization.
4. Homemade cookies, cakes, candies, and other homemade items are not approved.
5. Items sealed in metal cans or tins are not approved.
6. Items may be sent in glass containers. However, containers must not exceed the size of one quart and must bear the commerical merchandiser's label.
7. The following items are approved for Christmas packages or gifts and no other items of any nature will be accepted.

## FOOD

Crackers, popcorn, lump sugar, peanut butter, marshmallow fluff, jams jellies, candy, cookies, cheese, pickles, olives, nuts without shells, instant coffee, Pream (or other cream substitutes), instant tea, instant soup, instant cocoa, and commercial cakes. Only fresh fruit will be permitted; no dried or candied fruit. No meats are permitted except pepperoni, Slim Jims, and pickled pigs feet.

## TOBACCO

Cigars, cigarettes, tobacco, and pipes in resonable amounts.

## CLOTHING

Sweaters (dark shade, single color, no zippers), pajamas, slippers, handball, gloves and shoes. Shoes must be a single color (black or brown) with rubber heels and no large buckles. Shoes must not exceed six (6) inches in height measured from the top of the heel. No extreme raised heels are permitted.

NOTE: All shoes must be mailed by the store where they are purchased.

## MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS

Electric shavers (non-battery type), wristwatches with a retail value not exceeding \$35. 00.

## MONEY

Persons on the approved visting list may send money in resonable amounts in the form of Postal Money Orders, Bank Cashier Checks, Commercial Money Orders or Certifiad Checks. Personal checks are not acceptable.

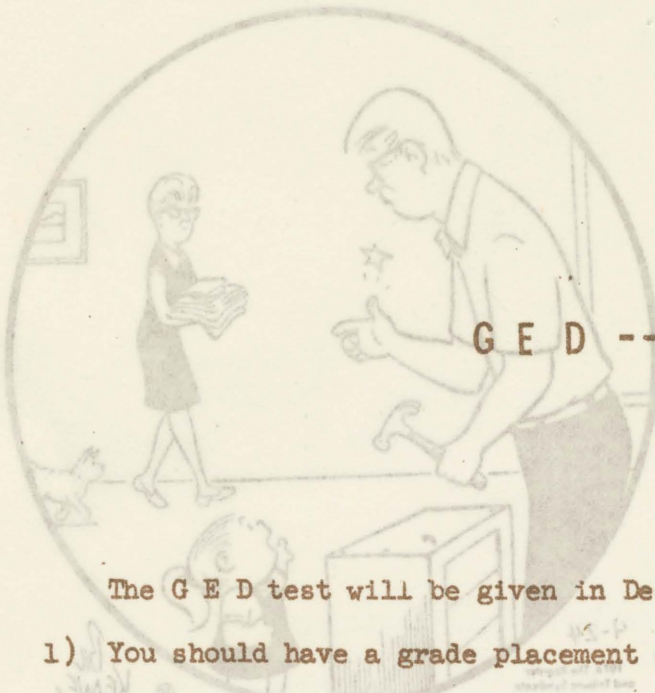
